The difficulty sprang out of an article in the Picayune headed: "Hawkins vs. The Picayune; a reply to it by Judge Cooley provoked the challenge by Col. Rhett. The weapons used were double-barreled shot guns, loaded with ball—distance, forty feet. Rhett's first shot ranged high, Cooley's to the right. At the second, both firing together, Cooley fell, the ball passing into his side and through his heart.

We noticed in our issue of last week the verdict of murder in the second degree against Frank H. Walworth, who shot his father a few weeks ago. He was sentenced to imprisonment for life on the 7th inst., by Judge Davis. His words to the doomed youth were bold and decisive. He commended him to a humble repentance before God for his terrible crime. It seems doubly painful to think that a young man so gifted with noble ancestors as he was and so blessed with good society should be so utterly lost to his own manhood as to slay his own father, and that too after having called him, quietly to his own room to settle family difficulties. True, the father had shown himself unworthy of the respect of his family, and basely mean to the boy's mother; yet this filial in no way justified him in seeking to be the slayer of his father.

The verdict is still still-packed and impatient after all the reflection and advice during the long trial. Mr. O'Connor, his counsel, is said to be laboring to obtain a pardon from the Governor, and save him from the State Prison; but Gov. Dix has been tried before and will not be found wanting.

A fearful tornado swept over Green Lake, Fond du Lac, Sheboygan and other Counties of Wisconsin, leveling houses, trees and crops before its devastating course, making a scene terrible to the beholders. The war of the coming storm was simply deafening, and its effects fearful. Miles upon miles of forests were blown down. Large orchards were devastated and thousands of trees uprooted; many were severed from their stumps and carried several rods by the gale. Farmhouses and barns by the score were unroofed and laid open to the blasts. Many dwellings, mills and other buildings in Fond du Lac, Plymouth, Sheboygan, Ripon, Rosendale, Fox Lake and other towns of the State, suffered seriously from the hurricane. The loss of property was immense. The saddest disaster of all was on Green Lake. Parties of excursionists were out in their sailing yachts and row boats when the storm came upon them so suddenly that there was no time for rescue. Many of the boats were upset and the occupants left to the mercy of the waves. A steamboat was immediately sent to their rescue and many were saved, but eleven souls found a watery grave. Other States were also visited by fierce storms on the same day. Ohio, Kentucky, western New York and the New England States felt the devastating effects. A day of mourning to many bereaved hearts.

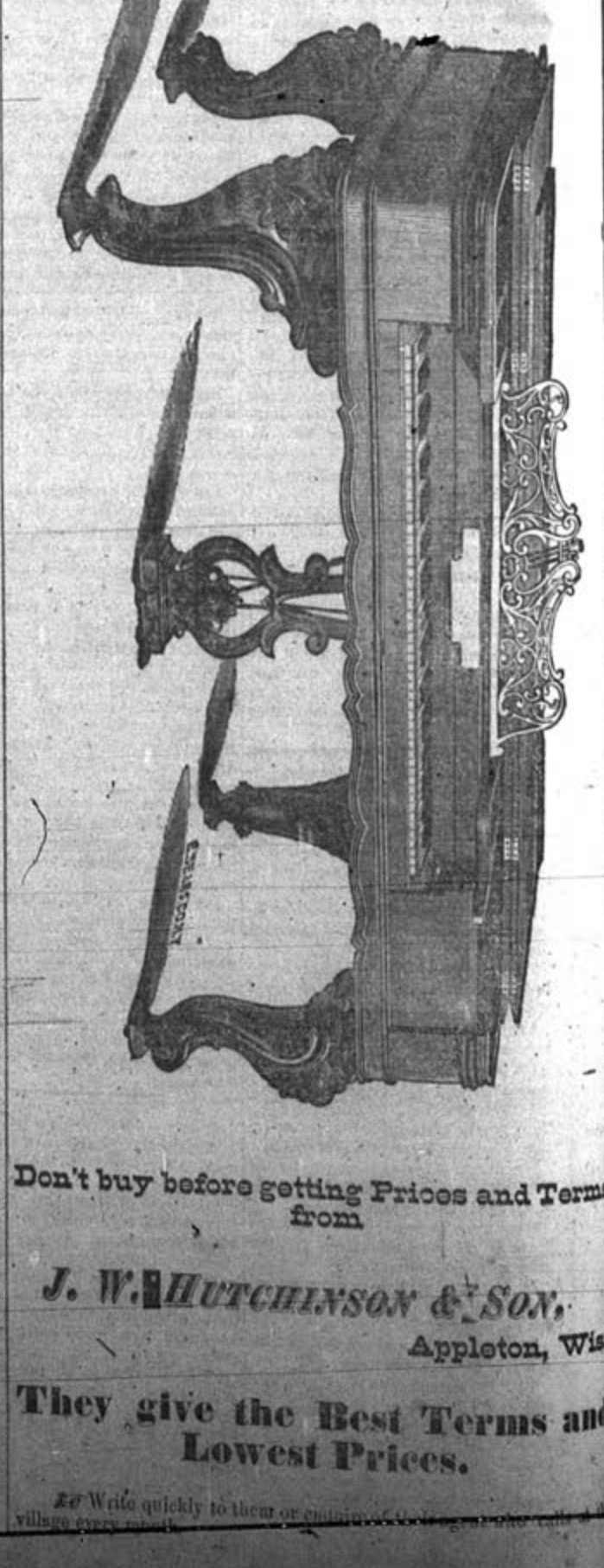
