U. S. PLEASSED WITH RETURN OF M. BRIAND

MADE WARM FRIENDS ON AMERICAN VISIT.

Washington, Nov. 30.—There is no concealing the satisfaction felt here that Aristide Briand has formed a ministry and taken hold of the reins of government in France and that his first announcement should contain a promise to settle the war debts question with the United States. Briand's declaration was the significant reference in inspired cable dispatches from French sources that Louis Loucheur, minister of finance, has retracted his early statement to the effect that France would never pay her war debt to America.

SOVIET RUSSIA NOT REPRESENTED AT LONDON MEET.

London, Dec. 1.—(AP)—Germany really got back into the European family today when the Chancellor Luther and the German foreign minister, Gustav Stresemann, signed the Locarno pact. It was a pleasant little family party in the reception room of the British foreign office, with only 300 persons present.

Bill Sets Aside Castle for Former Kaiser and Family

Prussian Gov't Will Pay 30 Million Marks to Settle Claim.

Berlin, Dec. 1.—(AP)—Should William Hohenzollern ever return to Germany as a private citizen he probably will find a beautiful castle with a fine park, especially set aside for him at Homburg-Van-der-Heche, near Frankfurt. This is one of the interesting provisions of the bill which the Prussian finance ministry has framed for introduction in the diet for final settlement of the Hohenzollern family's claims.

Prussian Gov't Will Pay 30 Million Marks to Settle Claim. The Homburg castle was the residence of the Empress Victoria, daughter of Queen Victoria of England and wife of the Emperor Frederick III, after her husband's death. It is regarded as one of the most artistically arranged castles in Germany.

FIND BIRKELAND DIED BY POISON

Pathologist at Minneapolis Examines Body of Clergyman.

Minneapolis, Minn., Dec. 1.—(AP)—Poison caused the death of the Reverend K. B. Birkeland, former president of the Augsburg Seminary board of trustees, whose body was found in an unoccupied apartment here. This was the statement tonight of Dr. E. T. Bell of the pathology department of the University of Minnesota, who performed an autopsy.

CORN FARMERS TO GET CREDIT

U. S. Acts to Get Good Prices for Record Breaking Crop.

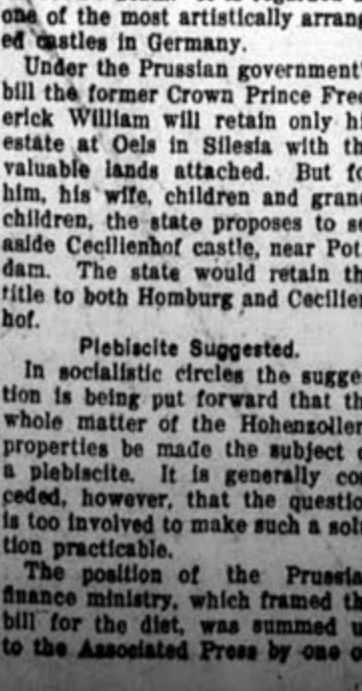
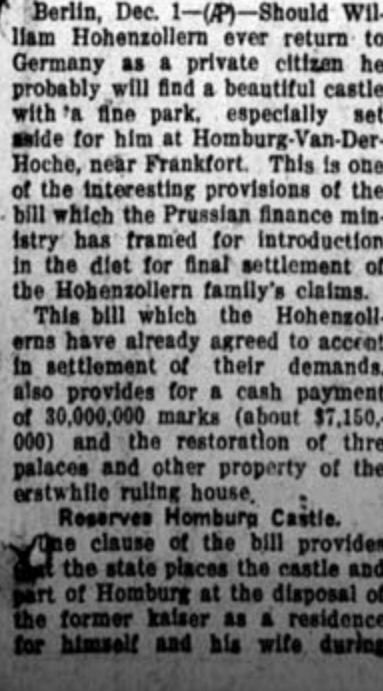
West Coast of State Is Swept by Fierce Tempest.

PEACE ERA SEEN. Paris, Dec. 1.—(P)—The signing of the Locarno pact and the arbitration treaties at London today is regarded in Paris political circles generally as ushering in a new era of peace and good will among European men and nations.

