Ruthenberg Held Guilty By State Supreme Court

STATE SYNDICALISM ACT WAS VIOLATED BY SECRETARY FOR WORKERS PARTY, IS DECISION

TO APPEAL TO U. S. SUPREME COURT, IS REPORT.

(By The Associated Press.) Lansing, Mich., Dec. 10.—Charles E. Ruthenberg, secretary of the Workers' Party and prominent member of the communist party of America, was held guilty of violation of the Michigan syndicalism act by the state supreme court today.

W. Z. Foster, who was the presidential candidate of the Workers' Party in the last election, and Ben Gitlow, his running mate, were others among those arrested in the Berrien raid.

Verdict Unanimous.

The opinion upholding the circuit court conviction was written by Justice Howard West and concurred in unanimously by the entire bench. It held that the state has the right to enact such laws as the syndicalism act to defend itself; that the act is constitutional and that Ruthenberg's conviction was correct.

Was Communist Head.

"The defendant voluntarily assembled with the other delegates at the Bridgeman convention as a Communist leader, factor and paid official."

"The defendant would have us entertain the opinion that he is the Communist party from its illegal activities and constitute it, though a merger with the Workers' Party, an open or legal party. We entertain no such opinion. Resolutions were adopted at the Bridgeman meeting that the underground, illegal party, which is known as Number One and which is the Communist party, must continue."

"The defendant was acting under orders from Moscow. He was pledged to obey such orders. It was his duty to believe he was endeavoring to bring Communist doctrines and tactics within the law. Such doctrines and tactics, formulated in Russia."

Confessions Were Forced, Contention of Two

The case involved a weird tale of the barren pine country. Romie Hodell married Meady Dudgeon, and went to live at the farm home of his mother-in-law. According to the testimony and alleged forced confessions, he became dissatisfied with his living conditions and alarmed at debts that were pressing him in May, 1922.

TWO SUSPECTS IDENTIFIED AS BANK ROBBERS

(By The Associated Press.) Jackson, Mich., Dec. 10.—Examination of Claire Avery, Howard Welsh and Ivan Hill today in justice court was adjourned for one week, after Avery and Hill had been positively identified by two witnesses as bandits they saw October 17, when the Springport State Savings Bank was robbed.

"That is the man who came to the bank window and wanted to sell me some stationery, then ordered me to hold my hands up or he would blow my head off," said President Allan Crawford of the bank, pointing to Ivan Hill in the courtroom. He continued, "that other man (pointing to Avery) was one of the robbers in the bank that day. If a thousand people should testify these men were somewhere else that day, I would still say they were the two robbers. There is no chance for me to be mistaken. They are the men."

Customer Picks Two. M. Pfieid, one of the bank's customers the day of the hold-up, who was cornered by the bandits and forced into the vault, also was very positive Hill and Avery were two of the men in the bank that day. He said he never had been held up before and wanted to see how a bank bandit looked, so he "looked for all he had a chance" into their faces that day, when ordered to hold up his hands. He testified Avery seized him by the shoulder that day and told him to put up his hands and he did so. He had noticed all the bank people were standing with their hands up, so knew it was a holdup. He said he looked Avery directly in the face. He appeared less positive about Hill, but said it was Hill he saw pulling out drawers.

R. C. Wolf of Battle Creek testified Avery sat opposite to him in a Jackson restaurant shortly before noon the day of the robbery, the holdup having taken place an hour or two earlier. Mrs. Florence Artlip of Goguc Lake, near Battle Creek, testified that Avery drove up to the Avery cottage second one from hers, between 1:30 and 3 o'clock the afternoon of the robbery, and that Mrs. Avery and Mr. Welsh went away with him in his car.

CHEMISTS FIND WOMAN DID NOT DIE OF POISON

(By The Associated Press.) Jackson, Mich., Dec. 10.—Justice J. D. Ballard, who has been presiding at a John Doe inquiry into the circumstances of the death of May Teft of Spring Arbor, announced today the closing of the investigation. He said all the authorities were emphatic in the statement that "the testimony and investigations completely exonerated Elma Lyons and Robert Lea from any improper conduct in connection with the death of May Teft, and that any rumors to the contrary were wholly unwarranted and slanderously false and malicious."

