He asserted that inasmuch as the time of the members and the departmental officers is so limited they should go out of office as friends. An argument would hurt the splendid record made by the commission, he said.

Following the fiery session, Commissioner W. H. Wallace of Saginaw, chairman, Fred E. Pantlind of Grand Rapids, George W. Millen of Ann Arbor and Charles E. Lawrence of Caplan, announced they have submitted their resignations effective January 1. Lundberg is willing to step out but he does not care to leave his place vacant, until a successor is appointed, he stated. Commissioners Howard B. Bloomer of Detroit and T. F. Marton, who were not present, are understood to have submitted their resignations or be willing to do so if Governor-elect Gresh desires to replace them.

Shea Appears in Office As Police Search for Him

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 31—(AP)—Joseph H. Shea, former United States ambassador to Chile and former judge of the Indiana appellate court, for whom police had been asked to search after his absence for several hours, appeared at his law office late today. Mr. Shea has been in ill health for some time, according to attaches of his office.

Office employees refused to permit Mr. Shea to be questioned and said they had not asked him where he had been. They added that he appeared to be seriously ill and he was immediately taken to his home.

Mr. Shea was suffering from a high fever last night and was missing when his sister went to his room early today. It had been feared that he was wandering about the city in a delirium.

Mr. Shea was ambassador to Chile from 1918 to 1921. He has been active in the Democratic party many years.

FORESEE NEW TYPE OF FUEL

Wonderful Possibilities in Common Coal Seen by Chemists.

Pittsburgh, Pa., Dec. 31—(AP)—A common lump of coal, productive now of little more than heat, smoke and ash, is a veritable "wonderful lamp" in possibilities and American scientists are determined to be its Aladdin.

Smokeless coal, automobiles run on a bituminous substitute for gas, oil, universal gas heat instead of coal heat, are only a few of the changes bound to come about, experts say, as a result of increased scientific research.

New Processes Tested.
Predictions of revolutions in energy sources have increased since the closing of the recent International Conference on Bituminous Coal here, at which it developed that France and Germany had gone further than other countries in coal research.

Attention is being directed, not to the mines as in the past, but to the laboratories, said a scientist, a layman-educator, a coal expert and a government chemist.

"Some processes which are talked about a great deal can be adopted profitably," said Dr. Thomas H. Baker, president of the Carnegie Institute of Technology and sponsor of the international coal meeting.

Wider Use of Gas.
There are great deposits of low grade coal in America which, when subjected to certain processes, can be transformed into higher priced products.

Dr. Baker pointed out that the most difficult problem facing the coal men from a business standpoint is overproduction.

"Abstract research," he added, "is likely to be more profitable than solving the every day problems."

A. C. Fieldner, chief chemist of the United States Bureau of Mines, said he foresees the approach of the day soon when gas will be used in nearly all homes to take the place of coal heat. Some of the poorer class homes, he believes, will use coke extracted from coal by a process of low carbonization distillation. Either course would eliminate the problem of smoke.

Motor Fuel Possible.
"Enough work has been done," he said, "to show that when the need arises a gasoline substitute can be made for a low price not prohibitive for automotive use."

C. E. Lesher, assistant to the president of the Pittsburgh Coal company, predicted that research will devise a substitute for anthracite, oil, gasoline and other processes for developing fuel.

A smokeless solid fuel out of soft coal, he asserted, will be a future fact. The development of such a fuel, he said, will make for steady mine operation, more finance and other signs of prosperity.

F. W. Sperr, Jr., advisory fellow of the Mellon Institute of Industrial Research, said coke will become more generally appreciated through the current scientific investigations.

BAIRD ORDERS HAY FOR DEER

Late Conservation Director Hears Animals Are Starving.

The tender heart of John Baird, late commissioner of conservation, was touched. Just before he passed out of the political picture, by a story that the deer, north of the straits, were starving. Did John ask the Rotary and Kiwanis clubs to sponsor a drive for the starving deer? Not he. John is a man of action.

In a letter to conservation department staff members of the peninsula, he took the proverbial bull by the fabled horns and commanded the animals fed. The letter instructed the wardens, forthwith and summarily, to proceed to haul hay and alfalfa to the woods, in order to stave off the equator and destitution and suffering. The state, he assured the wardens, would be glad to pay the bill.

Mr. Baird's letter was the first intimation in these parts that the deer population of the upper peninsula was not faring fairly well. There is no need at the present time for hay, alfalfa or any other

type of breakfast food in the deer districts. And there is no assurance that the deer, even if they were hungry, would welcome the diet John suggests. Besides, they spend most of their time, in this season of the year, in localities where even a lost hunter from Detroit would have difficulty in piloting a load of hay.

Political Move. Possibly John was in earnest about the need for the relief. It would have been a noble deed to give the deer a good square New Year's dinner in honor of John's passing from office.

But some conservation leaders here who learned about the order, yesterday, remembering "Zilwaukee Hiram" and other Baird political maneuvers, wondered whether the conservation chief was not building up something for his successor to worry about.

When the primary election of 1926 rolled around it found the original anti-Groesbeck group augmented by those who for one reason or another cut away from the governor during his long tenure. His opponents concentrated and placed only one candidate—Governor-elect Green—in the primary field. The result, with Green winning by a majority of more than 150,000, is still fresh in the memories of the leaders of both sides. The Groesbeck organization was down to a few faithful followers and the defeat was inevitable. The far-seeing organization of previous years has been taken over by the opposition and there was no plethora of candidates in the field to split the vote.

During his six years as executive Governor Groesbeck improved more than 2,000 miles of state trunk line highways. It is to his achievements as a road builder that he points with greatest pride. He was responsible for the enactment of the state corporation tax, which ever since has provided funds for the improvement of state institutions. 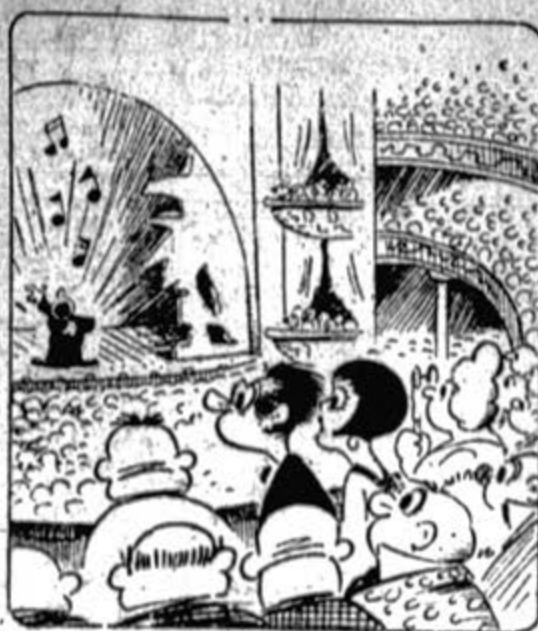
