A CLOUT FURNACE.—A gentleman of great experience as an iron maker, is drawing up a plan of a seven-ton furnace, at our request, for some Menominee parties, and during the correspondence in regard to the matter, he expressed the opinion that where water-power is convenient, a stack of the above capacity can be erected, which will make better iron and pay better interest on the investment than one of greater dimensions. He gave many reasons for the opinion, among the most forcible of which was practical experience in the management of both kinds. What a splendid site there is for one of the kind recommended, near the Flat Rock Mill. The R. R. crosses the river at an elevation of perhaps 30 feet, where the dam is already built, and a sufficient water power secured, where the limestone for flux could be quarried on the spot, and the ore and charcoal dumped from the cars almost into the stack. The plan is also worthy of consideration by the Smith Mining Co. We shall publish the estimates of cost of construction &c, in a short time.

ESCANABA IRON.—We have now up on our desk, specimens of horse nails made from the iron from Smith's mine, on the Escanaba River. This made of horse shoe nails from any American iron, we believe, is something new, and that this should be equal to the best Swedish or Norway for this purpose, is a weighty argument in its favor. Nails are not only made readily from it, but it seems to possess a degree of malleability and ductility hardly equalled by the best of foreign metals, it being double and twisting, cold without the appearance of fracture. Bars of an inch square may be bent at the office of Collector Fassett, thus proved, without the first sign of fracture or break. Beside horse shoe nail, which is said, perhaps, the best test of the qualities of the metal, horse shoes are also manufactured from it. It is, therefore, adapted to any of the purposes for which the best foreign metals are required, and from the inexhaustible character of the mine from which it is taken, most efficient and successful competition with those of any other country.
