HOUGHTON CALL CAUSES FLURRY ACROSS OCEAN EUROPEANS CAN NOT UNDERSTAND PUBLICITY.

DAVID LAWRENCE Washington, March 22.—(AP)—Dispatches from London and Paris confirm the fact that President Coolidge has had an extraordinary conference with Alanson B. Houghton, American ambassador to Great Britain, a guest at the white house for the last several days.

The situation is complicated by the fact that Europe does not understand the newspaper system in Washington. The publication of the reports of Mr. Houghton's conference was not authorized by the government.

Mr. Houghton did not succeed in arousing European statesmen to the needs of the occasion. He has come home to tell Mr. Coolidge what he thinks should be done.

LAKE STATES SCORE POINT IN WATER ROW

SUPREME COURT REFUSES TO DISMISS CASE.

Washington, Mar. 22.—(AP)—Wisconsin and other lake states opposing the present diversion of water of Lake Michigan by the Chicago sanitary district won a skirmish in the supreme court here today in what now promises to be a protracted and spectacular battle.

The lake states replied that congress could not authorize the diversion of water from one watershed into another except to aid navigation and that any quantity withdrawn from Lake Michigan in excess of 1,000 cubic feet per second would be unlawful.

The action of the court means that it will go fully into the many phases of the controversy and that it probably will be months before there is a final decision.

The Chicago sanitary district is prepared to prove its contention that it has a legal right to withdraw water from Lake Michigan.

The procedure, as we understand it, he said, "now requires that a commissioner be appointed by the supreme court to take action in this original proceeding brought before the high court by the state of Wisconsin and the interrelated states."

BOBBED HIGH COURT TO HEAR OIL CASE

Validity of Doheny Leases to Be Decided by Supreme Court.

Washington, Mar. 22.—(AP)—The legality of the naval oil leases will be decided by the supreme court.

The controversy which started when a senate committee investigated Teapot Dome and which was injected into a presidential campaign and is now the subject of criminal proceedings in the federal courts here against Edward Doheny, Harry F. Sinclair and Albert B. Fall, was given a place before the highest court today on petition of the Doheny Pan-American Petroleum and Transport and the Pan-American Petroleum companies.

These two companies had leases under which they obtained oil from the Elk Hills naval reserve in California, and had contracts for the erection of storage tanks for the navy at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

The circuit court also held that the Doheny companies were not entitled to compensation for the storage tanks, which had cost about \$10,000,000.

NEW ELECTRIC EQUIPMENT TO BE INSTALLED

STORAGE HANDLING CAPACITY TO BE INCREASED.

Plans for the complete rebuilding and remodeling of the Escanaba Coal & Dock company's property, purchased slightly more than a year ago, immediately north of the St. Paul docks on the north shore, were announced yesterday by A. D. Carlton, of Cleveland, one of the directors of the company and coal agent for the Cleveland Cliffs Iron company.

Work is to be started immediately and it is expected that it will be fully completed by June 1. The new dock will be equipped with a Mead-Morrison, electrically operated, coal handling plant and the capacity of the dock is to be more than doubled.

To Widen Dock. The width of the present dock is to be increased by 130 feet for its entire length, providing a dock width of 250 feet. The remodeled dock will be capable of handling 150,000 tons of coal annually and will have a total actual storage capacity of 100,000 tons.

The coal dock property was purchased slightly more than a year ago by a company organized by the Cleveland Cliffs Iron company, the Escanaba & Lake Superior Railroad company and the Delta Chemical & Iron company.

The company's operations during the first year proved the necessity for the replacement of antiquated steam-operated coal handling machinery with more efficient equipment as well as the necessity for enlarging the dock.

When plans now perfected are completely carried out the company will have one of the largest and most efficiently equipped coal docks at the head of the lakes.

DRYS BEATEN IN NEW YORK LEGISLATURE

STATE ENFORCEMENT BILL DEFEATED IN SENATE.

Albany, N. Y., Mar. 22.—(AP)—An effort to restore to the statute books a state prohibition enforcement act was defeated in the senate tonight by a vote of 27 to 24, five Republicans joined the full Democratic membership in opposing the enforcement measure, known as the Wales bill.

The senate chamber was packed with legislators and the public. The announcement of the vote brought a wave of applause from the men's gallery and scattering applause from the women's gallery opposite.

FARM RELIEF BILL FAVORED

House Agriculture Body Approves Sections of Measure.

