Spain at the present time is in a state of anarchy. It is difficult to say who rules the country now or who will in the future. There is no administrative authority that is respected and obeyed. Things will probably continue thus until some iron handed director shall spring up to unite and hold them in position.

The Utes and Arapahoes are on the war path, and are creating a great scare at and around Denver. These two tribes are fighting and scalping each other at a great rate. The Utes claim to be friends to the whites. But which is Ute or which Arapahoe from their looks no one can tell, so the innocent whites are in terror of all these hair lifters.

Another disaster area is reported this week. The schooner Northern Belle was sunk by collision with the Anne Vought—the former bound for Milwaukee, the latter for Buffalo. The crew of the Belle are reported all safe. The vessel and cargo are a total loss. The Vought also received injuries, and will be towed to her destination after temporary repairs at Detroit.

A fire broke out at the Navy Department, Washington, on the 15th, which burned out about a dozen rooms in the south wing. The pecuniary loss will be quite small. Some of the records of the steam legs were destroyed. They are records of the operations of all steam machinery in use, under all circumstances. These were valuable.

The Woodhull and Claflin sisters are bound to attempt to revolutionize society in all respects. At the funeral services of one of their sisters, Mrs. Brooker, there was no outward manifestation, no crape on the door, no mourning apparel of any kind, and everything about the house was just the same as usual. In place of the pastor was a young man, a friend of the family, who imparted the balm of consolation from the words of Shakespeare, rather than from the Bible as of old.

On July 14th Grand Rapids, in this State, was visited by the most disastrous fire ever known in that city. The loss is estimated at upwards of \$500,000, with an insurance for about half the amount. About twenty acres of ground was burned over and 200 houses consumed. The fire spread swept like wind among the frame buildings, and seemed to have complete control of the city for over three hours.

SEVERE FLOOD.—During the past week the entire country has been visited by the most severe storm ever known by its oldest inhabitants. The O. & N. W. R. tracks at Negaunee were washed away; loaded ore cars standing on side-tracks were left without support; the water ran down the track south of Negaunee like a river for a mile or more, washing away portions of the track. In the mines the damage was immense. We hear that in one of the pits of the Cleveland mine there is 120 feet of water. The pumps in the Winthrop and Saginaw mines are also under water. On the line of the M. I. & O. R. R. the damage was still greater. The bridges and culverts for the first time called out of Minnesota were nearly all swept away. People who have viewed the scene, tell us that it will be impossible to repair the damage in less than a week's time. At the city of Marquette the damage will not be short of the least calculation of \$20,000. Several boats were washed out into the lake, by the sudden uprising of little Jabobs, which are usually from 4 to 10 feet in width and only a few inches in depth, but at this time were swollen to a great width as 25 feet, and to a depth of 20 and 30 feet. The street in front of the Northwestern Hotel was built washed out, as was also property belonging to the Rev. Father's and others. The R. R. tracks leading to the rolling mill was badly demoralized, and considerable other damage was done to gas pipes, buildings, &c.

The ceremony of laying and blessing the corner stone of the St. Joseph's Catholic Church of this village took place on Sunday last. The stone is a large brown sand stone, with the inscription, "ANNO MDCCLXXXIII," neatly cut upon the front. The box was a large-sized one, and contained several written documents, a copy of the ESCANABA TAINING Marquette Journal, Boston Pilot, Catholic Indicator, and some German and French papers, twenty-four coins of this and other countries. After the somewhat lengthy ceremonies prescribed by the church, in which several participated the Rev. Chas. Langroy, pastor, in a few remarks, expressed his disappointment at the non-arrival of two or three priests who had promised to be present, and by whom speeches were to have been delivered. Expecting these he had not prepared anything himself until the arrival of the southern train made him aware of the fact that he was minus speakers. But he had hurriedly prepared a few remarks for the occasion, and delivered them in a very acceptable manner. The weather was extremely hot, and the ceremonies a little long, but the audience remained quiet throughout.
