

The Aircraft Development Cor-28 Minneapolis. 11 poration of Detroit has been negotiating with the navy department for 28 New Orleans 46 some time for construction of an all-metal dirigible to cost about \$700,000, of which the government, under the plan, would provide \$300,-000.

The house naval appropriations sub-committee, in its recent report on the department's annual supply bill, indicated that it favored construction of such a dirigible, suggesting that \$300,000 could be provided through economies resulting from the proposed closing of the Lakehurst, N., J., air station. If built, the craft would not be considered a replacement of the Shenandoah, but as an experimental step to ascertain the practicability of all-metal construction.

ing pan. Add onion peeled and cut in thin slices. Cook over a low fire for five minutes. Add tomatoes and sprinkle over rice which has been well washed. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cover closely and cook slowly for one hour. The amount of salt must be determined by the fat used. Sally bacon fat will re-

quire less salt than butter. After the rice absorbs the moisture from the tomatoes it will be necessary to stir the mixture occasionally to prevent burning.
