Two Thirds of Radio Stations of World Located in U. S. A.

Washington—Radio broadcasting stations throughout the world total 803, nearly two-thirds of which are in the United States. A census made by the department of commerce, which has jurisdiction over commercial radio in this country, showed that there now are 533 licensed broadcasters in the United States, as against only 270 stations for the remainder of the world.

Through a gradual weeding out process of stations which were operating only intermittently and for no particular reason, the number in this country is decreasing.

Canada, with 52 broadcasting stations, stands second to the United States. The recent radio boom in Spain has placed that country in third place with 22 stations, while the United Kingdom and France have 20 and 19 stations respectively.

Figures of the other leading countries in order, are Mexico 18 stations; Germany, Brazil and Sweden, 15 each; Cuba and Australia 13 each and Argentina 7.

Visitors to the telephone office will witness the actual operation of the service, the operation of the switchboards for the handling of local, rural and long distance messages and the functioning of the intricate plant equipment. An average of 15,000 local and 225 toll or long distance telephone calls are handled from the Escanaba central office each 24 hours, meaning 456,750 per month, Manager Sundquist states.

Volcanoes Not Responsible for Alaskan Climate

Washington—The weather bureau takes no stock in suggestions that volcanic activity in the Alaskan territory have caused the recent high temperatures there.

Instead, the bureau declares a peculiar layout of atmospheric pressure has brought warm ocean winds to Alaska and has deflected down through Canada and cold waves that usually pass over the Alaskan-Siberian sector.

NEW LAW WILL BE EMPLOYED

Baird Coming to Review "Pearson Law" Application.

The eligibility of 44 parcels of land in Delta county to the benefits of the "Pearson Act" will be reviewed here April 1 by John Baird, director of the state conservation commission, it is announced by Mr. Baird in an advertisement appearing in The Press this morning.

It is the first time the act has been employed in this county.

The law was passed by the last Michigan legislature to encourage reforestation. It provides that owners of lands which have been cut over, and which have no agricultural or recreational value except for growing timber, may apply to the state for permission to designate the tracts as forest preserves.

The taxes on such preserves are five to ten cents an acre. After fifteen years the owner may cut the timber which has been produced and the state takes a commission from the proceeds.

The hearings will be held at the Delta county courthouse.

Of the Members of Parliament elected last autumn nearly 100 have still to make their maiden speeches in the House of Commons.

SINGLE WORD KEEPS WOMEN OUT OF OFFICE

Oklahoma Women Cannot Hold High State Offices

Oklahoma City, Okla.—Women political leaders in Oklahoma are praying for a legal miracle—the only thing apparently that can make them eligible as candidates for major state offices at the election in November.

One little word in the state constitution—male—estops them from holding eight of the most important offices: Governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, state treasurer, secretary of state and state examiner and inspector.

Two futile attempts have been made to remove the word from the constitution. The first, a referendum vote on an amendment was believed for nearly two years to be successful. The second, a popular petition asking for re-submission of the amendment to the voters, failed for lack of signatures.

Women champions of the amendment have retained an attorney who is now briefing the case in an attempt to learn its status and if possible to establish its validity through judicial channels.

The amendment was adopted by a substantial majority when it was submitted at a special election called by former Gov. J. C. Walton in October, 1923. In August, 1925, Miss Una Lee Roberts, assistant secretary of state, made the discovery that the constitution had not been changed. She hastily conferred with male state officials who informed her that the adoption had not been legal. Legislative resolutions submitting proposed constitutional amendments to the people must be adopted by at least a two-

thirds majority of both houses. The women's amendment failed by a few votes to receive this majority.

The women did not take the amendment into the courts because the supreme court had declared void another amendment involving the same questions.

They did, however, attempt to bring it to a referendum vote again by the circulation of petitions. The number of signatures required was nearly 80,000 and the effort failed.

Unless the proposed amendment can be voted on in the August primaries, women candidates will be barred from running from major offices in the general election.

ST. PAUL URGED TO SPEED WORK

Utilities Commission Takes Steps to Hasten Decision.

The state utilities commission has urged the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railway to hasten its final decision on the matter of widening the span of the "St. Paul" over-docks over North Sheridan Road.

The commission, on application of the city, held a hearing on the matter about a year ago. No decision was handed down for the reason that a three-party agreement for widening the span was worked out, the interested parties being the city, the state highway commission and the railway company.

The city and the state have agreed, definitely, to proceed under this agreement. Railway officials, however, who sat in at these conferences, could do no more than recommend acceptance by the receivers of the road. The plans are now in the receivers' hands for approval.

It is generally agreed that the improvement is necessary to public safety and should be completed before ore traffic begins in the spring. The delay occasioned by the un-

raveling of "St. Paul" red tape has begun to make city and state highway departments fretful.

The interest of the utilities commission in the St. Paul's decision indicates that if the railway company does not get busy very quickly, a formal order may be issued.

It was hinted. In that case, the commission would assess the costs among the interested parties.
