



WAS GOOD BUSINESS YEAR FOR BIG CANAL

By The Associated Press. Washington.—The fiscal year ending June 30 was the most prosperous in the history of the Panama Canal. The total net income mounted to \$17,209,572, the peak figure, representing the profits of the waterway and business operations in connection with the canal. The Panama Canal Commission reported that the total net income for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1924, was \$17,209,572, an increase of 16.4 per cent over the year ending June 30, 1923, when \$14,780,879 was reported.

In the trade between Europe and the Pacific coast of North America there was an increase from 2,511,791 tons to 3,113,036 tons, or 23.9 per cent. In the trade between the east coast of the United States and the west coast of South America the increase was from 2,054,523 tons to 2,702,629 tons, or 31.5 per cent. In the trade between Europe and South America, the 1923 cargo tonnage was 1,749,986, and in 1924 it was 2,005,557 an increase of 14.6 per cent. In the combined minor trade routes there was an increase from 3,273,737 tons to 3,847,532 tons, or 17.5 per cent. The only decline, as previously noted, was in the trade between the United States and the Far East, where 1,798,278 tons were handled in 1924, as compared with 1,909,285 tons in 1923, a loss of 5.5 per cent.

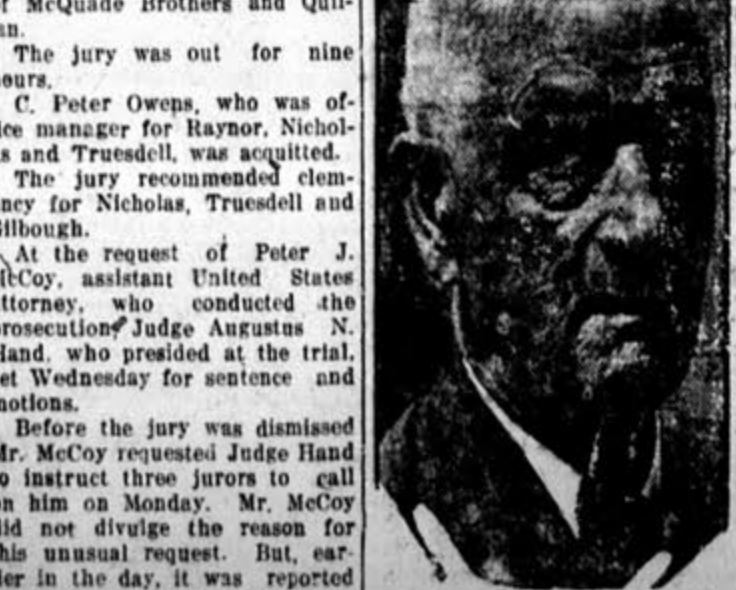
British Steamer Taking Off Crew

Washington, Nov. 29.—Charles Dawes, vice-president-elect, has stirred up the political curiosity of the national capitol by his decision not to attend cabinet meetings as did his predecessor. Mr. Dawes didn't wait for the petition to come to that conclusion but told Mr. Coolidge of his preference last summer when the nominees conferred at Plymouth. The presumption here is that Mr. Dawes mentioned the subject because he did not wish to be a member of the cabinet. Mr. Coolidge made a special effort in his campaign address to bid Mr. Harding four years ago. The latter used it as an argument against one-man government and as an illustration of what he intended to do in the management of executive affairs. "Unofficial Observer."