The ordinary citizen of France, while skeptical and refusing to admit that war has been eliminated from future generations, holds the belief that a great step has been made toward an entente between Germany and France and that the relations between the two countries are more friendly now than at any time since 1870.

Ironwood Ranked With the Best in Lower State.

Detroit, Dec. 1.—(P)—Although on three high school teams are the claimants of the state championship, there are six teams that have gone through the season without a defeat.

Two teams finished the season with perfect records, winning all their games and keeping their goal lines uncrossed. These are Grand Rapids Union and Port Huron.

Detroit Northwestern, Ironwood and Battle Creek finished the season without a defeat. Northwestern was scored upon but once, that being by Mt. Clemens, but it was held to a scoreless tie by Highland Park.

Ironwood has not been defeated since the middle of the 1922 season. It was held to a scoreless tie in the first game of the present season by Superior, Wis. The absence from the line-up in this game of John Cavosie, Ironwood's amazing fullback, is blamed for this draw. Ironwood scored 212 points this season to none for its seven foes.

Battle Creek, playing with green material and under a new coach, surprised its friends by finishing its season unbeaten. The Creek, however, were tied by Arthur Hill and Ann Arbor, and won from Bloom, 6 to 3, by a touchdown.

CHIVALRY LED HIM TO MURDER

New York Boy Kills Chum to "Get Even" for Remark.

New York, Dec. 1.—(P)—Neither an abnormal "irresistible impulse," to kill nor jealousy, but a distorted sense of chivalry aroused by resentment over a slur upon a girl's character, stirred Gordon Pirie, 20, to hack his chum, George Nye, 19, to death with an axe according to his second confession made public tonight.

Pirie first laid the slaying to a sudden "irresistible impulse." Then he recanted that confession, and District Attorney McGehean, of the Bronx, intimated he had confessed he was prompted by jealousy.

After chopping his sleeping friend to death, Pirie told police he shoved the body under his sister's bed and fled. In the interim before he surrendered, he said, he had been riding about the city and taking a girl to the movies with money he had stolen from his chum's clothing after the slaying.

25 to 35 Cents Jump on Flour per Barrel

New York, Dec. 1.—(P)—An advance of 25 to 35 cents a barrel in the price of flour today accompanied the sharp rise in wheat prices. Quotations for spring wheat patent flour reached \$9 to \$9.25 a barrel, virtually the high level for the season and 75 cents above that of a month ago. Having resisted the rising trend in the market for several weeks, jobbers found their stocks at low ebb and bought on a fairly large scale.

3 U. S. Destroyers Leave for Shanghai

Manila, Dec. 2.—(P)—Three more American destroyers left here today for Shanghai owing to the threatening conditions in China. The destroyer McCormick left Manila on Saturday last for Shanghai. At the time it was said three more destroyers were being held in readiness should it be decided to send reinforcements.

Rotherdam—Charges are made that wild drinking parties have been held in a Ministry of Pensions sanatorium. It has also been customary, according to allegations, for nurses and officers, who have rooms on the same floor, to stage drinking parties in each others' rooms on this night.

Tacna-Arica Affair Received by League

Geneva, Dec. 1.—(P)—The Tacna-Arica affair between Chile and Peru, regarded here as the Alsace-Lorraine problem of South America, suddenly entered the portal of the league of nations today, when Senor Valdes Mendeville, Chilean minister at Berne, presented a memorandum to Sir Eric Drummond, secretary-general which is considered a protest against General Pershing for retarding the holding of a plebiscite in the two South American provinces.

The memorandum declares that General Pershing has perhaps been placed in an erroneous position by reports furnished by his experts or American observers who "speaking little Spanish and being insufficiently acquainted with the internal conditions of South American life or the diplomatic proceedings of Peru, are incapable of judging the situation."

The object of Senor Valdes Mendeville in presenting the memorandum is not clear, as Chile has apparently made no formal appeal to the league of nations on this controversy. It came up in the league several years ago at the instance of Peru acted, as it was believed, the South American countries preferred to handle the problem by themselves.

