CONSIDER TAX ON FISHERMEN

Foes Claim Would Keep Away Tourists from State Resorts.

(By The Associated Press.) Lansing, Mich., Mar. 13.—The Truettner bill providing for an anglers' license met opposition from all sides when it came up for consideration in the committee of the whole in the senate Friday.

The bill provides for a \$1.00 license tax on game fish, the funds collected to be directed to the propagation of game fish.

Say Tax Unfair. Led by the Wayne county senators, Wood and Woodruff, the attack on the measure was based on the theories that a fisherman's tax was unfair, an annoyance; that such a tax would tend to keep away tourists who each summer flood the resort regions of Michigan, and that funds for propagation should be appropriated.

Senator Quinlan of Grand Rapids objected to the institution of a penalty against "men, women and children," who sought the innocent pastime of fishing for a few hours each season, but who failed to secure a fishing license.

The measure was defended by Senator William J. Pearson, of

Boyer Falls who pointed out that the persons who took the fish from the waters should be willing to contribute to the propagation and protection of fish.

Upon the motion of Senator Butler the bill was passed for the day, to allow the framing of an amendment to provide for a combined fish and gun license at the same fee of \$1.00. This amendment, Senator Butler declared, would eliminate the necessity of obtaining two licenses, and would benefit the sportsmen, farmers and others who do the majority of the fishing and hunting in the state.

Ming Bill Passed. The Ming bill which turns over the entire program of highway construction to the state, relieving the counties of from between \$3,000,000 to \$4,000,000 yearly expenses, was passed and placed on third reading of bills without opposition.

Sixteen other bills including three appropriation measures, were passed to third reading. Senator Truettner's bill to restrict the deer season to 10 days and reduce the non-resident license fee to \$25 and four house bills were among those considered.

O. E. STARRINE DIES SUDDENLY YESTERDAY

Otto E. Starrine, 63 years of age, died yesterday afternoon at his home, 919 First Avenue North, after a short illness. Mr. Starrine suffered a stroke of paralysis about a year ago, but apparently recovered, he resumed his job. Four months ago, however, ill health forced him to retire and since then he has not been employed. He was, however, able to get about the house up until yesterday.

The late Mr. Starrine came to this city in 1880 and since that time has been employed as a car repairer at the Chicago & North-Western yards. He was one of the charter members of the Swedish Evangelical Lutheran church in this city and served as a deacon of the church and superintendent of the Sunday school for 42 years. Last year ill health forced him to retire from active service.

The deceased was a very likeable man and proved to be very popular with his fellow workers and with his associates in the church organizations and activities. His disposition was always cheerful and agreeable.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by two sons and six daughters: Otto T. Starrine, of Detroit, and Wallace Starrine, of Akron, Ohio; Mrs. Matt Thompson, of Fauquier, Wis.; Mrs. Charles Bogen, of Colorado Springs, Colo.; Mrs. Jesse Shank, of Akron, Ohio; Miss Helen Starrine, of Denver, Colo.; Miss Edna Starrine of this city.

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(By The Associated Press.) Lansing, Mich., Mar. 13.—Millions of dollars were clipped off requests from various state departments and institutions in amended appropriation bills reported today by the house ways and means committee.

The request of the Michigan Agricultural College of \$1,305,000 in 1925-26 and \$1,620,000 in 1926-27 for buildings was cut to \$375,000 and \$155,000. Other building requests were slashed as follows:

Pontiac Hospital, from \$593,200 and \$317,400 to \$172,500 and \$265,800; Kalamazoo Hospital, from \$272,821 to \$109,000; Traverse City Hospital, from \$171,272 and \$56,410 to \$111,500 and \$56,100; Newberry Hospital, from \$412,100 and \$50,000 to \$242,000 and \$25,000; Ionia Hospital, from \$240,349 and \$1,500

and Miss Marvel Starrine who is attending Augustana College, Rock Island, Ill.; two brothers, L. P. Starrine of this city and Oscar Starrine of Sweden; one sister, Mrs. Martha Nsberg of this city and three grandchildren.

The State Public School was given an increase from \$187,000 and \$187,000 to \$207,250 and \$207,250.

WHOSE CABINET IS IT?

