The January of Weddell, Hollenberg & Co., in Louisville, was burned Thursday morning. Loss \$18,000.

JOHN QUINCY ADAMS has written a letter accepting the Democratic nomination for Governor of Massachusetts.

The new oil-well in Terre Haute is now producing something over twenty-five barrels of the best quality of oil per day.

The case of the ship, the Henderson, near Philadelphia, was destroyed by fire Saturday evening. Loss heavy.

The losses of the city of Paris have been taken. The subscriptions were more than thirteen times the required amount.

The history mills of George W. Phillips, at Fallmont, were destroyed by fire Wednesday night. Loss \$30,000 to insurance.

OSBORN D. K. BOWMAN, of Muncie, Indiana, fell overboard from a steamer in the Missouri river, on Friday evening last, and was drowned.

At Lexington, Davis county, Ky., on Monday last, a quarrel, J. C. Mattingly shot J. R. Bunniche through the heart with a pistol.

On Thursday night last, the safe of the Merchants Bank, at Lima, New York, was broken open, and robbed of \$10,000 in money and bonds.

A CONFLAGRATION at Annapolis, Lake Heron, on Sunday last, destroyed two million feet of lumber owned by Loomis, Gay & Co.; also several houses.

THURSDAY morning a fire destroyed a portion of the Jackson (Mich.) Foundry and Machine Company's works. Loss \$15,000—insurance \$5,000.

MAYOR HALL states positively that he cannot recognize Deputy Comptroller Green. Mr. Hall also announces his determination not to resign the office of Mayor.

THE Right Rev. Geo. Augustus Healy, Bishop of Lehigh, has sailed for the United States, to attend the conference of Bishops of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

EDWARD S. TRIS, the murderer of Edward Tabb, was tried at Evansville, Ind., convicted of murder in the second degree, and sentenced to seventeen years imprisonment.

M. P. McLAUGHLIN, of San Francisco, Deputy United States Marshal, was shot dead at Joplin's vineyard, on Thursday, by a son of the proprietor, with whom he had quarreled.

DEWEY COLLECTOR GREEN has determined to distribute the printing of his department, formerly done by the New York Printing Association, among a number of printing establishments.

AT Newburg, Kansas, on Saturday last, City Marshal Karpas demanded a revolver of a Texas, whereupon the Texas shot King, killing him. Several other shots were fired, one of which mortally wounded David Leales.

FARQUHAR HOBBS was arraigned before a court-martial at Fort Henry, on Tuesday, and pleaded guilty to all the charges preferred against him. His sentence will not be known until promulgated by the War Department.

THE people of Monticello, Ark., are greatly excited over the report of the finding of a gold mine four miles west of that town. A similar report comes from Dallas, Ark. county. Both mines are supposed to be large veins.

THE Secretary of the Treasury has received a telegram from Austin, Texas, announcing the murder of Mr. Laughlin, the Inspector of Customs, near San Antonio, while causing the seizure of two hundred mules smuggled from Mexico.

NO CASES will be heard by the United States and British Claim Commission before December. The rules adopted do not exclude any claim having a color of justice. The claims of British subjects residing in the south of the late war will not exceed \$5,000,000.

AT a meeting of workmen in New York a general strike in most of the city was proposed. The strike would be in New York through the United States and Canada, and early next spring was decided on. The strikers next adopted for a permanent organization to sustain it, an "American League of Laborers."

THE JUDGE of the Supreme Court has put a lift on Judge Underwood, United States District Judge for Virginia. The Judge writes in a letter that he is confident that the XIV and XV amendments, together with the enforcement act of May last, have secured to all female citizens equal rights to vote with males.

TEN more workmen in the United States Watch Company, at Marion, N. J., have been arrested for stealing portions of watches while in process of manufacturing. The workmen in all have been arrested, and from confessions by some, it is estimated their thefts exceed in value \$100,000.

TWO young men made a murderous assault on a man on the highway in Kalamazoo, on Monday night, knocking him down with a club, and with the intention of robbing him. They were arrested on the following day, and received the sentence of imprisonment of twenty-five years in the State Prison.

GEORGE OLIVER, Ned Caldwell and Anderson Holland, negroes, were, on Wednesday night, taken from jail at Winchester, Tenn., and hanged by a party of ten disguised men. They had been committed, charged with burning a Methodist church, and the house of Henderson Wagner. The church was burned in retaliation for the burning of a negro church. Wagner had made himself obnoxious to the negroes by a contest to get possession of a negro girl hired by him.

THE new constitution for Nebraska is defeated by a majority of nearly 2,000. The independent propositions submitted were: First, for making bank stockholders liable for three times the amount of stock; second, for giving counties the right of prohibiting or licensing the sale of intoxicating liquors; third, prohibiting county or municipal aid to railroads; fourth, compulsory education; fifth, female suffrage. They were all voted down by overwhelming majorities, female suffrage having the worst of all.

QUEEN VICTORIA suffers from rheumatism in her foot. NAROLEON remains at Torquay, and has lately suffered from the rheumatism. A COLLIER explosion occurred on Thursday at Westbury, Yorkshire. Several persons were killed and others wounded.

THE assessor of the Chief Justice of the High Court of Judicature of Calcutta has been convicted, and sentenced to death. The French wheat crop will fall short of an average by 30,000,000 bushels, but the yield of barley and other crops is abundant.

A PROTESTANT League is in process of formation throughout Germany, the object of which is the expulsion of the Jesuits from the country.

A STEAMER from Rio Janeiro brings news that the Brazilian Chamber of Deputies has adopted the bill for the emancipation of the slaves.

THE Kingdom of Bavaria is about to recall its ambassadors to foreign states, and will in the future be represented only as a portion of the German Empire.

THE London Times advises the citizens of New York not to be discouraged by the failures in their efforts to prove the guilt of the plunders of the city, for, it says, judges who do not let a bench case no longer rest the tale of public belief.

THE journals have reports of the discovery of a conspiracy in Paris for the restoration of Napoleon. It is stated that Napoleon's Prefect of Police, Trochu, is at the head of this conspiracy, and that he was acting under the direct instruction of the Emperor.

DUNBAR, in a speech at Hughson on Tuesday, declared that the Queen was physically and morally incapacitated from retaining any longer, and no English subject was under such complete control of the political traditions as to let a bench case no longer rest the tale of public belief.

WITH VILLAGINOUS SALTPEPER. We had not been ten days at sea before my mind misgave me, and I began to dread an unfortunate termination to my voyage, for many a time I was wrong from the very beginning. There had been trouble with the crew, who seemed to have an idea that personal drunkenness was the proper state of men's existence; and who, as long as a sixpence lasted, obstinately refused to go on board, in many cases having to be hauled from the wharf over the side like so much suspended animation.

As he passed me, he looked at me with a steady gaze, and I saw that he was not a man to be trifled with. He was a man of a quiet, unassuming aspect, whose presence seemed to augur a termination of our troubles, and he was welcomed accordingly.