57 IS DETROIT TRAFFIC TOLL

November Auto Tragedies Exceed All Past Records.

Detroit, Dec. 1.—(P)—Fifty-seven persons died during November from injuries received in traffic accidents in Detroit, according to statistics made public today by the accident investigation bureau of the police department.

Of this number 36 were men, nine women and 12 children. It was the greatest number of deaths from such causes in one month in the history of the city.

The only month to compare with November was April of last year, when 34 were killed. The total gives nearly an average of two deaths a day for the month.

Nature of Accidents. Thirty-six of the deaths were the result of injuries received when the persons were struck by automobiles; three died after collisions between cars; two after automobiles turned over; one after his automobile was struck by a train; eight after they were hit by street cars; four as a result of collisions between automobiles and street cars; one because he drove his car into a traffic tower; one because he fell off the step of a street car; and one after he was struck by a train.

In one family of 12 children, they all have names beginning with "L." The names are Lenora, Lydia, Lulu, Laura, Lee, Lemuel, Lillian, Luther, Louis, Lucille, Lester and Lawrence.

Surviving besides the widow are three children, Mrs. Leonard Gardner, Mrs. Joseph Choinard and Fred Gamlin, all of Danforth.

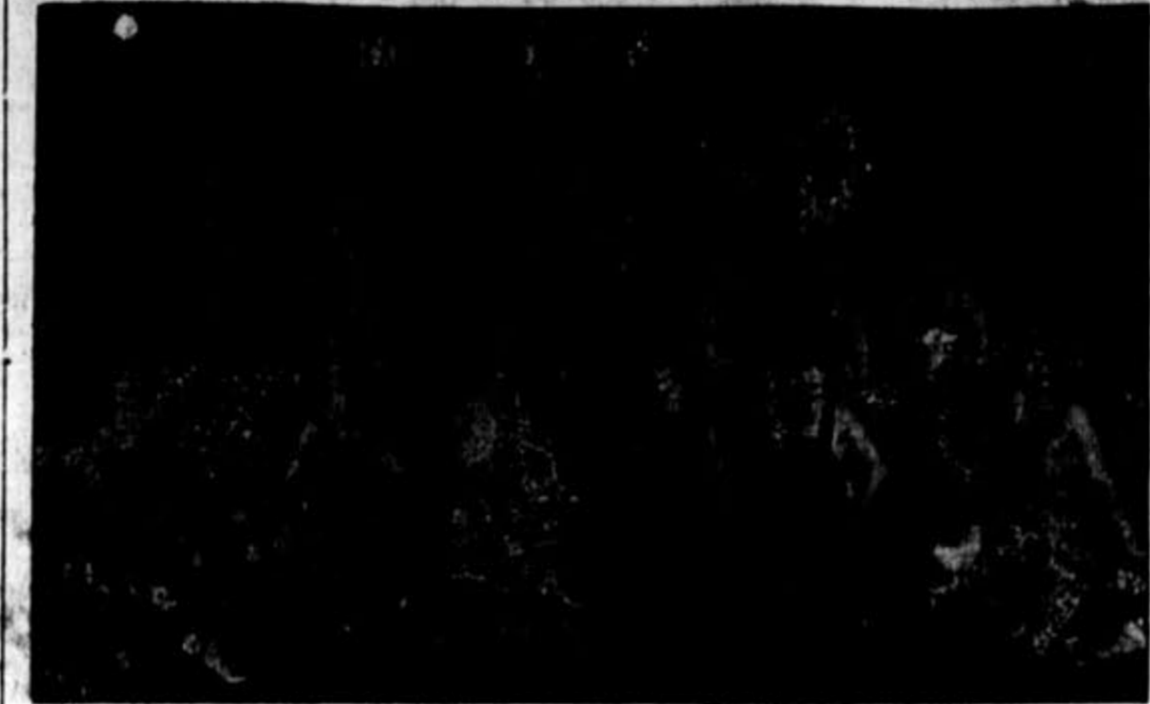

This system, which has been in effect for more than a year, had worked wonderfully well from a standpoint of efficiency and help to the needy as well as along the lines of economy, Joseph Greenfield, city welfare commissioner, declares.