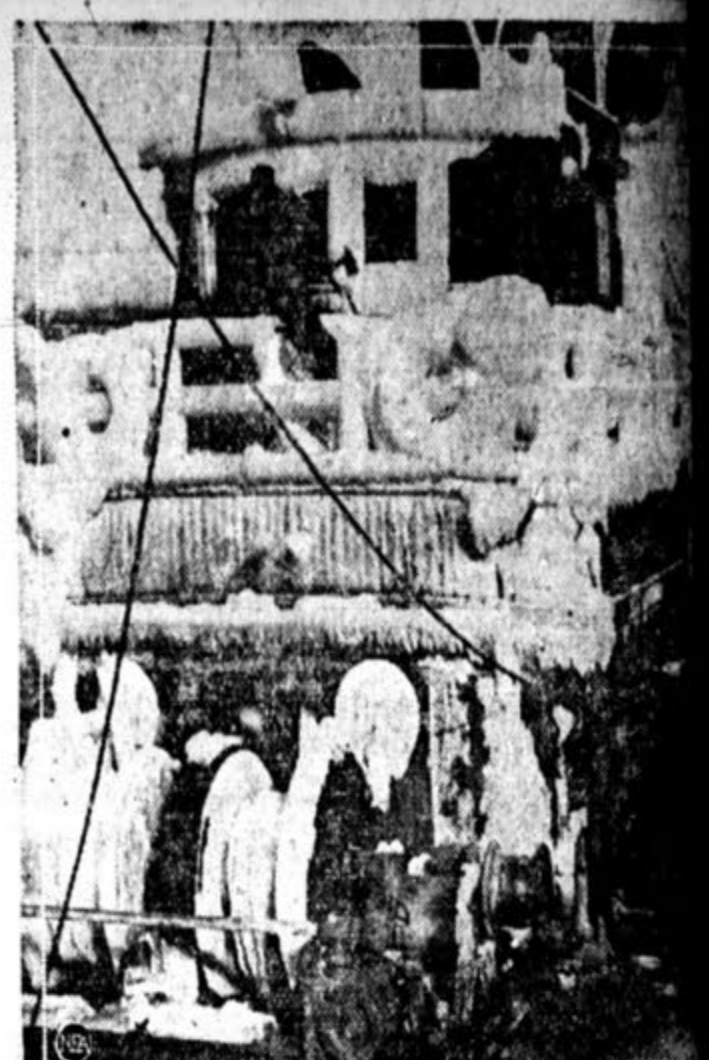

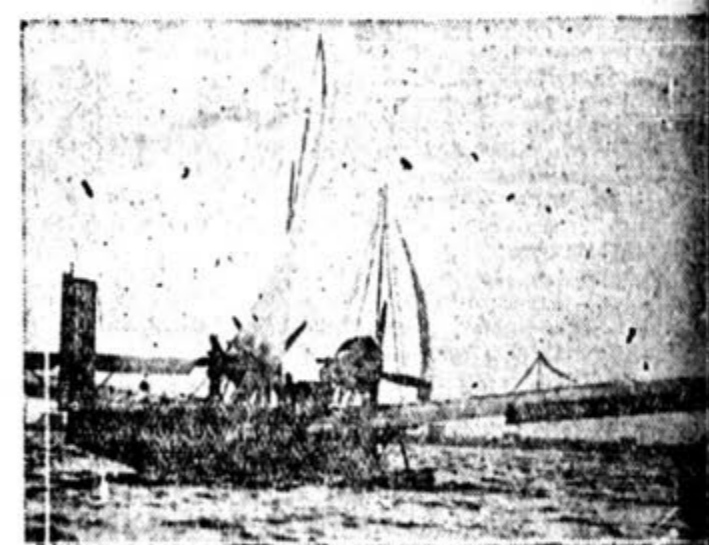

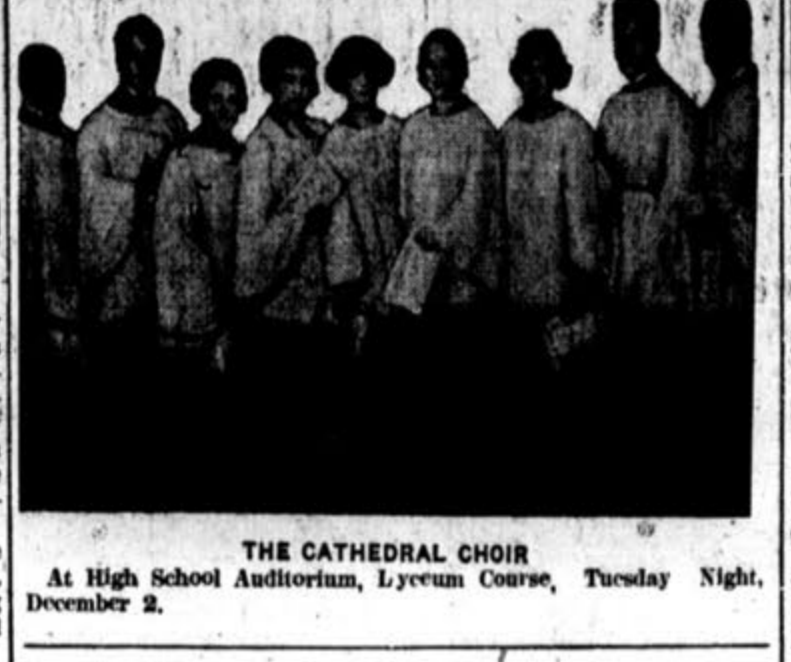

Meredith Predicts Prosperity In All Lines For Next Year

BY E. T. MERIDITH, Publisher and Former Secretary of Agriculture.

