

SPECULATORS from all parts of Oregon and Washington Territory are flocking to Olympia, the western terminus of the Northern Pacific. The first cargo of wheat was shipped from San Francisco last week.

It is hoped the cholera has entirely disappeared from Elizabethburgh and Painesville, Kentucky.

JAMES CARL, formerly Sheriff of Hart county, Kentucky, engaged in a quarrel with a Mr. Smith, a respected citizen of the same county, a few days since, which ended in Carl shooting Smith in the head with a double-barreled shotgun, killing him instantly. There was an old grudge between the parties.

JAMES GANNON killed his wife in Louisville, on Saturday. She had refused to live with him on account of cruel treatment.

The system of co-operative stores is being abandoned by the Grangers in Iowa.

The caterpillar is devastating orchards in Sac County, Iowa.

A severe fatality is carrying off the horses in Page county, Iowa.

TWO young ladies, Lazarus and Mary Shaw, aged eighteen and eleven respectively, daughters of prominent citizens, were drowned at Elkhorn, Iowa, while bathing in a mill-race on Thursday evening.

An extensive robbery was perpetrated on board the steamer Red Wing, on Thursday night, while on her northward trip between Dubuque and Davenport, from which the thieves realized several hundred dollars. Many of the passengers who slept with their pantaloons on had their pockets cut open, and the money abstracted.

Two deaths from cholera occurred in Cincinnati last Saturday, and three on Sunday morning.

The mortality in New York last week showed an increase of 22 per cent over the week before.

The wheat crop in Kansas is mostly secured, and the yield is better than anticipated.

A fire in Henry, Ill., on Sunday morning, destroyed the house and barns of Jim Blin, the house and barn of C. S. Woodward, a son of John G. Gallagher. Woodward's loss is \$1,000; insured for \$1,500 in the Home, of Columbus, Ohio. Blin's loss is \$2,000; insured for \$2,000 in the Phoenix, of New Orleans.

A train in Montreal, on Saturday, destroyed the entire block bounded by St. Georges, Bonsecours, Margaret, and Inspector streets.

Among the twenty buildings were destroyed

those which were Lariviere's carriage factory and printing mill, and Pitt's bakery.

Eighteen families were rendered homeless.

The total loss is estimated at \$150,000; Lariviere's loss is about \$80,000, on which there is no insurance.

Pitt's bakery was entirely insured,

and its buildings destroyed were insured to paid up the sum of the value.

The elder of two boys, at Mattoon, Ill., by the name of Wedel, while he was playing with an old pistol, shot the younger through the brain, inflicting him fatally.

DR. THOMAS DUDLEY, First Assistant in the Eastern Lunatic Asylum at Lexington, Ky., committed suicide, on Friday, by taking three grains of morphine. He was about 40 years old, and had been with the institution nearly twenty years. He has been a valuable officer. During the past year or two he has shown some evidences of insanity, owing, it is supposed, to his intimate relations with the insane and intense application to his duties.

SEVERAL members of Congress, who have conferred with the President at Long Branch in regard to the safety gray, say that he expresses himself as favoring the total repeal of the provision in question. Should Congress at the next session comply with the desires of the President, and repeal the law, the effect would be to place quite a number of members and ex-members in an embarrassing position, from the fact that the repeal will necessitate the return of the \$5,000 back pay, the money having been spent by many of them in payment of old liabilities contracted in Washington and elsewhere.

A BENZIN AXLES correspondent narrates the particulars of the discovery, in the provinces of the Argentine Republic, of a wonderful cold mine, said to be the richest in the world.

One-half of the site of the mine has a solid, according to the narrator, for \$100,000,000.

The New York Board of Underwriters adopted a resolution to levy an additional premium of one per cent on Mansard roofs after January 1.

HESKET ROBINSON and Henry Fox, while laboring in an excavation in the extreme lower part of St. Louis, Thursday evening, were killed by an embankment falling on them. Philip Moorer and Daniel Rock were also badly injured.

Recent attacks of Lister's Babcock on the Porto Acreas produced a good effect.

Two hundred savages have surrendered at the reservation.

The trunk of Mrs. Maxwell, of Salt Lake, was robbed of \$12,000 worth of diamonds in New York.

DAVID DAVIDSON, an old citizen of Davidson county, Ky., was run over by a passenger train and instantly killed, while crossing the track in his hurry near Chattanooga, Thursday.

A REPORTER from Portland, Oregon, states the arrival of the steamer Otto, and reports the finding of six bodies of persons supposed to have perished on the ill-fated steamer Goo. S. Wright.

The Postmaster General is very confident that the abolition of the fraying privilege will result in a material increase in the revenue of the postal service. He is of the opinion that the increase will be great that the department will become entirely self-sustaining. The receipts from sales of stamps since the abolition of the fraying privilege furnish a substantial basis for this confidence. They exceeded in amount the receipts during any similar period in the history of the Government.

The value of merchandise and produce exports from San Francisco to Central America during the last eight and a half years foots up over \$2,000,000. During the same period California shipped treasure to the amount of \$2,145,000.

The San Francisco Herald publishes tables showing the present indebtedness of the Central Pacific Railroad Company. Bonds borrowed, and unpaid interest, \$10,000,000 net earnings of the road for the year ending June 30th, 1874, the date of the last official report, \$5,000,000. It is estimated that \$600,000 per annum will cover the needs of private companies that bid toward the release of the company's obligations.

The Court of Inquiry in the loss of the steamer E. M. Phillips has suspended Captain W. H. Phillips, her commander, for one month.
