AGRICULTURAL NOTES.

Among the experiments of the Kan-sas Agricultural College last year, was one having for its object to ascertain the relative values of the two methods plat throughout the experiment. In cultivating the plats care was taken to give each the same treatment, and beyond thinning, hoeing once and cultivating twice, no special treatment was given the plats. The corn was husked November 11, and the weighings showed for the drilled plats a yield of seventyone bushels per scre, for the plats in hills sixty-two and a half bushels per acre, an advantage in favor of the method of planting in drills of eight and a half bushels per acre. By the "bushel" of corn mentioned in experiments is to be understood in syery case seventy-two pounds of ears. To Make Hous Lay

A writer in the Ohio Farmer gives the following method for making hens lay Put two or more quarts of water in kettle, and one large seed pepper, or two small ones, then put the kettle over the fire. When the water boils, stir in coarse ground Indian meal, until you make a thick mush. Let it cool an hour or so. Feed hot.