A careful charting of the number of business failures in the United States each year from 1866 to 1924, compared with a chart showing the return to the farmers of the country in terms of dollars and cents, proves conclusively that whenever the farmers have received an average increase of one dollar an acre in any season, business failures are much fewer during the following year.

On the other hand, whenever the farmers receive as little as one dollar an acre less for their crops, taking every acre in the United States, business failures for the ensuing twelve months increase.

I have as much confidence in this chart as I have in the expectancy of the life insurance companies.

Farmer Starts Dollar Moving. The readjustment of the farmer's business is nearly completed. In four years the total farm income has increased at the rate of one and one-half billions dollars each year, from twelve billion in 1921 to sixteen billion in 1923, and to seventeen and one-half billion in 1924.

This increase in spending money is distributed in all farm sections, with the larger part of the increase going to farmers in the northern states, extending from Ohio to Nebraska.

There being approximately five hundred million acres of farmed land in the United States, this increased income for 1924 gives the

RABBIT HUNTER CAN USE DOG, BAIRD DECLARES

Can a rabbit dog be used in the woods by a rabbit hunter during deer season?

According to the Michigan game laws it is unlawful to use a dog for hunting deer and the presence of a dog in the woods is prima facie evidence that the animal is being unlawfully used.

But, according to John Baird, director of the state department of conservation, it is not unlawful to use a dog to hunt rabbits during the deer season.

Many local rabbit hunters who like to go after cotton-tails during the deer season, but who do not care to hunt deer, have been wondering whether they could use their rabbit dogs from November 10 to 30. Some of them feared that if they took their rabbit dogs into the woods during the deer season, game

Christmas Tree Cutting Halted by State Commission

The traffic in Christmas trees between the Upper Peninsula and outside cities will be halted by the Michigan department of conservation. A ruling, recently put into force, provides a fine of not more than double the value of the trees cut, that value based on local prices rather than on the price the goods bring in the city markets. It is explained that the practice of cutting these evergreen trees is in opposition to the state's reforestation policies and that it takes several years to bring trees from seed to size usually attained before they are cut for shipment for day use.

### Modern Ills Fail To Bother People Living in Iceland

(By The Associated Press.)

Hofn Hornafjord, Iceland.— Village doctors in the United States are often called upon to make trips that occupy hours, or even days, to the homes of their patients, but in Iceland the district physician, as a matter of routine, often covers hundreds of miles by horseback in the ordi- nary course of his duties.

The government physician of the Hornafjord district, stretch- ing along the southern coastline, has one of the most difficult ter- ritories to cover in the king- dom. His district embraces more than 100 square miles, most of it in remote valleys or along the narrow strip of coast. It is sur- rounded by huge mountains, many of them active volcanoes, scores of glaciers and great snowfields, and in the course of each inspection he must cross more than 100 rivers, few of which are bridged at any time of the year. In the spring these rivers, fed by the big glaciers that wind down nearly every valley, become swollen torrents, and it is often hours before the doctor can find a safe ford for his pony. The usual inspection trip, made every few weeks, requires a fortnight.

In addition, although Iceland is an unusually healthy country with few serious diseases, unex- pected calls are frequently made for the physician, who must start out at any hour of the day or night, usually preceded by a guide sent by the patient him- self. Accidents frequently occur in the fish drying sheds along the coast, or among the herders in the mountain valleys, and as the district physician is the only one within hundreds of miles, he must be ready on call at any time. His trips are always made on the stout Icelandic ponies, capable of carrying large loads over great distances without fa- tigue.

But few of the diseases known in the cities of the world are met with in this remote district of south Iceland, shut off as it is from close contact even with other districts of the kingdom. No case of venereal disease ever has been reported at Hornafjord, and epidemics are unknown. Bron- chial troubles, however, are rather frequent, and there have recently been some cases of pul- monary tuberculosis.