Washington, Mar. 22.—(AP)—The middle western farm relief delegation, beginning today the third week of testimony before the house agriculture committee, heard kinder words for its surplus crop bill than at any time since the hearings started.

Mr. Rubeley, terming it "a pretty good bill," said he was inclined to support it, but suggested that it might be possible to eliminate one of its central features, the fee on agricultural commodities to be levied to stabilize the market and handle the surplus.

Industries at Standstill in Oil City; River Still Rising

Much Property Damage Is Done in Pennsylvania Town.

Oil City, Pa., Mar. 22.—(AP)—A steadily rising river, a drizzle of rain and a melting temperature combined tonight to throw fear into the hearts of the Oil City residents that the flood which already has driven 150 families from their homes and caused damage estimated from two and one-half to five millions of dollars, would reach a more serious stage by tomorrow.

Residents, driven from their homes by the rapidly rising water, were being cared for by friends, the Salvation Army and the Red Cross.

Oil Line Broken. An additional menace was discovered tonight when it was found on oil line crossing Oil Creek had broken, adding danger of an oil fire.

The flood, generally admitted the worst ever experienced in this section, assumed disastrous proportions this afternoon when a new movement of ice in the Allegheny river sent Oil Creek up from five to seven feet within ten minutes.

FLOOD NEAR LANSING.

Lansing, Mar. 22.—(AP)—Although no serious damage has been reported thus far, flood waters today inundated low areas near Lansing and caused several families to desert their homes.

The river stood at 11 feet tonight. A crest of 13 feet is looked for tomorrow, following which the river is expected to start receding.

SAGINAW BOY, 8, SAVES BABY Carries Child for Block Over Treacherous Ice in River.

Saginaw, Mich., Mar. 22.—(AP)—Ten persons miraculously escaped drowning here Monday night when two houseboats were forced from their moorings in the Saginaw river by breaking ice.

The child-uncle who heroically rescued the infant was Charles McKinney, Jr., the mother of the baby was Mrs. Arthur Sauve and the lad who was hurried into the river from the boat was Everett McKinney. Mr. and Mrs. Charles McKinney and three of their children, Margaret, Leo and Arthur, and Jack Lenon, the son of relatives, were those rescued by the firemen and police.

Engineer Killed in Train Wreck

Buffalo, N. Y., Mar. 22.—(AP)—The engineer of train No. 6 on the Nickel Plate road, Chicago to Buffalo, was killed today when the train was derailed at Athol Springs, 10 miles west of here.

EACH FACTION GIVEN 6 DAYS TO SHOW CASE

OPEN HEARINGS ARE VOTED IN SENATE COMMITTEE.

Washington, Mar. 22.—(AP)—The prohibition issue, which has agitated both houses of congress at this session, is to be given a public airing before a senate committee during the two weeks beginning April 5.

This was determined upon today by the senate judiciary committee which approved with a single dissenting vote the program recommended by its subcommittee of five for hearing on the pending measures for modification of the dry laws.

Means to Have Charge. Senator Means, Republican, Colorado, will have charge of the hearings and he will attempt to hold both the wets and drys strictly to the subject of the bill at issue. Each side will have six days for the presentation of its case, with the wets taking the stand first.

Besides approving the program for the hearings, the committee endorsed the action of the subcommittee in definitely postponing consideration of a bill by Senator Edwards, Democrat, New Jersey, for repeal of the Volstead act. This measure was pigeonholed, it was explained, because its passage would leave the government without authority to enforce the dry constitutional amendment.

The first measure that will be considered will be that by Senator Bruce, Democrat, Maryland, proposing to change the eighteenth amendment so that those states and communities which were wet when the dry law went into effect again would be wet, but would have to depend upon the federal government for their limited supplies of intoxicants.

Then the beer bills and the Edge measure to remove the restrictions on prescription whisky will have their innings. There are three beer bills proposing four per cent, 2.75 per cent and beer "non-intoxicating in fact." Senator Edwards, Democrat, New Jersey, sponsors the other two.

Senator Walsh, Democrat, Montana, who voted against the hearings, based his opposition on the ground that they were requested merely for the purpose of spreading wet propaganda.

Houghton's Reported Views on Europe Arouses Senate

Senators Harrison and Borah Main Figures in Wrangling.

