Details of the Great Losses by Fire ot Peshtigo and Chicago.

From the Marinette and Peshrigo Eagle. PESHTIGO.

The fires which have been lurking in this vicinity for weeks have at last culminated in the holocaust of destruction. Inst night the wind raised and blew fearfully from the south. The swamp lying back of Dr. Hall's became it with inconceivable rapidity.

The fire was about three fourths of a mile distant from Marinette, and Menominee owns a third interest. shooting above the tallest tree tops, lit up the whole country with a fierce lurid glare. 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
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

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
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