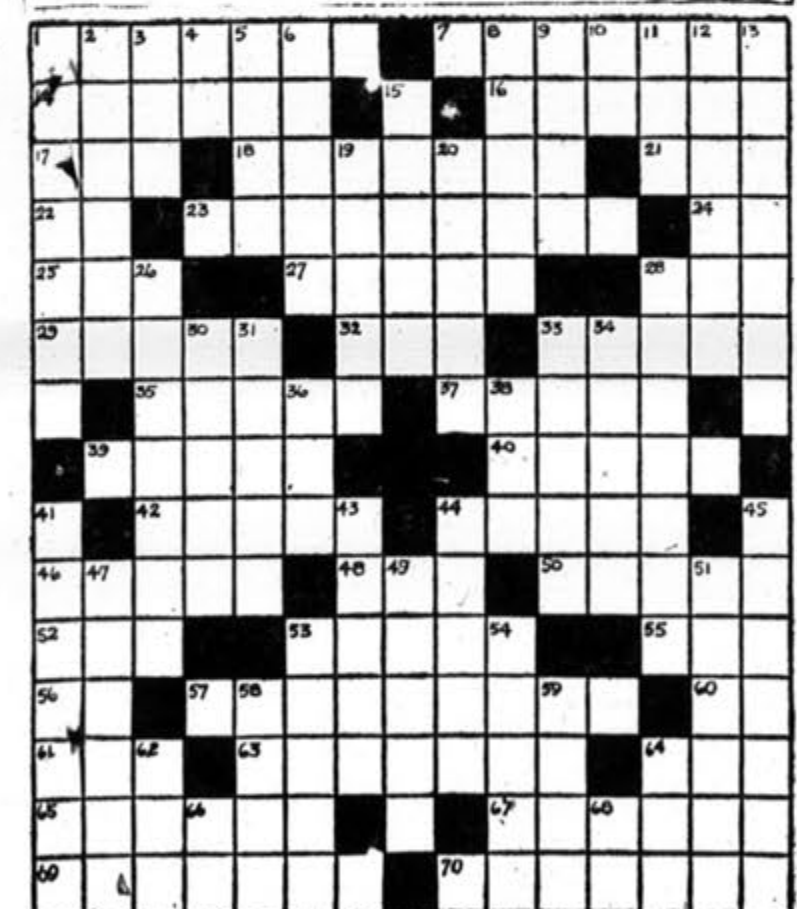
The Warren confirmation controversy in the United States senate has assumed an importance for greater than the mere filling of a cabinet vacancy. The president, according to administration leaders, "desires to assume full responsibility and draw a direct issue between himself and the senate on the question."

Calvin Coolidge was reelected president last November by a majority so tremendous that it left no doubt as to the temper of the people of the United States. The vote proved, conclusively, that the country had implicit confidence in his ability as an executive, and that a continuation of his services, as president, was desired.

The cabinet is the president's. Its members are his advisors. He knows who he wants in his official family, and why.

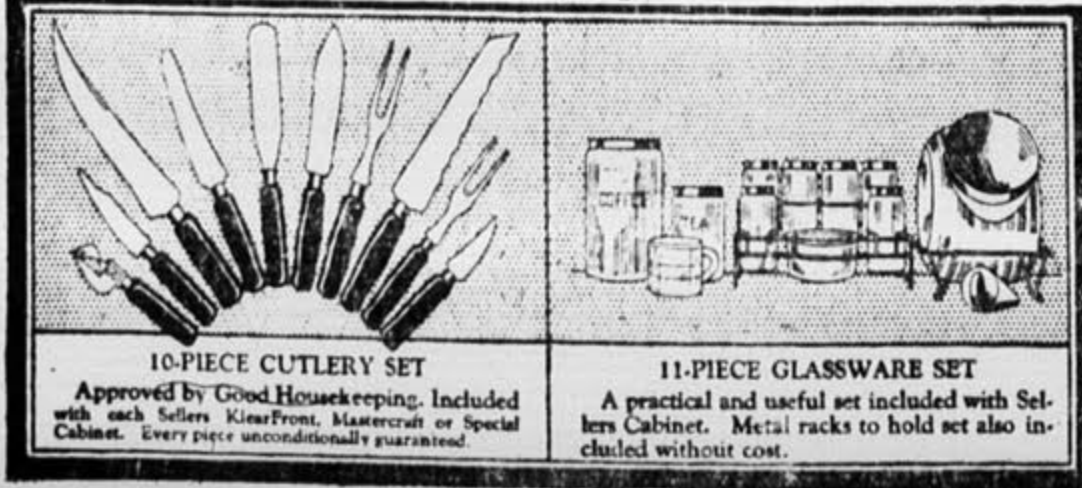

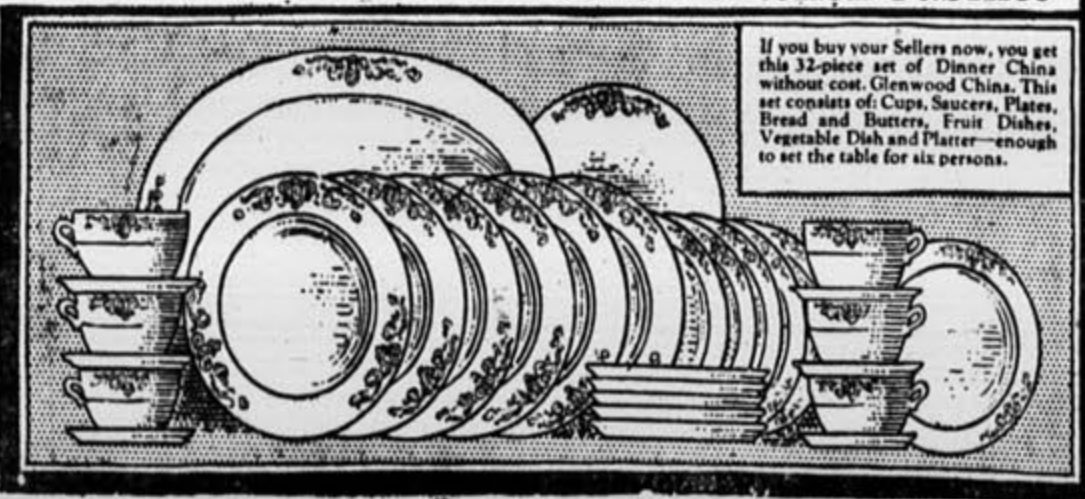
