On the 5th inst, the Boston Board of Trade adopted resolutions urging upon Congress the necessity of radical changes in the revenue law, especially in those sections that relate to ad valorem duties, and the rewarding of informers.

The wharf laborers, draymen and various kinds of trades organizations at Havana have organized a strike. They demand their present pay in gold, on its equivalent in currency, but don't propose to take currency at its face value.

A strike is reported among the Miners at the Calumet and Hecla copper mines, commencing on Friday last. Latest advices state that the company have ordered the mine shut down until May 1st, and these 1,000 men are out of employment for the winter.

It is said to be a fact that the railroads centering in Chicago, at just about the time they sought to cut down the wages of the employes, increased the freight tariff. This is as it should be undoubtedly, that is looking at it from the capitalist's stand point.

Attorney General Williams, over whom such a noise has been made, in relation to his appointment by the President to the Chief Justiceship, will now probably sink into apparent oblivion, as far as newspaper notoriety is concerned. His name will probably be withdrawn in that connection.

Last Monday noon, the new state reform officers of Wisconsin were sworn in. The State Treasury has appointed his son as deputy, and the Attorney General his brother as deputy Attorney General. The so-called engineer's strike seems to be coming down to a pretty fine point. In some instances the men have returned to work, and in others been discharged. Both the men and the companies have lost money by the operation. The men having lost their time, and in some instances their jobs, and the companies have had their traffic interrupted and their property damaged by inexperienced men, to an amount largely in excess of the extra pay demanded by the engineers.

GREEN BAY FURNACE.—Our iron furnace went into blast last Spring, or the present month, about the 1st of May, and there is every indication that it can be run until next May before blowing out. The product has been 4,500 tons so far—an average of about 19 tons per day. It would have been still higher, but for the fact that the men they used last summer worked hard. The product now is only about 16 tons per day, owing to cracked pipes in the hot blast. The furnace will be banded up this week and a new set of hot blast pipes put in, when it is expected that the product will run up again to the old figure. There are few furnaces of its size in the country that can beat it. It will be remembered that it is 38 feet high and 8 feet 9 inches bomb. We don't know a furnace anywhere that is doing better work than this—Green Bay Advocate.
