

HOUSE APPROVES ITALIAN DEBT PACT

CONGRESS MAY DEMAND FACTS IN AIR FIGHT

WILBUR MOFFATT ABOUT ATTRACTING INTEREST.

Washington, Jan. 14.—Colonel Mitchell has been silenced but the best argument that has yet been furnished for a separate air service, or at least an opportunity for the air service to express itself, has been furnished in the controversy between the secretary of the navy, Mr. Wilbur, and the chief of the Bureau of Naval Aeronautics, Rear Admiral Moffatt.

Mr. Wilbur, leaning on the report of the general naval board which has insisted on a right along that the battleship should be given preference in all appropriations, now has indicated that he does not favor building dirigibles at the expense of battleships.

It's the same old story of one branch of a service refusing to grant the other branch anything that would interfere with its own appropriations. In these days of Coolidge economy, it had to get money anyhow for military and naval defense so the naval men generally feel justified in arguing that what funds are available should be spent for battleships and naval craft.

Mr. Wilbur's opinion that the dirigible is of minor military value might be open to debate by the chief of the Bureau of Naval Aeronautics but under the present system, Rear Admiral Moffatt cannot take his case to the public without being guilty of insubordination. He must accept the dictum of his superior officer.

COPELAND REQUESTS PRESIDENT TO ACT.

Washington, Jan. 15.—(AP)—With members of congress continuing today to interest themselves in the anthracite situation, the White House made it clear that President Coolidge proposes to maintain his hands-off policy.

While the president's position was being restated officially, Senator Copeland, Democrat, New York, offered a resolution requesting the president to act and gave notice that he would call the measure up tomorrow with a view to obtaining "early action."

At the White House, it was explained that the president considered the federal government powerless to help in the situation, at least until congress enacts legislation empowering it to act in industrial disputes.

The Coolidge resolution conveys no grant of power; it simply asks that the president "to take whatever steps are necessary and proper to bring about an immediate resumption of anthracite coal mining."

State Fights Move To Alter Coal Rates From Pittsburgh

Lansing, Jan. 15.—(AP)—A protest against reopening the interstate rate case affecting coal movements from the Pittsburgh fields to Great Lakes ports was filed with the interstate commerce commission today.

At present the differential between rates from Pittsburgh to Lake Erie points and rates from the West Virginia and Kentucky fields to Lake Erie points are near enough on a parity to permit consumers using coal supplied by lake shipment to obtain coal at about the same price from either source.

Lima Bean Soup. One cup dried lima beans, 5 cups cold water, 1 medium-sized onion, 4 tablespoons minced carrot, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 1/2 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon pepper.

Ice cream of any preferred flavor is put between two thin pieces of sponge cake or angel food.

The whole is masked with whipped cream of a chocolate sauce if vanilla ice cream makes the filling of the "sandwich."

One cup granulated sugar, 1 cup dark brown sugar, 1 cup butter and lard combined, 5 cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 3 eggs, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 tablespoon sour milk, 2 teaspoons vanilla.

Filling—One cup chopped figs, 1-2 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 3-4 cup water, 1 teaspoon cornstarch, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1-8 teaspoon powdered cinnamon.

To make the filling mix and sift sugar and cornstarch adding a few grains of salt. Put water, lemon juice and figs into sauce pan and bring to the boiling point. Stir in sugar and cinnamon and cook, stirring constantly until thick. Let cool slightly and stir in vanilla.

To make cookies mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Add sugar and mix thoroughly.

Cook macaroni in boiling slightly salted water until tender. Drain and blanch. Peel onions and cook in boiling water until tender but not broken. Add sugar when onions are half done. Drain and cut in halves. Melt butter, stir in flour and slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Season with salt and pepper and bring to the boiling point.

The family who are not physically busy during the morning hours will not want the sausage and buckwheat cakes suggested for breakfast but the boy or girl who will be out of doors will find the meal most satisfying.

Is Also to Be Preferred to Business Life.

San Francisco—It is wonderful to be a leader in society. And it is satisfying to have a place of power in the business world.

But best of all is the lot of a woman who has several fine children.