STATE INCOME TAX PROPOSED

Lansing, Dec. 1.—(AP)—A state income tax and the retention by the state of all revenues derived from the gasoline and weight taxes were the suggestions offered to the special tax committee of the League of Michigan Municipalities by former Rep. Peter B. Lennon, of Genesee county, here today.

Admitting that public sentiment is against the income tax plan, Mr. Lennon offered other suggestions for tax relief. He advocated a taxation limit of two per cent on real property. Farm values have decreased 40 per cent since 1920, although assessed values are as high as ever, he declared. He charged that there have been "more wild expenditures, downright waste, and extravagance" in road building than in any other function of the state government. The speaker proposed that the Michigan congressional delegation be urged to seek legislation to permit the return of at least 20 per cent of the federal income tax to the states. He demanded the abolition of tax exemption for bonds and asked the repeal of the mortgaged law.

VENISON GUARD ENDING VIGIL

Bridge Watchers Will Be Relieved in Few Days.

The constant guard maintained by the Michigan conservation department on the bridges and gateways leading out of Michigan into Wisconsin, will be relaxed within a few days, it was announced here yesterday. The guards have turned back all motorists who attempted to transport deer out of the state by automobile.

The inspectors have been taking six-hour shifts and have been looking over every automobile which passed. Scores of hunters carrying venison in their cars have been forced to turn around and ship their meat by express.

How many deer were killed in the peninsula during the hunting season will never be known, exactly, but estimates, based on express company and Mackinac ferry records, probably will be available within a short time.

Guesses vary but it seems to be the opinion of a large number of observers that the kill this year was larger than that of any season on record.

