Justin N. At 2 o'clock Monday afternoon the funeral was held from his late res idence and was conducted under the auspices of the local Masonic lodge, the only secret society with which the deceased was ever identified. The sermon was preached by Rev. James Todd of the Presbyterian church, while the solemn Masonie rites marked the interment at Lake View. During the funeral nearly all the business houses on Ludington street were closed in respect to the memory of the man who for a quarter century had been identified with the business interests of the city.

Justin N. Mead was born at Grand Rapids, Wood county, Ohio, on Oct. 27, 1846. His parents later moved to Oberlie, where he spent his boyhood days and for a time attended the public schools and college there. When about 18 years of age he went to Galesburg, Ill., where he entered the employ of a pharmacist and se-cured his knowledge of the drug business. Section 3 provides that for the first violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance the offending child shall be arrested by a police officer, without warrant, taken to its home and warned against any further violation. A second violation shall be deemed a misdemeanor and the offender, upon conviction, shall be fined from \$1 to \$10 and costs, and in default of payment shall be confined in the city jail until same is paid or not to exceed ten days. Section 4 makes it the duty of the chief engineer of the city lighting plant to announce the Curfew hour each evening by sounding one long and two short blasts from the whistle, and provides that the ordinance shall be effective on and after Monday Aug. 6, 1900.

Under the most favorable circumstances the jail is unfit for the confinement of more than four prisoners at one time, and then the conditions are such that the stench is almost stifling, proper venconfining more than a small number of prisoners therein, if indeed any.



THERE WAS A WOMAN IN THE GASE

Shooting Affray on Charlotte Street Wednesday Night. Hearing Postponed.

As the result of a shooting affray Wednesday night, W. E. Bennett, of Marquette, who until recently has been employed as a cook for one of the Michigan Telephone company's construction crews, is a prisoner in the Delta county jail charged with shooting with intent to kill and murder, while George Okerlin, an employe of the Chicago & North Western ore docks, is occupying one of the wards in the county hospital with a 38 calibre bullet hole in the fleshy portion of his right thigh.

The perdicament of these two men is indirectly due to a dancing party given at Clark's hall on south Charlotte street under the auspices of the club known as "several young ladies."