This is the conclusion of Mrs. C. S. Drennan, formerly a New Orleans society woman and now a smiling engineer of considerable eminence.

"I wish I could talk personally to every woman in the world who says that she is being kept from a career by a number of children tied to her apron strings," she says. "I would tell all such women that—"

"The society butterfly's life is an empty one at best. And the business woman's life is a sordid one at best."

Knows All There. "I know the society world and I know the business world, and believe me, nothing would make me happier than to be the mother of several fine children."

It has been seven years since Mrs. Drennan forsook the lid

southern mansion in New Orleans of which she had been mistress and went into the world for a career. She has traveled all over the world since then, prospecting for oil, gold and silver, investigating mining projects, launching companies and interviewing mill-liners mining men.

And after these seven years of experience, she declares: "American business men are the most courteous in the world—and I've been in Europe, South America, Mexico and Asia."

"I have been the only woman in the roughest of mining camps and never have I been insulted. Men are anxious to place a woman on a pedestal, and it is she herself who decides whether she will tumble off."

But Mrs. Drennan hasn't quite such nice things to say about American women.

"The average American girl is a lazy person," she asserts. "She doesn't know why she's here and she doesn't care. Her principal concern is wheedling a fur coat out of her husband."

"In fact, a failure." Mrs. Drennan emphatically denies that a woman need lose any of her charm by entering business.

Needn't Be Mannish. "It isn't necessary to be 'mannish' to be a success in business," she says. "When a woman loses

her femininity she loses everything. "I am the same woman now that I was seven years ago. I meet men on the same basis that I met them in my social affairs. I have refused to wear 'mannish' clothes. I haven't bobbed my hair. I don't even roll my stockings."

The business world brings many interesting and valuable experiences, she holds—much more so than a society "career"—"But still," she concludes, "how much more wonderful it would be to be the mother of some fine children."

TAX MEASURE IS HURRIED ON

Bill Is Certain to Get Right of Way in Senate.

Washington, Jan. 15—(AP)—Working at full speed, the senate finance committee brought its work on the house tax reduction bill up to a point today which will permit final action on it tomorrow.

Chairman Smoot ordered several approved sections of the bill sent to the printers, and announced he would attempt to have the measure presented to the senate by Wednesday and taken up on the floor a day or two later.

Leaders of both parties have given assurance that the measure will be given right of way in the senate and have announced they will press for early action to assure tax reduction by March 15, when first income tax installments are due.

Passing over the inheritance and gift taxes, the only remaining rate schedules in the bill to be considered the committee disposed of a number of technical phases of the measure today. Provisions of the house bill

continuing the board of tax appeals with a membership of 16 members with increased salaries was approved, but it was decided to limit the appointments to 10 years instead of 14.

Terms of the house bill requiring that appeals be filed with the board were amended to give taxpayers the alternative of filing with the board on a court. A motion to extend jurisdiction of the board to cases under the 1913 act was rejected.

Co-op Ass'n's Exempted. The committee agreed to an amendment assuring exemption of income on profits of cooperative marketing associations when 85 per cent of their business is transacted on behalf of members.

Provisions of the house bill allowing refunds of the difference between the present and new taxes to automobiles and car dealers for stocks on hand 30 days after the law becomes effective were approved.

HARBORS ASS'N MEETING ENDS

Will Appeal to Attorney General to Stop Water "Steal".

Detroit, Jan. 15—(AP)—Crytallization of opinion into a decision to make a concerted attack on the diversion of water from the Great Lakes by the Chicago drainage canal featured the closing session of the Great Lakes Harbors association meeting here today.

An appeal will be taken to the attorney general of the United States in an effort to obtain "immediate action" on the part of the government to stop the water diversion, it was announced.

During the two days' session of the association, speakers denounced the diversion of water

by the Chicago sanitary district in terms that ranged from former Secretary of War Newton D. Baker's characterization of the action as "human but illogical," to a statement by William George Bruce, president of the association, commenting on the fact that Chicago had no representative at the meeting, that "Chicago is a thief in the night and afraid to show its face in the light of day."