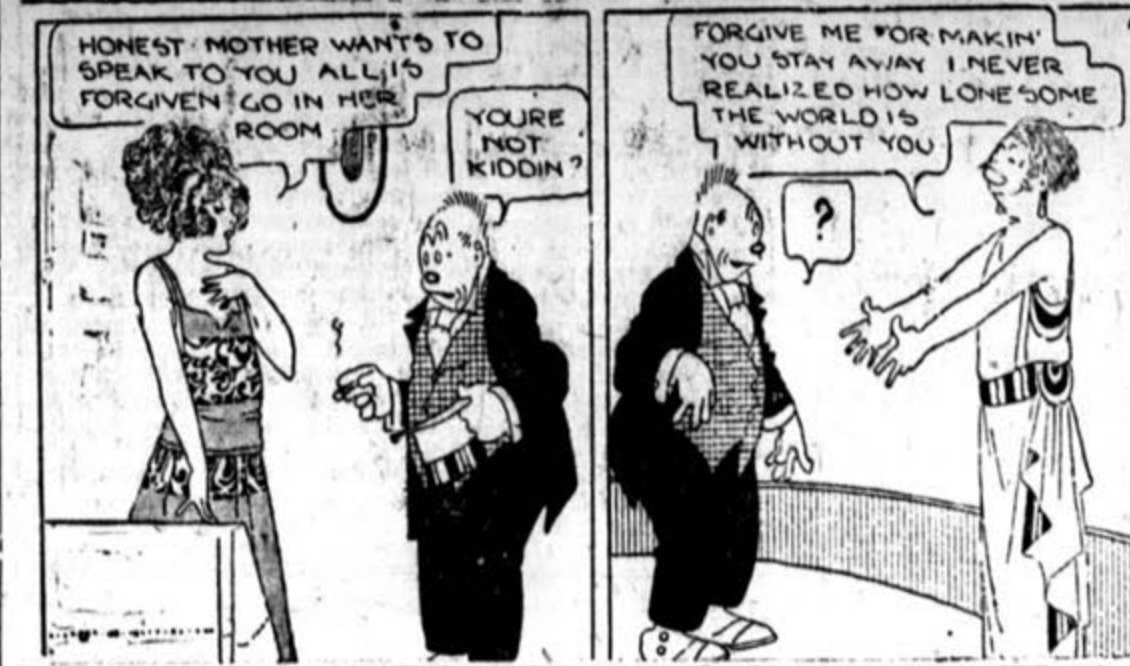

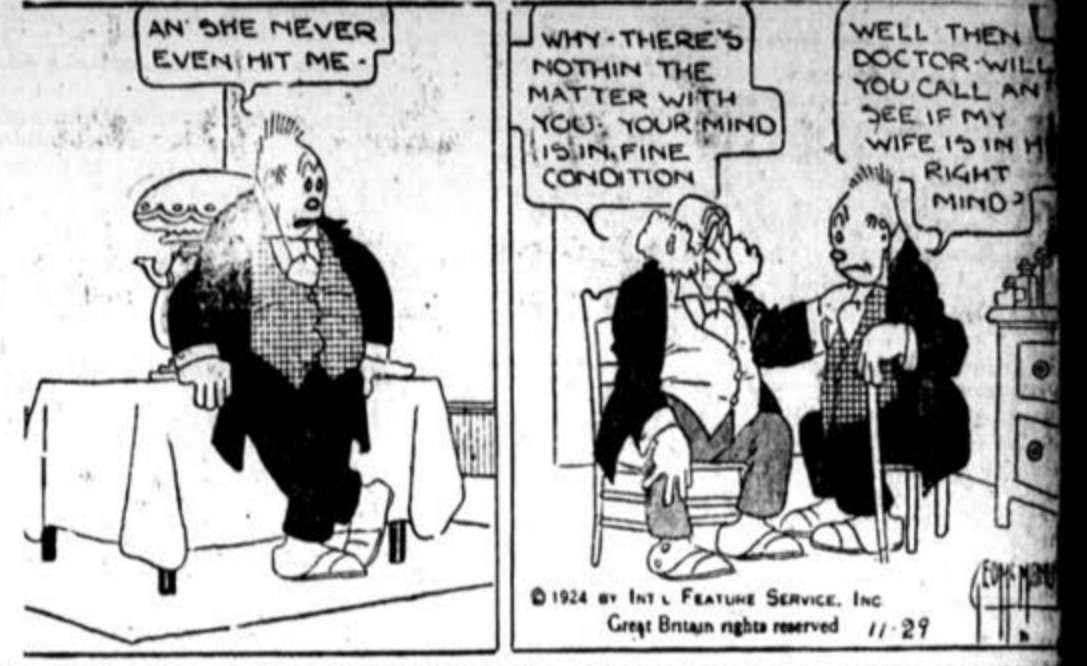