Washington, Mar. 22.—(AP)—The senate got itself into an inquisitive frame of mind today on the European situation. Ambassador Houghton's reported observations to newspaper correspondents, painting a rather gloomy picture of conditions overseas, formed the basis of more than an hour's debate with Chairman Borah of the foreign relations committee and Senator Harrison, Democrat, Mississippi, as the central figures.

The chairman of the foreign relations committee gave it as his opinion that when Brazil "defied" the other nations and blocked Germany's entry into the council of the League of Nations she had silent support from the great powers.

Senator Glass said Mr. Borah was getting into "the field of conjecture" and the latter retorted that it was "not the field of conjecture but the field of common sense."

Interrupting the discussion, Senator Johnson, Republican, California, declared the American people had a right to know the facts about what is transpiring in Europe, and Senator Borah agreed with him.

sador Houghton with starting a "subtle propaganda" here at home to "tear down the work other men are trying to do." He said he referred to the action of the ambassador in calling newspaper critics into the state department and making a frank statement to them about the European situation.

Coolidge, Kellogg Assailed. Reports of such an interview have been spread far and wide, have caused much comment abroad, and have led the state department to declare in a formal statement that Mr. Houghton had not opened his mind about Europe to "any unofficial person."

While some expected some weeks ago that \$1 might be added to last year's price, which admittedly was low, and even a month ago it was thought 50 cents advance might be asked, yet two weeks ago it became apparent that no advance in price was more likely, although 25 cents would have been welcomed by all producers without exception."

The prices of the various base grades of Lake Superior iron for the season of 1926 are: Mesabi non-Bessemer, \$4.25, delivered at lower lake docks; old range non-Bessemer, \$4.40; Mesabi Bessemer, \$4.40; old range Bessemer, \$4.55; high phosphorous foundry ores, \$4.15.