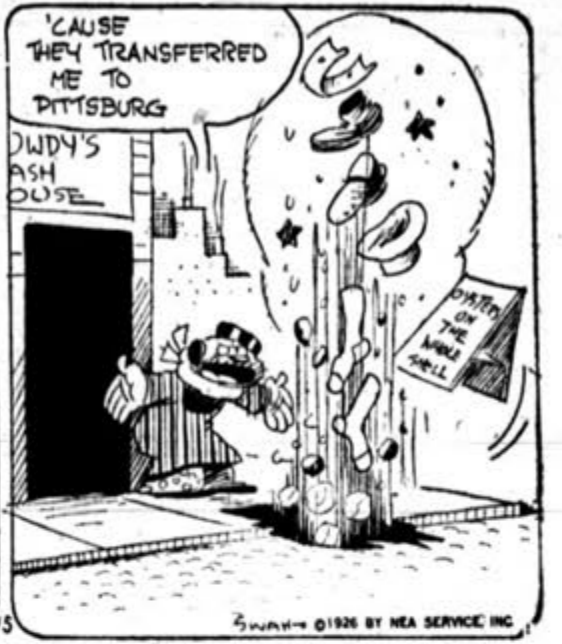

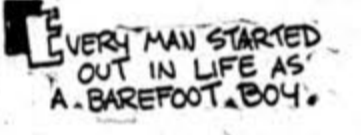

WINGED AUTOS ARE PROPOSED

Frenchman believes them Only Solution to Traffic Problem.

BY ISRAEL KLEIN

Winged automobiles may be our salvation from the traffic and touring evils of today.

Winged automobiles may be parked in a garage of modern dimensions, but that could spread its wings and planes and fly off undisturbed by the slowness and thickness of traffic.

Such is the probability for future touring as foreseen by Louis Breguet, one of the foremost leaders of aviation in France.

Such flying auto has been conceived before, but never with such completeness and certainty as that of Breguet. This authority has actually drawn plans for the winged auto of tomorrow, and has described its possibilities almost to the slightest detail.

Description of Car. The car itself looks more like an airplane than an auto, with horizontal and vertical planes in the rear, forming rudder and elevators, a propeller in front and a triple folding wing, designed to rotate during flight and act as a stabilizer just as the wings of airplanes do today.

The two front wheels are connected directly to the motor, as is also the propeller in front. But while one is in use, the other is shut off.

There's only one more wheel in this winged auto of Louis Breguet's, and that's in the rear to steer the car while it is on the ground.

There may be room enough in such machine for five persons, just as there is in the modern sedan. In fact the car is designed as a small sedan, with four doors.

The length of the entire car, wings and all, would be about 25 feet, although the wings could be folded back over one another, to permit of parking in a 20-foot garage. The width of the car, with the horizontal planes in the rear folded, up would be about 72 inches, and its height 10 feet.

It's Sort of Compromise. Thus does Louis Breguet vision the future auto. He doesn't want to go to one extreme or the other—of the touring airplane or the small automobile. But he forms a compromise so that a tourist can soar through the air at high speed when he travels between towns and settle to the ground when he reaches his destination.

In this flying auto appears the solution to the many problems attending the traffic today—of parking, congestion, cross traffic and delays. Parking can be effected on rooftops. Motorists intending to go from one end of town to the other would fly and thus avoid the delay and congestion that awaits him nowadays in the busy center of town.

There's a possibility, in Breguet's design, of adopting the winged auto for direct upward flight, as are many attempts at helical flying today. But this designer doesn't attempt that plan, believing the modern auto could very well attain height by running along the road already made for it, and could settle in the same way. This would, at the same time, avoid installation of a distinct mechanism necessary to lift the machine.

The idea of departing and arriving on rooftops, however, points to the possibility of adding the helical planes to such a machine as Breguet's, instead of the "gyro-planes" he has designed.

"Prisoner Song" Is Popular With State Radio Fans

Detroit.—(AP)—Those radio fans who crave to hear the "Prisoner's Song," or "Down by the Winnegar Works," and who, like the baby in the advertisements, won't be satisfied until they get them, will have an easier time hereafter by reason of an innovation of Station WCX, the Detroit Free Press station. In the studio of this station, atop the Book-Cadillac hotel, there have been installed telegraph wires to facilitate the receipt of telegraphic requests for particular numbers from radio listeners-in.

