PRICES DECLINE IN STOCKMART

New York, Mar. 2.—(AP)—In one of the most demoralizing stock market sessions in recent years, prices broke 10 to 15 points today in another gigantic liquidating movement of weakened speculative accounts.

All groups of stocks participated in the reaction, indicating that the recent violent declines in speculative issues had necessitated the selling of high-grade investment stocks. It was the fourth consecutive day of sharp declining prices during which the average of 20 leading industrial issues has fallen nearly 6 1/2 points and the average of 20 leading railroad issues has fallen nearly 4 1/2 points.

As on preceding days the reaction was not associated with anything in the day's news. The adverse decision of the Interstate Commerce Commission on the proposed "Nickel Plate" merger was not announced until about an hour after the stock market had closed, and so far as is known was a distinct surprise to Wall Street generally as rumors had been current for days, that the merger would be approved, perhaps with certain modifications in the original plan.

A wide open break in Hudson Motors which dropped from an early high of 120 1/2 to 105, featured the last hour's trading. So swift was the decline in this stock, and so far behind the market was the ticker, that word was flashed around to brokerage houses that the stock was selling on the floor at 108, when it was quoted at 115 1/2 under the wheel of the ticker.

Several other motors and accessories were also hard hit. Pierce Arrow preferred dropped 7 1/2 points to \$6 1/2. Hupp Motors 7 1/2 to 17. Stewart Warner Speedometer 7 to 7 1/2, and Mack Trucks, Dodge Brothers common, and Nash Motors sold off 4 to 5 points.

A drastic shake-out also took place in the public utilities, net losses of 2 to nearly 10 points being recorded by American Express, American Foreign Power, Brooklyn Manhattan Transit, Electric Power & Light, Lake Erie National Power & Light, North American Company, Public Service Company of New Jersey, Standard Gas & Electric, United Railways Investment preferred and West Penn Company.

Practically all the leading industrial and railroad issues sagged to new low levels for the year during the session. United States Steel common dropped from 124 1/2 to 120 and then rallied to 122, or 1 1/2 points below the price at which the stock recently was offered to employees under the corporation's annual partial payment plan of purchase.

