DEATH PENALTY BILL DELAYED

Lansing, Mich., Mar. 5.—The house after hearing two or three arguments for and against capital punishment, today in the committee of the whole, decided to let the matter rest until the McEachron measure is considered on third reading.

The McEachron bill, providing for capital punishment, is practically identical with the one introduced by Representative Clarence G. Pittkin, of Whitehall, two years ago and defeated by the narrow margin of two votes.

When the bill is considered on third reading, probably Monday night or Tuesday of next week, the long arguments which have attended similar bills before the legislature in past years, are expected to be heard.

Several bills were passed. They were the Bistow measure to provide that the state or county may condemn land owned by cemetery corporations for highway purposes; the Howell measure to permit boards of supervisors to borrow money to erect buildings for agricultural fair purposes; the Henson measure to authorize agricultural school districts to borrow money and issue bonds to redeem the same; the Evans bill to exempt charitable homes of national or secret societies from taxation; and the Thomas bill to provide that the board of state tax commissioners may increase valuations.

J. S. FLIERS AT LANGLEY FIELD

Norfolk, Va., Mar. 5.—The squadron of 12 army planes which left Washington, today at 12:59 p. m. landed at Langley field at 6:30 a. m. this afternoon. The trip was uneventful and none of the usual experienced trouble.

Coolidge Decides Dispute Between Chile and Peru

Washington, Mar. 5.—President Coolidge's decision in the long pending arbitration between Chile and Peru over the disputed provinces of Tacna and Arica was announced today and will be delivered to the ambassadors of those countries here Monday.

Railroad Employees In Germany Strike

Dresden, Germany, Mar. 5.—Assailed with low wages and cramped because the railway administration recently voted huge increases for the highest officials while ignoring the lower paid workers, railway men in various parts of Saxony, especially Leipzig, Dresden and Chemnitz today in their tools against the result of the wage regulations at Berlin which were decreed by the Ebert administration.

3 OTHER BILLS SENT TO HOUSE

Measure To Increase Trunk Line Mileage Is Approved.

Lansing, Mich., Mar. 5.—Four bills were approved by the senate in session this afternoon, three going to the house for consideration and the fourth, a house measure authorizing the purchase of \$300,000 in Michigan Agricultural College union bonds by the state administrative board, to the governor for his signature.

14 Bills Reported Out.

Senator George Condon's bill increasing the number of judges in the court of Detroit which came back from the house with several minor amendments, was approved as amended, by a unanimous vote.

The activity of committees who have been working overtime during the past week, to get worthy measures on the floor of the senate, resulted in the reporting out of 14 bills today, including a number of appropriation measures.

Fish License Bill.

Fishermen would be required to secure licenses for fish for large or small mouth bass, or any kind of trout in the waters, according to provisions of a bill introduced by Senator Walter Truettner at the present time.

Other Bills Passed.

HOUSE PASSES MING MEASURE

Lansing, Mich., Mar. 5.—After an amendment, admittedly one aimed to defeat the purpose of the bill, had been defeated, the house today passed the Ming bill which turns all trunk line construction over to the state highway department, by a vote of 71 to 14.

Keeps Engineers Busy.

The amendment was supported by Representative William C. Waters, of Wayne, and opposed by Representative Frederic Ming, Cheboygan. Representative Waters contended that inasmuch as so many members had introduced bills requesting the establishment of new trunk lines in their localities, they apparently were prosperous enough to bear a part of the construction.

Denies Friction Between Growers And Bean Jobbers

Saginaw, Mich., Mar. 5.—President A. B. Cook, of the Michigan Bean Growers' Association, took exception tonight to statements credited to Russell V. Judson, of the Judson Michigan Bean Company of Detroit, that a war between the bean growers and jobbers of Michigan is in prospect as the result of the proposed establishment of federal bean grades.

Michigan Stunt Flyer Killed in Chile Rail Crash

Detroit, Mar. 5.—Detroit relatives of Alfred F. Norenberg, pioneer aviator and stunt flyer of Michigan, received notice of his death today at Rancagua, Chile. He was superintendent of a railroad there owned by the Braden Copper Company of New York. Injuries sustained in a railroad accident was the cause of death.