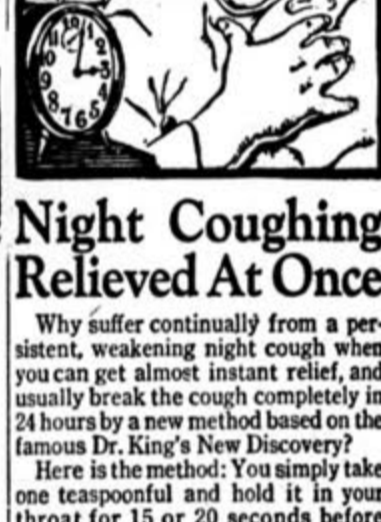

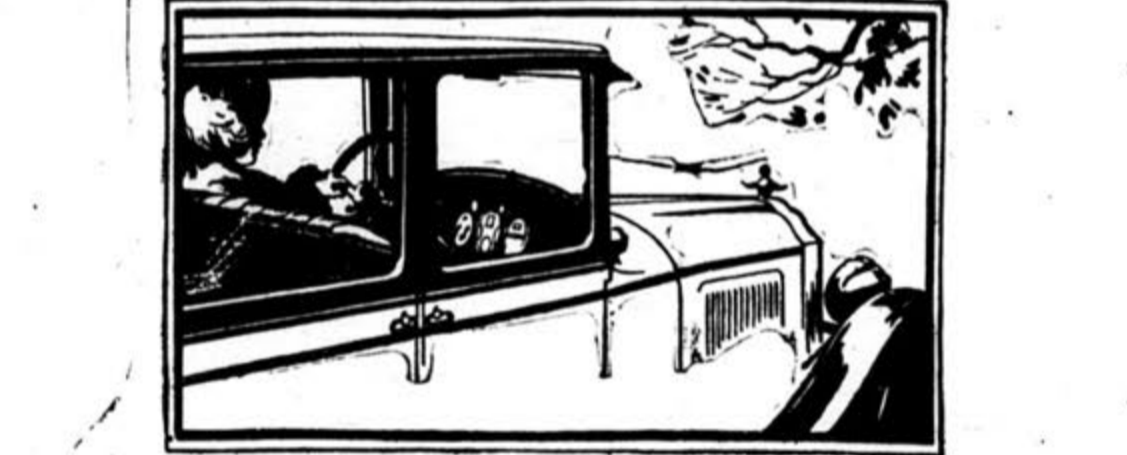

The two special propositions, that are to be submitted, are of almost equal importance as the selection of two councilmen. 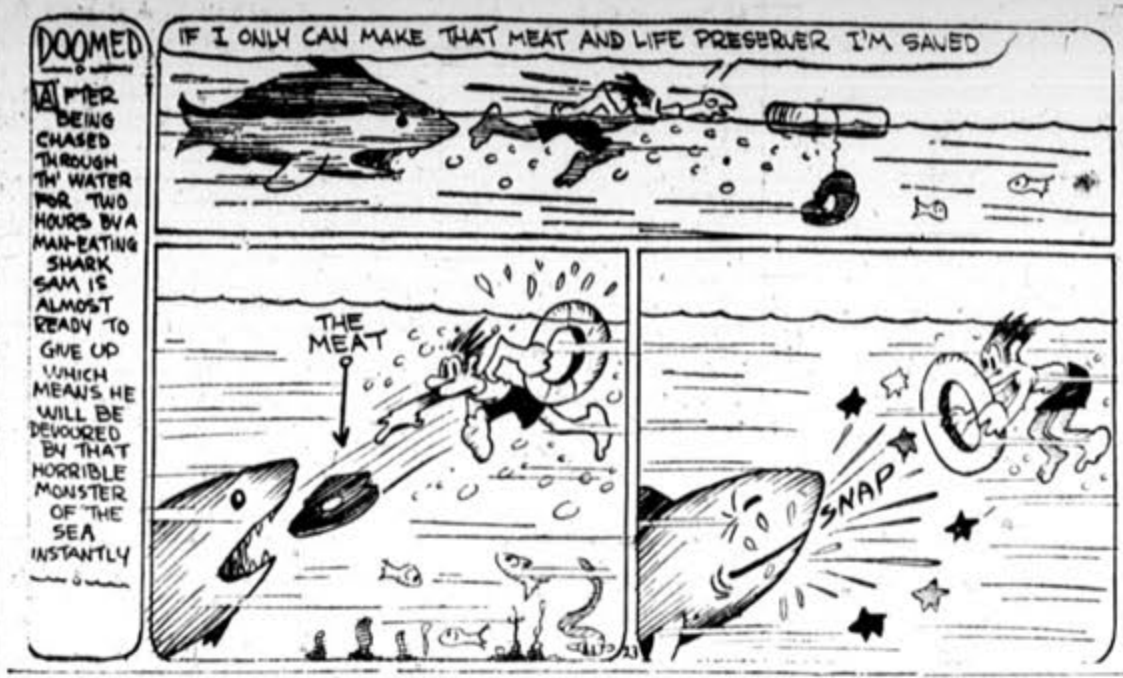

