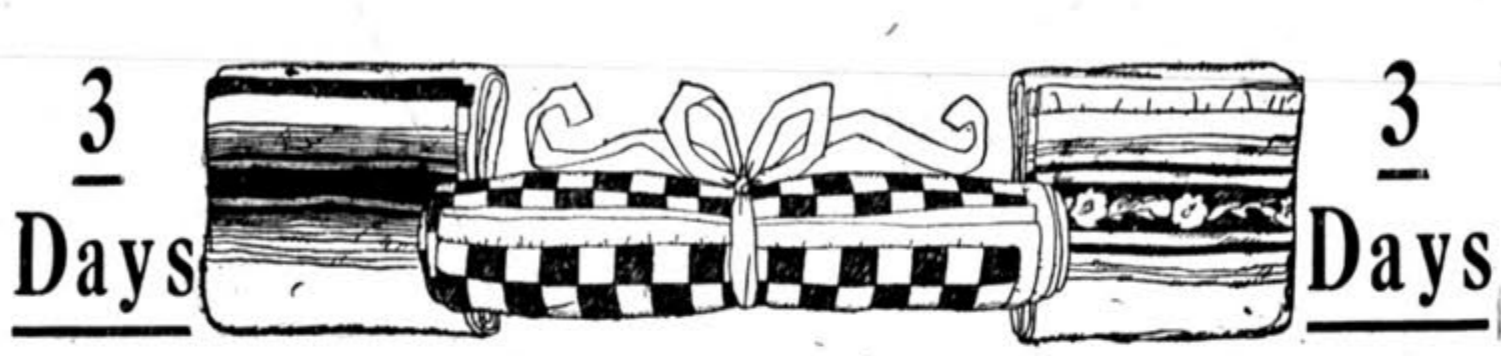

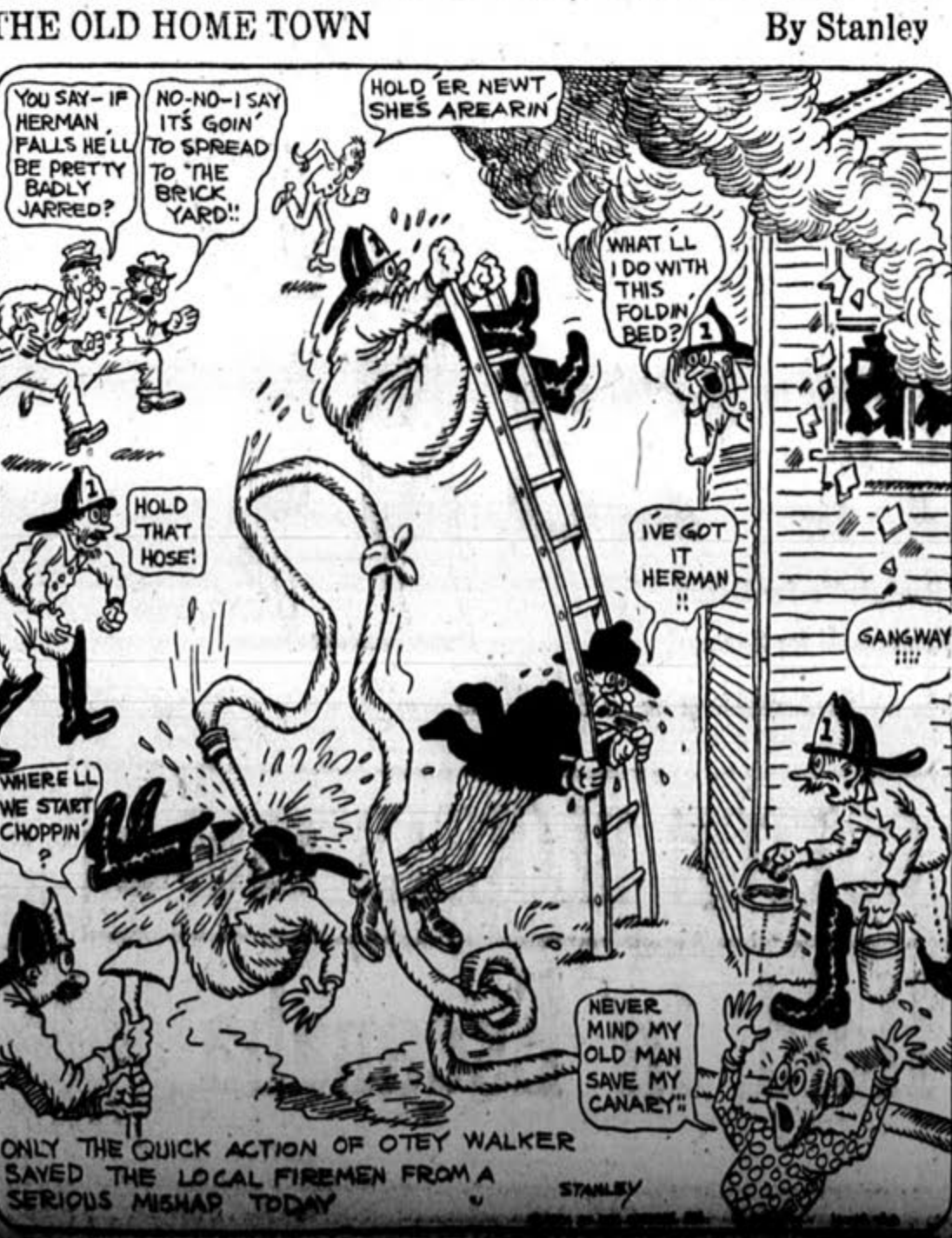

COUNTY CAN GET POULTRY SCHOOL IF DEMAND HERE

Farmers and Chicken Fanciers May Get Instruction

Joseph E. Turner, county agricultural agent, is attempting to interest chicken raisers in particular and farmers in general, of Delta county, in the holding of a poultry school in this county early in December. The poultry department of the Michigan Agricultural College will conduct three such schools in the peninsula and the schools will be awarded to the counties demonstrating the greatest interest. Up to the present time six counties have applied for the three schools and if Delta county is to be one of those awarded a school, the number requesting such a school in this county must exceed that of at least four of the counties that have applied. All who would be interested in a poultry school are requested by Mr. Turner to notify him by mail at once.

Letter Sent Out.

Following is a copy of a letter mailed by Mr. Turner to a large number of farmers in Delta county: "The Poultry Department of the College wishes to hold three Two-Day Poultry Schools in the Upper Peninsula. These schools will start about 9:30 in the morning, and the afternoon sessions will run until 4 o'clock. The first day will be devoted to points in culling with living examples of each type of bird, and the afternoon will be devoted to proper feeding. The second day's work will consist of different types of poultry houses, and in the afternoon diseases of poultry and the treatment will be taken up. This latter work will be in charge of Dr. Stafseth, one of the leading authorities on poultry diseases in the country.

"Three schools are all that will be put on, and at present there are at least six counties that want the work. The Poultry Department has decided that the county that guarantees the largest attendance is the one that will get the school. If you are interested in poultry, and feel that these schools are to be a benefit to you, and that you can attend the two-day sessions, will you please sign the attached blank, and return it to me at once. The schools are to be held the first week in December, so the sooner you get your application in the better, if you want the school. Please answer by return mail. If your neighbors are interested, have them sign the same blank. We must have from fifty to seventy-five signers if we are to get the school."
