

M. BRIAND ANNOUNCES 9TH CABINET

WILL RETURN TO GENEVA AS PREMIER AGAIN

M. HERRIOT DECLINES TO FORM NEW MINISTRY.

Paris, Mar. 10.—(P)—Determined to get to Geneva with the least possible delay, M. Briand worked tirelessly for eight hours to frame a new ministry.

Herriot Declines Task. The cabinet crisis evolved rapidly today.

M. Herriot told M. Doumergue that it was necessary to send Briand back to the council and assembly of the League of Nations.

Hearings on Lakes to Ocean Canal Projects Opened

Inland Waterways Are Necessity for Middle West, Hoover Declares

Appeals for Harmonious Settlement of Lake Level Disputes.

Chicago, Mar. 9.—(P)—Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce, tonight outlined a complete inland waterway system, pointed out its economic necessity for the middle west and said he believed a nine-foot channel from Chicago to the gulf was in sight.

He addressed the 22nd annual banquet of the John Erickson Republican League of Illinois.

Secretary Hoover's prepared speech did not touch upon politics.

He pictured the middle-west as girded by a row of toll gates composed of increased rail rates, completion of the Panama canal, and maintenance of ocean freight rates at virtually pre-war levels.

Railways have reached the highest efficiency in their history, he said, and rate reductions cannot be resorted to, the Panama canal cannot be closed nor can sea rates be raised arbitrarily.

Visualizing Waterway Systems. He visualized two great inland waterway systems, the Mississippi system of modern barge lines and the Great Lakes system of ocean steamers.

Two routes for the Great Lakes to the Atlantic route, the St. Lawrence and the New York ship canal, are being investigated, he explained.

CADDIES TESTIFY AT RETRIAL OF RICH.

Mason, Mich., Mar. 9.—(P)—Concluding its rebuttal testimony with shattering contradictions of major defense points, the state rested its case in the retrial of Arthur C. Rich this afternoon and launched its plea to the jury for conviction.

House Committee Recommends Judge English's Impeachment. Illinois Jurist Charged With Misdemeanors in Office. Washington, Mar. 9.—(P)—The house judiciary committee, by a vote of 14 to 6, today recommended impeachment proceedings against Federal Judge George W. English, of the eastern Illinois district.

United States. Andrew Johnson, was tried on impeachment charges and was acquitted by one vote after a three-month trial.

Appointed by Wilson. If the house approves the committee's action, Judge English could avert trial before the senate by resigning from office.

Action of the judiciary committee was the outcome of a sweeping inquiry initiated last summer by a special house committee under a resolution introduced by Representative Harvey, Democrat, Missouri.

11 Known Dead and 8 Still Missing in Mine Explosion

Night Foreman Who Saved Nine Miners Hero of Disaster.

Eccles, W. Va., Mar. 9.—(P)—Joy over rescue of 10 men from an explosion-ton mine here tonight almost 25 hours after they had been entombed mingled in echoes with grief for the loss of 11 known dead and uncertainty of the fate of the other eight workers remaining in the mine.

Foreman Is Hero. P. J. Davis, night foreman, whose experience and coolness not only restored him to his wife and 11 children, but also saved the other nine, and who tried valiantly to save three more, was the hero of the occasion.

Sheltered by Davis, the men, who were saved, barricaded themselves almost two miles back in the mine from the deadly fumes following the explosion, and before the rescue teams could reach their point of vantage had built a wall of lumber, stones and soft mud, which experts said, would have successfully repelled the foul air indefinitely.

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LEAGUE CRISIS PRIMES SENATE FOR NEW FIGHT

GIVES FOES NEW TALKING POINTS IN COMING CAMPAIGN.

The clamor for permanent seats on the council of the league recalls the debates in Paris at the time the Versailles covenant was being drafted.

New York, Mar. 9.—(P)—Stock prices displayed a distinctly stronger undertone in today's market with buying influenced by lower money rates and a series of favorable dividend announcements.

The splendid resistance shown to selling pressure yesterday encouraged a resumption of pool operations in a few issues in which special developments are believed to be pending, but the buying was of a cautious character.

United Drug was bid up over 1/2 points to 150 1/2 on the announcement that the annual dividend rate had been increased from \$7 to \$8 a share, but eased to 149 1/2 on profit-taking.

Equipment attracted fresh buying power on official confirmation of reports that negotiations were in progress for a merger of the American Locomotive company and the Railway Steel Spring company, stock of the former closing 2 1/2 points higher at 88 1/2.

Hudson was bid up 2 points to 113 1/2, despite the reduction in prices of some of its models. Mack Trucks advanced 1 1/2 to 122 1/2 and Pierce Arrow common and preferred 1 1/2 and 2 points, respectively.

Heavy accumulation took place in a number of specialties, particularly Allied Chemical, Freeport Texas and Loft, Inc., which closed 1 to 3 1/2 points higher. Other strong spots were American Can, Air Reduction, Sears, Roebuck, Fisher Body, International Match preferred, McCrory Stores B. R. S. Schulte Stores and Stewart Warner, up 3 to nearly 6 points and Commercial Solvents A up 1 1/2.