So far as known, this is the first station in the country to offer this service.

Use of the wires was intended particularly for the "sessions" of the Red Apple club, a regular Tuesday night feature devoted almost entirely to the singing and playing of request numbers. The wires also will be available for requests made to WJR, the Jewett station, which broadcasts from the same studios and which devotes its "Jewett Jesters" programs to request numbers.

Hundreds of requests for particular melodies are received by all local stations nightly—by letter, by telegraph and by telephone. The nature of the many requests, however, is largely the same.

The "Prisoner's Song," at present is riding the crest of popular demand. Listeners-in beg for this number, varying their pleas sometimes by specifying its rendition by particular artists. The "Winnegar Works" song, reciting its story of the "tough guy" who lives in a section where it is necessary to chain up the children so they won't bite the dogs, is a second-place favorite. "Brown Eyes, Why Are You Blue" gets the call at most stations, broadcasting dance tunes.

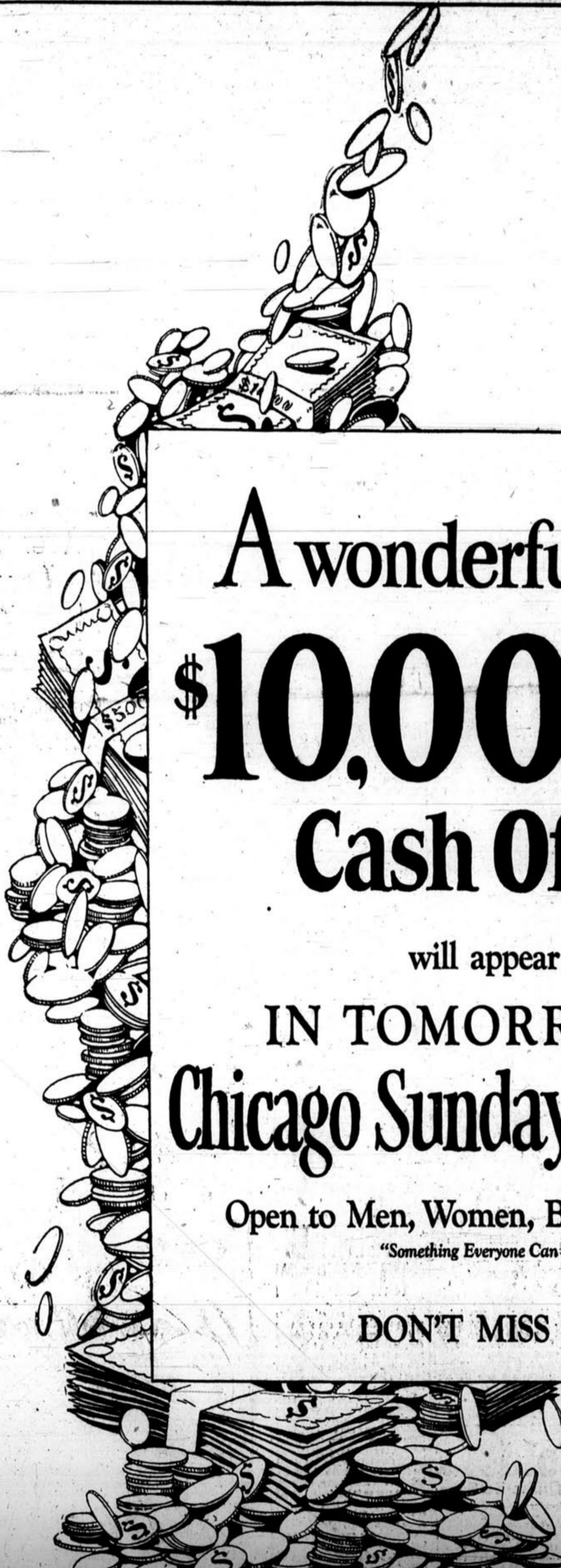