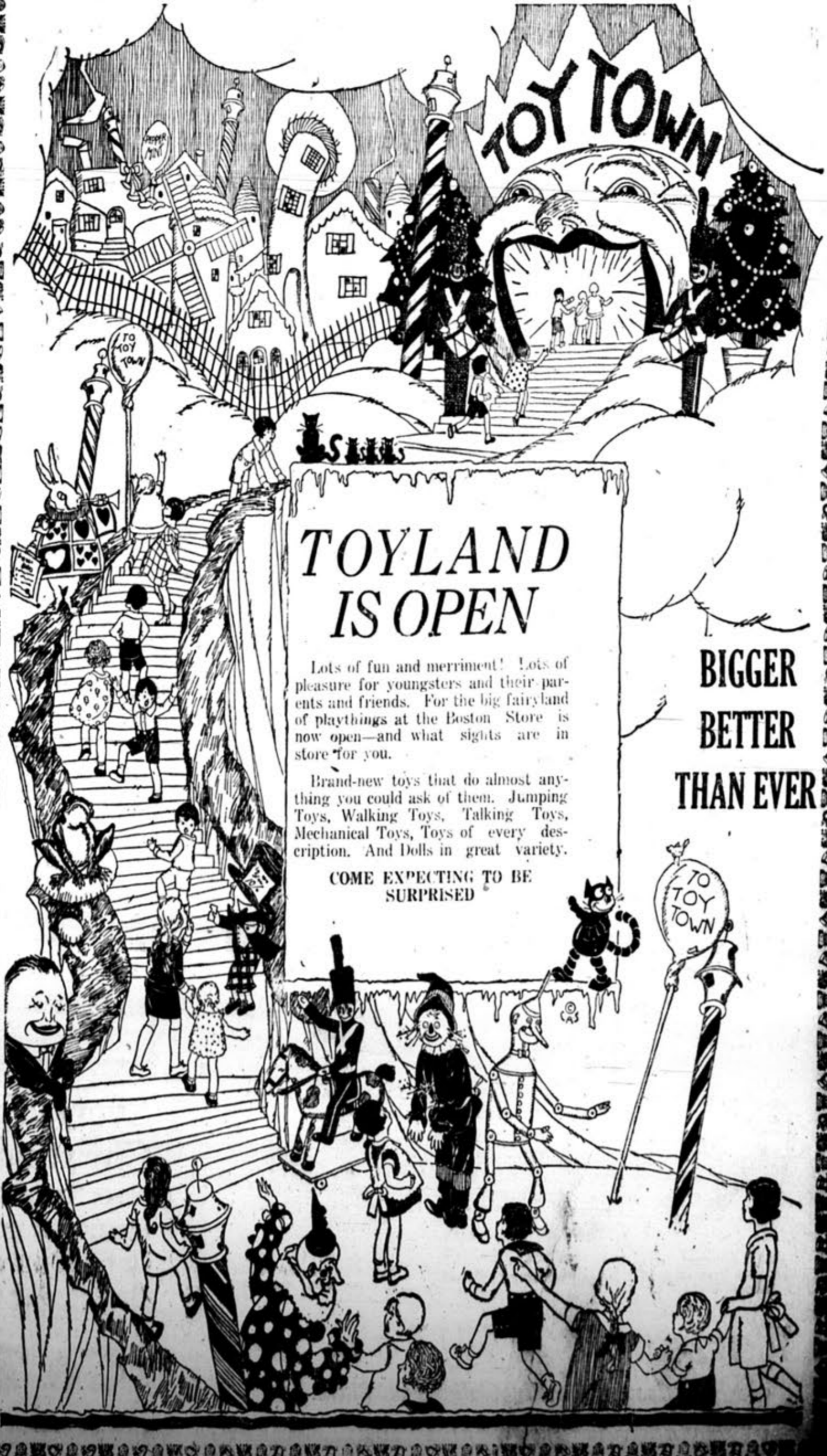

New York, Dec. 1.—(AP)—Stock prices displayed a distinctly better tone in today's market which was featured by a resumption of bullish operation in a number of rails, oils and selected specialties.

Wheat prices advanced in all the leading markets of the world in reaction of lower Russian crop estimates and reports of unfavorable weather in Argentina.

Speculative belief that legislation of a constructive character bearing on railroad constructions will be enacted by congress which opens next week, stimulated the demand for the carriers.

Further weakness cropped out, however, in the motors. Chrysler showed a net loss of 25.8 at 186 1/4, after fluctuating between 184 and 189 1/4, and Mack Trucks, Willys-Overland preferred, Stomberg, Carburetor and Hudson closed one to 1/2 points lower.

Foreign exchanges displayed a reactionary tone. French francs broke about ten points to 3.90 cents on selling inspired by the announcement of the new fiscal program of the Briand cabinet.

Chicago Livestock. Chicago, Dec. 1.—Cattle, receipts 16,000. Fat steers, dull, mostly 15 at 25c lower; practically all grades showing decline; stockers and feeders and lower grade killing steers advanced; top at noon 12.40 paid for 1,455 pound bullocks; some held higher; fat stock weak to 1/2c lower; hogs and cutters around steady; Bologna hogs and steady to strong; bulk veal to packers, 10.50 at 11.00.

POTATOES SHOW
NICE GAIN IN
THE PENINSULA

That the farmers of the Upper Peninsula are becoming more efficient in raising potatoes is shown in a comparison of the census figures of 1920 and 1924. During that period the acreage, on account of low potato prices, dropped from 17,401 to 14,568, a decrease of 1,833 acres. At the same time the production raised from 1,632,116 to 1,788,225 bushels, or an increase of 156,109. Figured in averages the 1920 planting produced 92.7 bushels to the acre, while in 1924 the average was 114.9, an increase of 21.2 bushels per acre. While the favorable season of 1924 had some effect, the main reasons for the improvement, according to authorities on potato growing, are improvement in seed selection, cultural methods, and in keeping the crop free from disease. In this way farmers have received a greater return for their labor in this crop.

On account of the higher price of potatoes this winter, acreage in 1926 will no doubt be greatly increased. Only a bad season will keep the crop from being so large that low prices will result. Improved methods, such as are generally being adopted will bring greater labor return even with lower prices.