Go to Arrest Man, Who is Dead

Alpena, Mich., Mar. 5.—Sheriff D. H. Parks, of Portage county, Wisconsin, arrived here today with extradition papers for Frank Glenz, 35, only to find his man dead. Glenz died in the jail here while awaiting the arrival of the Wisconsin officer.

SENATE GETS CULVER BILL

Seeks To Exempt Real Estate From Inheritance Law.

Lansing, Mich., Mar. 5.—The fight to exempt real estate from the provisions of the inheritance tax law was transferred to the senate when the house passed the Culver bill but refused to take real estate out of it.

From the opening of the session there has been a fight in the house on the Culver measure. The 1923 legislature passed a bill which included real estate in the inheritance tax, but this, it was contended, was an oversight, "something that slipped by." The Culver measure intended to amend the inheritance tax law by inserting the words "personal taxes" in place of "personal and real estate taxes."

Much Opposition.

There was considerable opposition to the measure expressed on the floor of the house, during which Representative Henry A. Osborn, of Chippewa, offered an amendment to strike out the words "personal taxes" which, he said, would be the same as voting on the bill, as that was the only amendment to strike out the words "personal and real estate taxes."

NEW MEASURE TO BE DRAWN

Lansing, Mich., Mar. 5.—Despite the protests on the part of Detroit representatives on the senate apportionment committee who favored the drawing of a substitute re-apportionment bill, giving Wayne county eight representatives in the state senate, the committee today agreed to draw up a seven-senator bill to be reported out in the future.

PERSHING IS STILL IN BED

Havana, Mar. 5.—General John J. Pershing, who has been ill since Tuesday last, is still in the hands of his physicians, confined to bed. It is expected, however, that he will have sufficiently recovered in health by Saturday to pay a visit to President Zayas and that he will attend the Maine memorial dedication services on Sunday. He may also be present at a dinner at the Presidential palace Sunday evening to be given in his honor.

(By The Associated Press.) The senate confirmed the renomination of Postmaster General New.

Frank B. Kellogg was sworn in as secretary of state and William M. Jardine as secretary of agriculture.

Senator Swanson, of Virginia, reintroduced in the special session of the senate his world court resolution.

Senator George H. Moses of New Hampshire, was selected as Republican candidate for president pro tempore of the senate.

Representative Tilson, of Connecticut, floor leader, was chosen chairman of the Republican house committee on committees.

The senate, after two sessions, decided whatever was done yesterday in violation of senate rules when Vice President Dawes took the chair should be considered legal and proper.

President Coolidge returned to the senate the nomination of Charles B. Warren to be attorney general, but omitted the nomination of Thomas F. Woodlock for the interstate commerce commission.

LIVES UP TO TRADITION.

Iron Mountain's election of Wednesday, when Mayor Walter A. Henze was renominated by a vote of nearly two to one over his opponent, lived fully up to an apparently sacred tradition in that city.

It was preceded by all of the personal vilification and nasty mud slinging that could possibly be crammed into a brief, but heated, campaign and finally wound up on election night with a fanfare of noisy bands, marching voters and roaring bonfires.

A young businessman, Carl A. Miller, was the sacrifice offered upon the altar of Iron Mountain's peanut politics and he probably genuinely wishes today that he had kept his fingers out of the Ford City's political pie.

Iron Mountain, apparently, thoroughly enjoys her annual political jamboree. Her people, judged by the performance staged this spring and for many years in the past, are committed to the idea that an annual skeleton rattling campaign, which splits the town into hatred engendered factionalism and tears wide open wounds that will take years to heal, constitutes a house cleaning.

Also, judged by the returns of Wednesday's election, the people of Iron Mountain want their affairs administered exactly as Mayor Henze has been administering them, as he roundly trimmed his opponent by a vote of nearly two to one.

In the meantime, Escanaba and other municipalities in the peninsula where the lesson has been learned that active friendship and sincere good will among the people of a city are as necessary to progress as the placing of municipal affairs upon a business basis, instead of a political basis, will continue serenely along their way, allowing Iron Mountain to wallow in her self created mire and suffer from the stench of her own running sores, conceived and propagated in peanut politics.