Justice Ballard also said that inasmuch as many unfounded statements and rumors were set in circulation imputing improper motives to Frank Aldrich, cashier of the Farmers' Bank of Concord, in the preparation of the last will and testament of May Teft, it was "only fair to Mr. Aldrich to say that there was no evidence of any kind, character or nature to show that Mr. Aldrich's connection with the case was in any wise improper. All of his acts and dealings in this matter were scrupulously fair and honest."

The body of May Teft was examined recently after rumors of possible foul play had been circulated. The body was examined by state chemists at Lansing and they reported finding a slight amount of poison in the stomach, but it is understood that physicians testified the small amount could be accounted for by medicines given the woman. The state authorities did not state the amount of poison found could have caused death.

Chicago, Dec. 10.—The American Farm Bureau Federation, in resolutions adopted today, recommended that the next secretary of agriculture be a man "who not only has intimate knowledge of agriculture, but also possesses a broad economic knowledge and a broad business experience with which to meet the problems confronting agriculture."

President O. E. Bradford was authorized to call a conference of farm leaders "for the purpose of making not more than three nominations for the consideration of President Coolidge in appointing a secretary of agriculture when Howard M. Gore retires next March. Tribute was paid to the work of Mr. Gore and of the late Henry C. Wallace.

Other resolutions endorsed President Coolidge's principle "that orderly production and orderly marketing are indispensable to successful marketing," and also the president's economy program.

Oppose Child Labor. Opposition to the proposed child labor amendment was reaffirmed as was the federation's attitude toward the Muscle Shoals question. It was urged that a farm board decide questions of the cost of fertilizer to be manufactured at Muscle Shoals.

In dealing with taxes, the federation urged that the federal estate tax be abolished, that income rather than consumption be more heavily taxed, that the gift tax be retained, that tax-free securities be abolished and that the incomes of banks and their stockholders be taxed.

Particular attention was paid in the resolutions to the advocacy of continued support of co-operative marketing organizations and it was recommended that complete co-operative wool marketing program be established.

Development of water ways was urged and it was recommended that "the St. Lawrence-Great Lakes waterway be removed from the state of arbitration, where it now resides to that of effective operation."

EIGHT PERSONS ARE TO DIVIDE FRANKS REWARD

(By The Associated Press.)

Chicago, Dec. 10.—Two newspaper reporters, four laborers, a member of a railroad crew, and a night watchman were given most of the credit for the solution of the Bobby Franks murder and kidnaping case, and the confessions of Nathan Leopold, Jr., and Richard Loeb, by a committee which today distributed rewards totalling \$5,000 offered for the apprehension of the slayers. Seventeen others received honorable

mention for aid in solving the crime. The newspaper reporters, James W. Mulroy and Alvin Goldstein, at the time of the slaying cub news gatherers of the Chicago Daily News, were given \$1,500 each, or half the reward. They were praised by the committee which consisted of the state's attorney, chief of police and a representative of the Chicago crime commission. Jacob Franks, father of Robert, offered \$5,000 of the reward and Chief Collins gave the remainder.

The reporters positively identified the body as that of young Franks and later furnished clues which led to the discovery that Leopold owned the typewriter on which the ransom note to Mr. Franks was written. Tony Minko, a laborer, who found the body while on his way to work, received

\$550; Paul Korff, member of a railroad crew, who found the glasses which led to the arrest of Leopold and Loeb, received \$750; Bernard Hunt, a night watchman, who found the chisel with which Robert was beaten, was given \$500, and three laborers, all of whom helped remove the body and furnished other clues, were given \$300 each.

AMERICA WILL ENTER PARLEY

Coolidge In Sympathy With Plan to Codify World Law.

Washington, Dec. 10.—Decision by the council of the League of Nations at Rome to summon fifteen jurists of world-wide fame to draft a code of international law will receive the co-operation of America.

