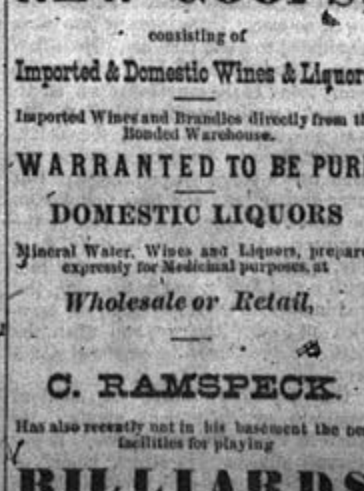

AGRICULTURAL NOTES.

Feeding Swine in Summer. Now the true way to fatten pigs, at any season of the year, is to give a portion of coarse food, such as corn, wheat, or clover, and a portion of fine food, such as alfalfa or clover hay.

Paris Green in the Orchard. Some time since an inquiry was made as to whether there was any way to destroy the canker worm on apple trees. For years ago they attacked my orchard in millions, and a few days after it looked as if a distance as if it had passed through the branches—not a leaf left.

Asparagus Rolls. Boil the asparagus, as usual, in boiling salted water; when tender cut up the tops and all that is eatable and warm over in milk, cream, butter, and cheese.

Keep the Plough Going. Among the many valuable lessons which the late severe drought in California has probably taught the farmers of that state, none will prove more useful than that of the importance of thorough cultivation.

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OLYMPIAN EXCAVATIONS.

Excavations at Olympia, in Greece, under the patronage of the German government, are still continuing, and still turning up the labor and expense. The trenches which are dug in all directions about the Zeus Temple reveal a number of old walls, and a terrace supposed to have been a part of the substructure of the temple.

Another Roman structure has been uncovered, with a frontage of 1,140 feet and a depth of 300 feet, and a large addition in the rear. The building contains the remains of a mosaic or inlaid floor, and a number of other interesting details.

The Byzantine Church, or Hippodrome, discovered in the excavations, has been completely freed from the surrounding earth, and is now open to view. This structure is supposed to be of more ancient origin than the church which now occupies the site.
