The reduction in the amount of the public debt during the month of June was \$2,145,160. During the year ending with the 30th of June the collections of internal revenue exceeded the estimates of the Commissioner by five millions of dollars. Yet there are still to be found dozens who praise of the mismanagement of public affairs by the officers of the government.

All the good points of view on the American side of Niagara Falls have or soon will be fenced in, for the purpose of extorting additional dollars from visitors. The next thing will be muffling the roar of the cataract so that it can only be heard on payment of fee. In early morning the cloud of vapor above the Falls is visible miles away, and when touched by the rosy light of sunrise is exceedingly beautiful. Cannot something be done to put a cover on this spectacle.

On Saturday evening the engines Wasp and Delago undertook to pass each other on the same track and as is usual in such cases, made a failure of it. Mechanics are busy repairing the damage to both engines.

Mr. J. Disturff was in town last week for the purpose of obtaining data for a new directory of the Upper Peninsula. He is also about to publish a map which will be very useful to prospectors in this country.

The pest house question has been settled by erecting a building near the marsh, and now we hope that it will never contain an occupant, although like "Tooth's coffin" it is a handy thing to have in the house.

Early in the week a portion of the merchant dock, until recently used as a cattle yard, but at this time occupied in storing brick, caved in, depositing the brick in the water underneath. Some 2000 or 3000 brick were on the place broken down. They can be nearly all recovered without much difficulty.

This is the second time men have escaped through these windows. Only three weeks ago the fellow confined there for robbing his comrades at Days River crawled out of one of those windows without even taking the trouble to remove the bars, and it appears to us that it is now high time that something be done by the "powers that be" to render the jail more secure. If a man who has never had any experience at jail breaking can free his way out as easily as this, but surely the would the jail be in a respectable condition?