For many years the United States government has been anxious to see a start made toward the real codification of international law. Elihu Root succeeded in including a clause to that effect in the republican national platform of 1920. Mr. Harding was in sympathy with the project and both President Coolidge and Secretary Hughes have since emphasized its importance. Indeed, in the last message to congress, Mr. Coolidge made a special paragraph on the subject which now has been taken seriously by the League of Nations whose initiative in calling the conference is the first practical step taken since 1909. It is pertinent in view of the action by the League of Nations council to quote Mr. Coolidge's exact words: "Get Coolidge Support."

"Our country should also support efforts which are being made toward the codification of international law. We can look more hopefully, in the first instance, for research and studies that are likely to be productive of results, to a co-operation of representatives of the bar and members of international law institutes and societies, then to a conference of those who are technically representative of their respective governments, although when projects have been developed they must go to the governments for their approval. These expert professional studies are going on in certain quarters and should have our constant encouragement and approval."

Much Work to Do.
The League council realized the truth of Mr. Coolidge's words about technical representatives of governments so in line with his idea the jurists who will be asked to draft the new code will not be representative of governments but a committee of specialists. This is exactly the way the constitution of the International Court of Justice was framed when Elihu Root was invited as a jurist and not as a representative of the American government to sit with jurists from other countries.

When, however, the committee concluded its investigations and recommended a definite protocol the latter was submitted to the governments of the world for approval. So also may the recommendations of the international lawyers be submitted to the different governments for ratification. The fact that the League of Nations took the initiative in summoning the conference complicates the problem no more than the action that has been taken in summoning an international opium conference or other humanitarian activities in which the United States has participated.

In Vital Step.
The making of a new code of international law is in itself one of the most vital steps toward preserving peace that has been needed since the last European war. On all sides there has been agreement to that effect but the process has lagged. The first and second Hague conferences were designed to codify the rules of war which constitute the bulk of international law and the conference which resulted in what is known as the declaration of London in 1909 was the last document on international law to come from a large gathering of important powers. The declaration was not ratified generally and those nations which did ratify it made important reservations so that when the war of 1914 broke out the belligerents were disposed at first to adhere but later disregarded some of the most important provisions in the code.

No code seemingly has been drawn which has been considered binding in time of war and the jurists will have as their major problem the making of such rules as can be obeyed in war time. The jurists will have no difficulty but the experts in the armies and navies of the coun-

tries concerned usually bring pressure to bear to prevent ratification of anything which inhibits their effectiveness during war for while it is true that all nations are bound by the same rules, they sometimes operate to diminish the power of a maritime nation with a large navy more than they do other nations.

