AT THE DELFT. There are no ordinary screen situations; there are only ordinary methods of handling situations, and opposed to them, extraordinary ones.

This is the climactic credo of Ernst Lubitsch, the gifted peer of screen directors, whose latest production, "Three Women," a Warner Bros. Classic of the Screen, will close its Delft run today.

The great Lubitsch has been known to take situations, which would class as ordinary, and make it brilliantly extraordinary. With "Three Women" he has the initial advantage of an unusual plot to begin with.

It is a story of one man and three women, made even more unique by a mother-daughter combination in the trio. Max McCoy, in the role of the charming daughter, is more alluring than ever, and Pauline Frederick is perfect in her portrayal of a mother defeated in love by her own daughter, Marie Prevost, as the third rival for the love of the one man, is charmingly convincing.