Wonder if Bob LaFollette stood up when Cal Coolidge took the oath of office?

RIGHTING A WRONG.

"The Face on the Floor," was the title Hugh D'Arcy gave the poem when he wrote it. Someone came along when the poet wasn't looking and slipped a "Barroom" into it and D'Arcy, speaking from a New York radio-casting station the other night declared: "I've been trying desperately to explain that ever since I wrote the poem, but the title is constantly distorted."

Mr. D'Arcy is 85 years of age and he feels the public has done him a grievous wrong in its use of the lines. "I wrote it for use by neither the prohibitionists, nor for the drunkards who keep reciting it in the saloons for free drinks," he avers. "Both took advantage of me."

We don't know what Mr. D'Arcy can do about it. The "Barroom" is so firmly cemented in the title that even a constitutional amendment could not dislodge it. And the poet is just as solidly fixed in the public mind as a prohibition propagandist.

There must be some consolation, however, in the knowledge that the poem's associations, in recent years, have been improved. That ought to mean something, even to a poet.

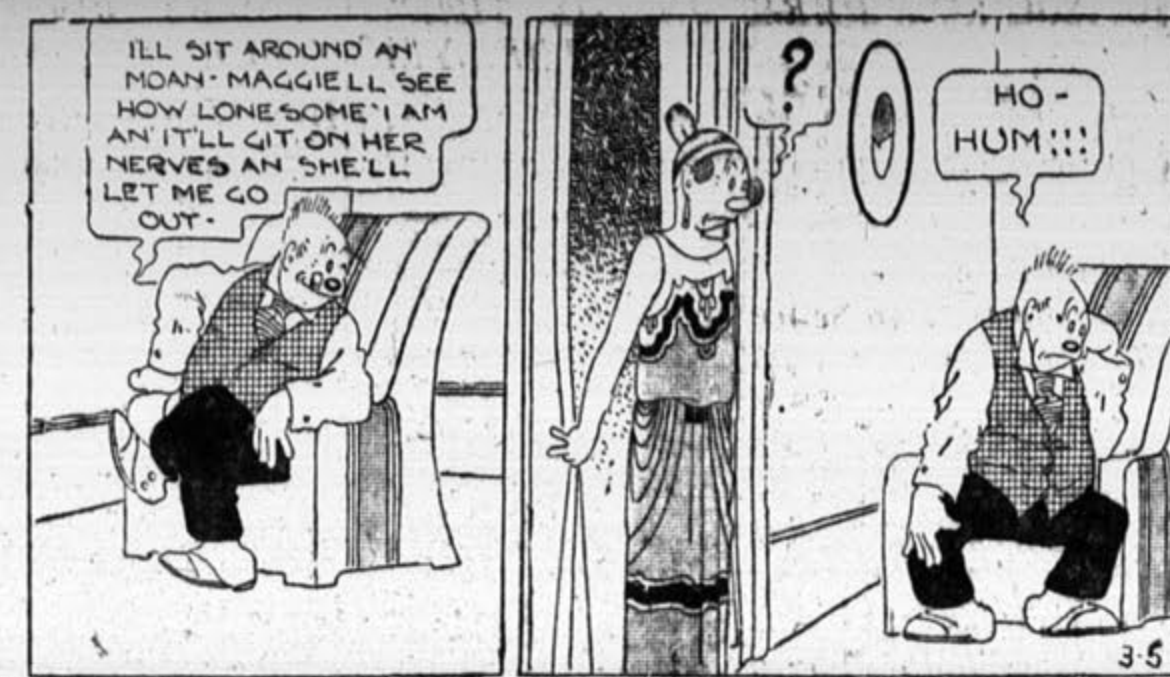

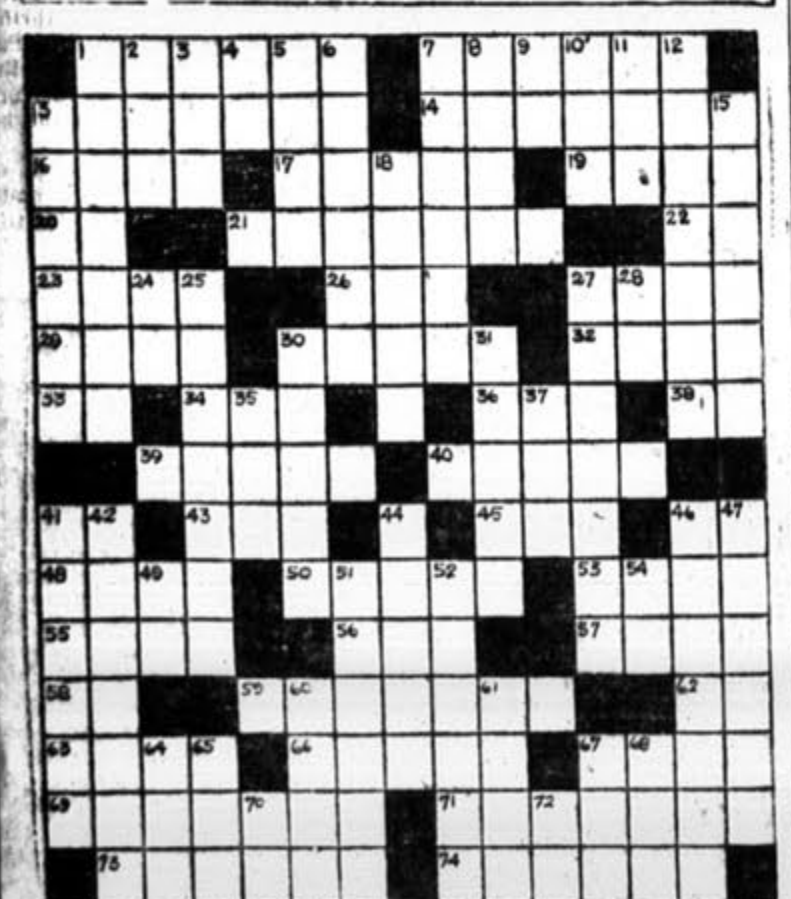

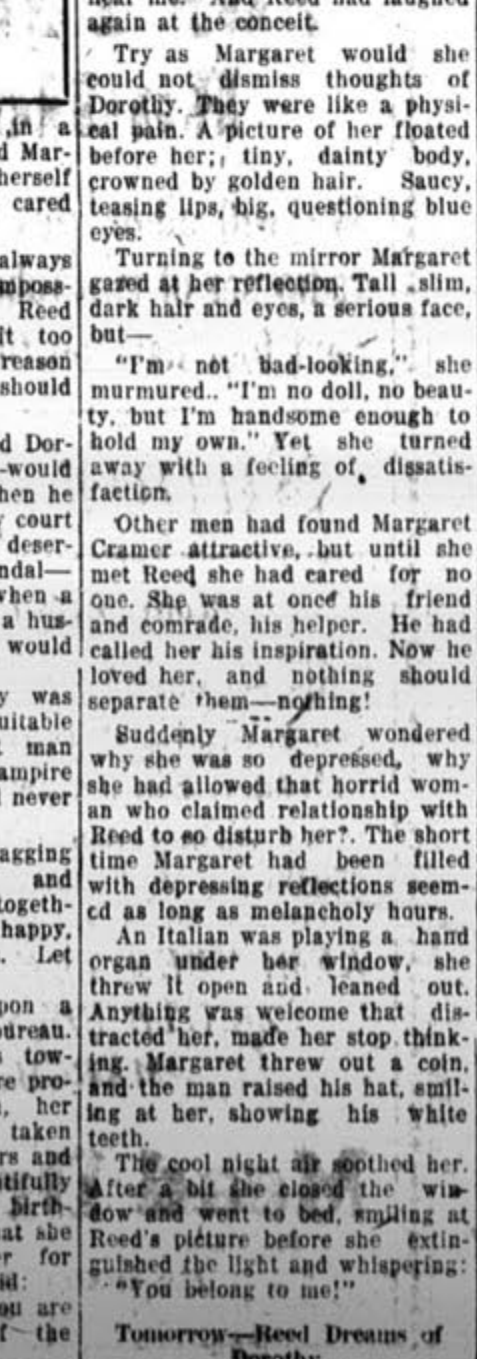