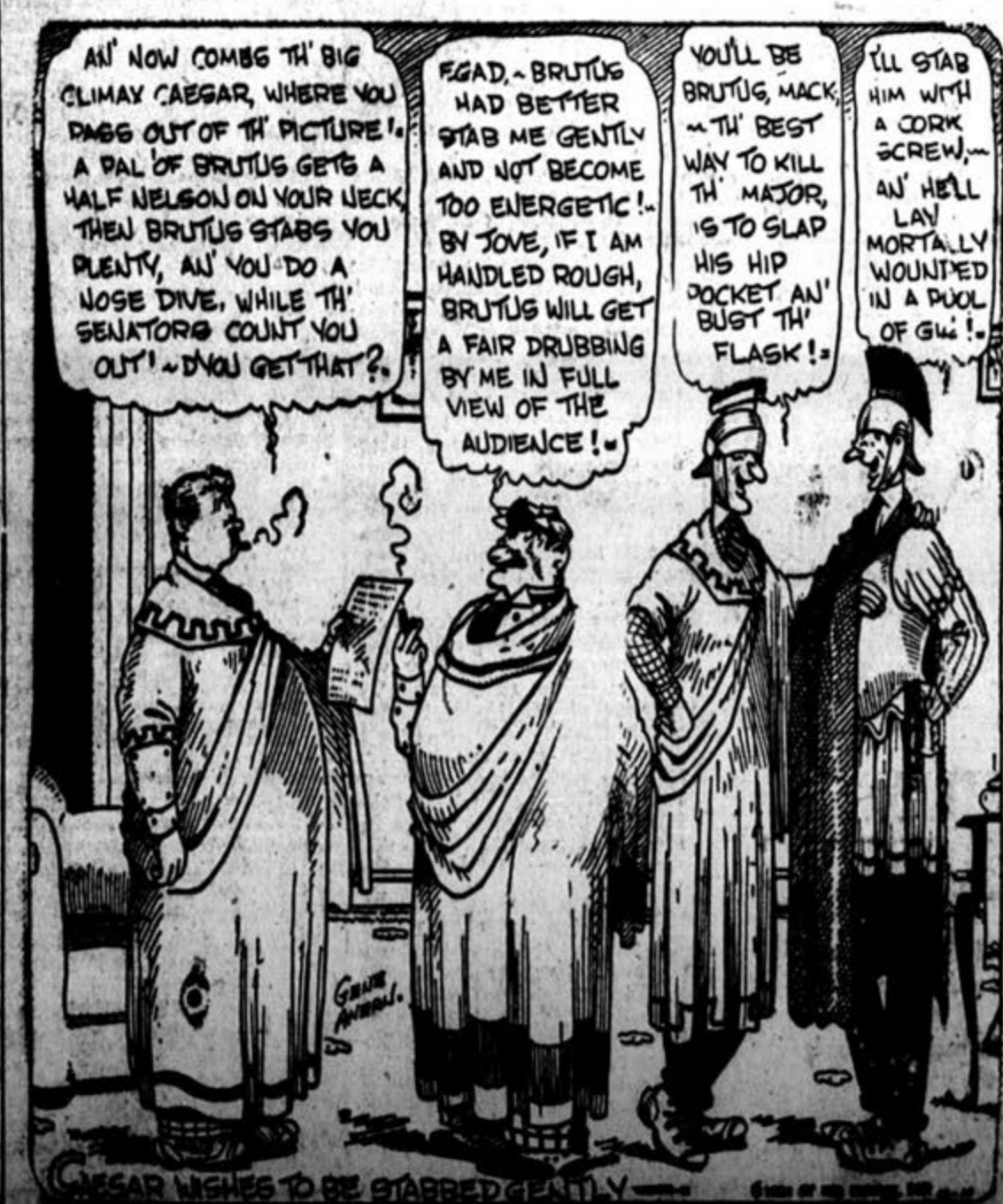

ASK STATE TO TAKE ROUTE 91

Commissioners of Three Counties Join in Recommendation.

The commissioners of Delta, Menominee and Dickinson counties will request the state legislature, by a special law, to adopt several roads in this district as state trunk lines.

Included in the recommendations are Route 81 from Cedar River north to Escanaba, 90 from

Foster City through Whitney in Menominee county to a point in Delta county one mile west of Narenta on route 12, and the 17-mile Foster City-Watedah road in Dickinson county.

Of State Importance.
These routes are considered of more than county importance as all serve through traffic and connect gaps in the present trunk line system.

Of the 35 miles on the bay shore road north of Cedar River, 15 miles are in Menominee county and 17 miles in Delta. From Foster City to Narenta is 32 miles, 20 of which are in Menominee, and 6 miles each in Delta and Dickinson. Of the entire 7 miles of new trunk line sought Delta and Dickinson would each get 23 miles and Menominee 31 miles.

How Allotment Is Made.
Statutes provide that the state trunk mileage be allotted at the rate of 3 miles per surveyed township or for every 35 square miles. Menominee county with its approximate 3,078 square miles area has 85.5 miles of trunk line, its full allotment. All other counties in the upper peninsula, as well as the counties in

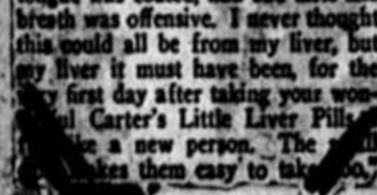