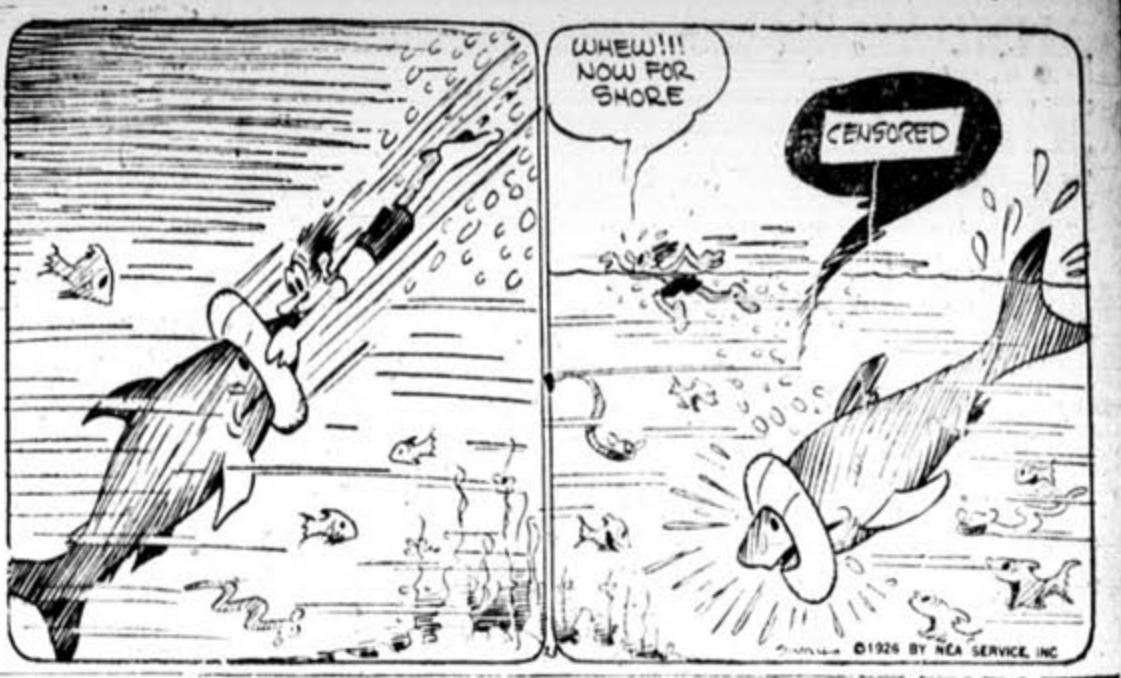

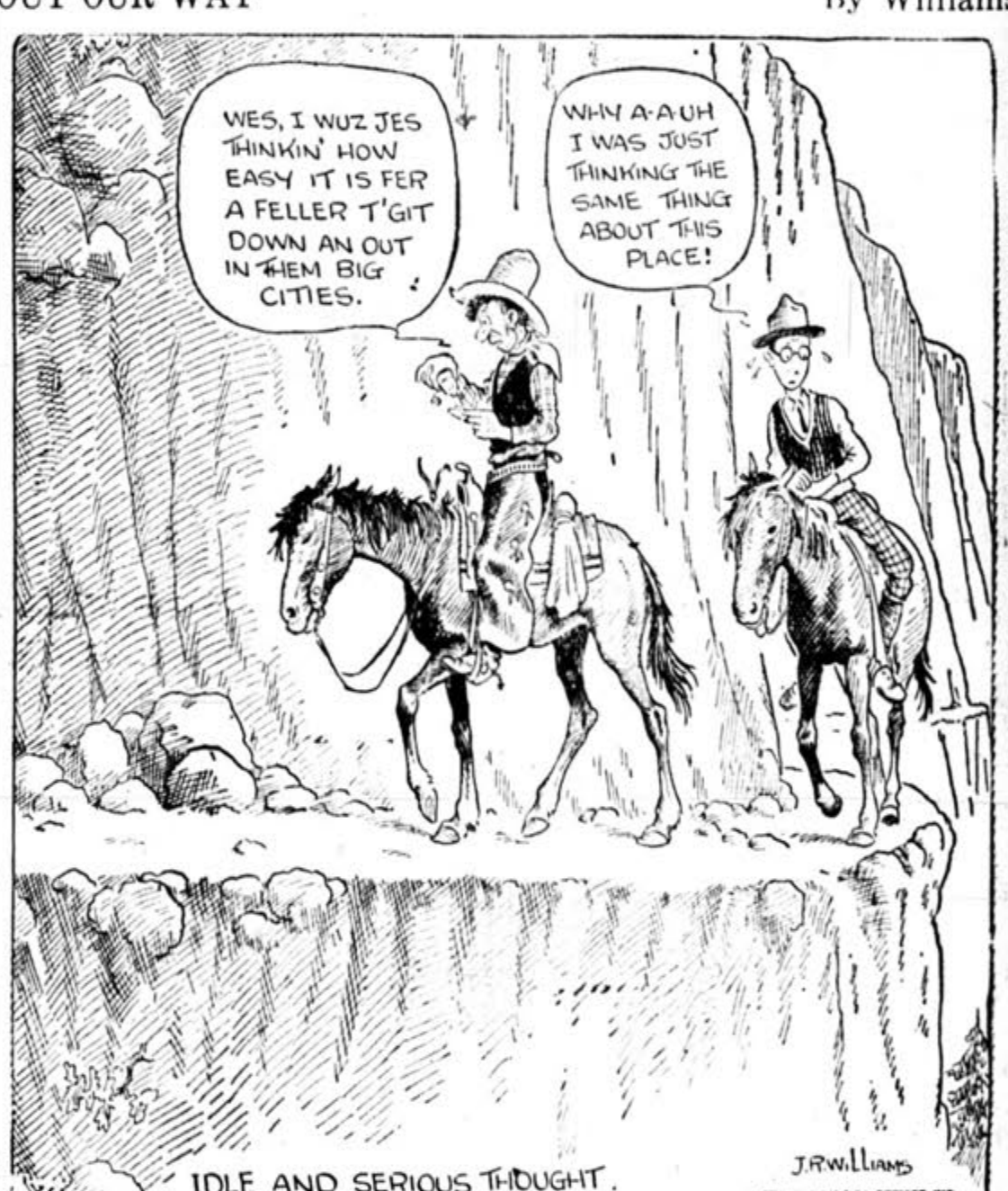
