A Mining and Technical School for the Upper Peninsula.

We have always been an earnest advocate for the establishment of a mining school in the Upper Peninsula, and still consider it one of its greatest needs.

The Legislature generally passed the bill which provided for the establishment of the school, and even located it, but failed in any way to endow it with lands or money.

The Act will be found on page 419, Session Laws of 1861, and as amended on page 228, Session Laws of 1865.

Failing to procure any material aid from the State an effort was also made to procure a grant of land from the general government to endow the school.

The legislature of 1865 passed a joint resolution asking Congress for the same, which will be found on page 783, Session Laws of 1865.

The reasons urged for its establishment then are more urgent now. Thousands of our young men are growing up, belonging to poor but honest parents, who can only obtain a common school education.

It is to this rising generation that we must look for our skilled labor, and to make it what it should be, of the highest order, the State should provide simple means.

A Railroad on the Ice.

A brilliant Duluth newspaper proposes a railroad on the ice from Duluth to the Sault—the whole length of Lake Superior. It would simply spike the rails to the ice, without grading, filling, excavating, ballasting, or trestling. The track, it says, could be taken up every spring, and stowed away.

The road would be about 400 miles long, and a dead level. It claims that the ice lasts till April; is thick enough to sustain a train of cars; the freight cars could be transferred to the ice without re-loading, and the rails could be spiked to the ice, or they could be fastened in a frame and laid on the ice without spikes; "which would do just as well."

If some ingenious man will provide a way to float the track when the thaw comes, the railway might be used summer and winter with no occasion to take her up. If Duluth did not then become the capital of an empire, her locomotion would be at a discount.—*Scientific American.*

Green Bay Furnace.

Quite an important change has recently been made in this furnace. The bell hopper top put in a few weeks ago has been taken out, and replaced by a sort of lid shutting down over the top, the idea being that the stack was not high enough to use the bell and hopper to advantage.

This gives nearly five feet more of working surface, and she is already showing the advantage. She made last week 150 tons, averaging 110 bush. coal to the ton, and one day made 30 tons with 102 bush., being the largest day's work she has ever done. In three days she made 83 tons. G. B. Advocate.

The Storm.

The worst storm of the season, and for that matter the worst one that has been witnessed here for years, commenced on Tuesday and continued all that day and night and all the following day and night.

In addition to the heavy snow, a high wind raged continually which had the effect to drift the snow on the streets and roads as well as on the railroad. The stage left Fayette early on Wednesday morning and succeeded in reaching here about 10 o'clock the following day.

They stopped overnight, however, at Charley Bagg's, the horses becoming so fatigued that it was impossible to drive them through.

The railroad was entirely blocked up on Wednesday, the passenger train succeeded in getting from Ishpeming to Negaunee, where it stayed that day, the yard being so completely blocked with snow that it was impossible to get through.

On Thursday snow plows were started from here and Negaunee, and succeeded in clearing the road the entire length of the Peninsula Division from Negaunee to Marinette.

The news from the Wisconsin Division is rather meagre, but if reports can be relied upon, that Division is still worse blockaded than the Peninsula.