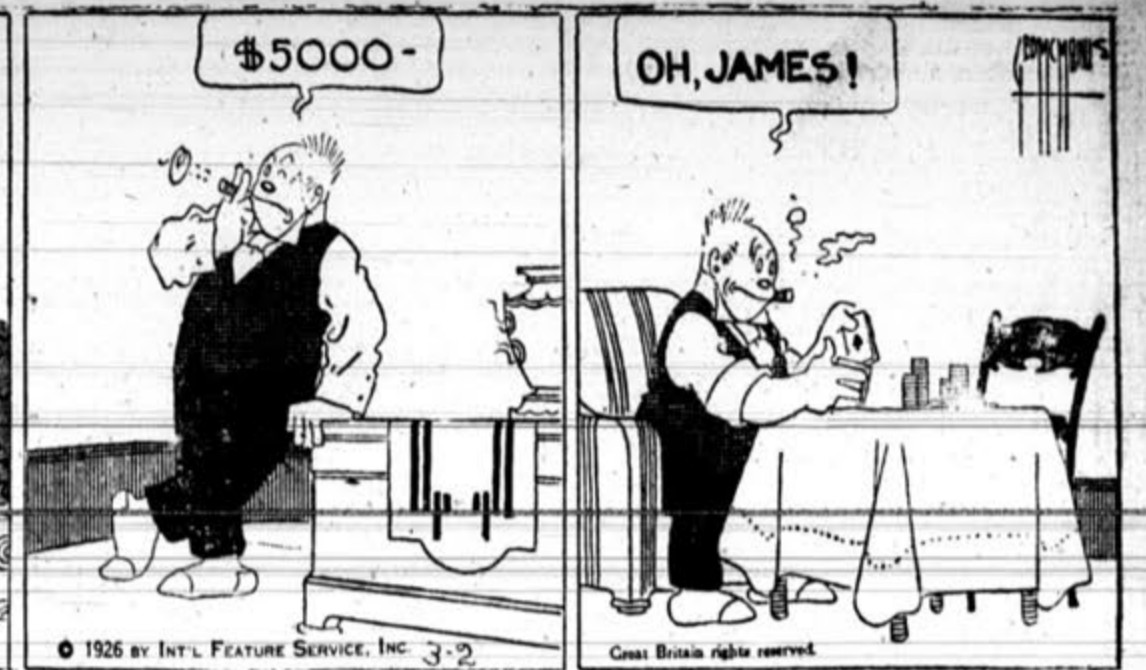

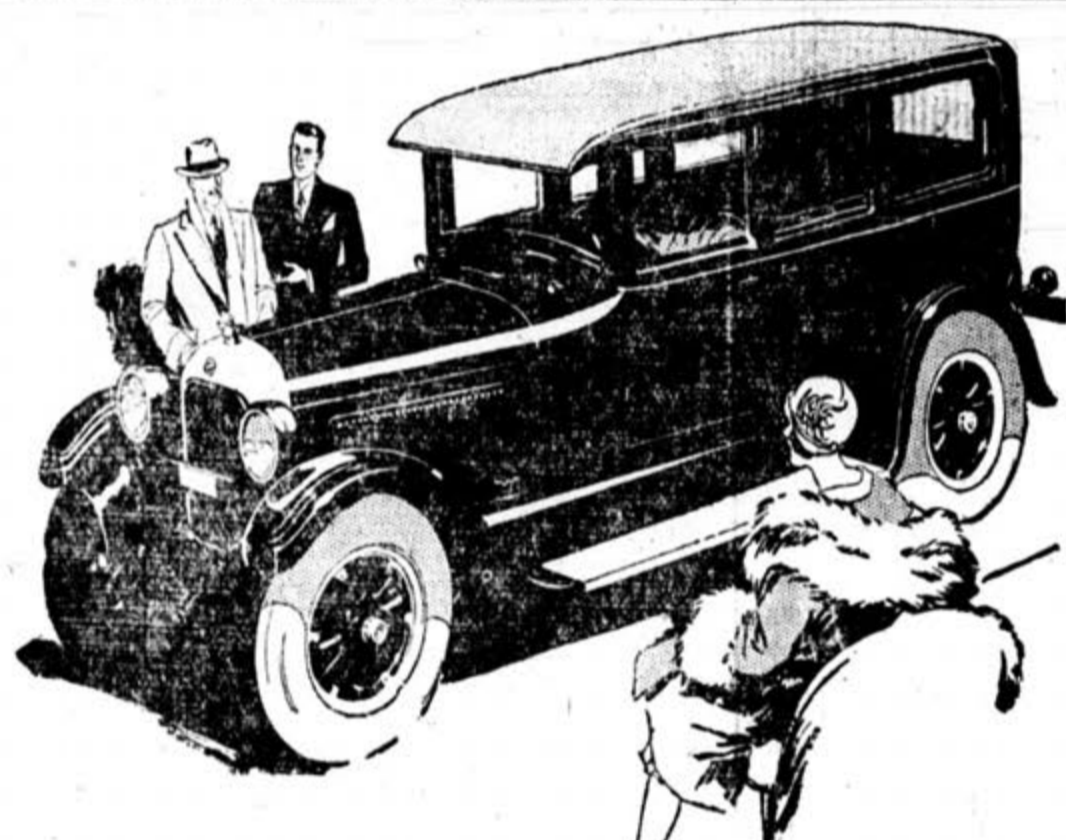

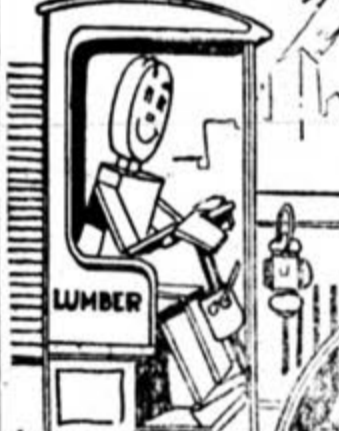
