MELLON ERRED IN MATTER OF DEBT-ENGLAND

NOTE SAYS PAYMENT WOULD BE DRAIN ON COFFERS.

London, May 4.—(P)—Expressing great misgiving because of the divergence of opinion and estrangement of sentiment growing up in regard to the war debts, the British government, in a note to the United States, today challenged the accuracy of the statement of March 17 by Andrew W. Mellon, secretary of the United States treasury, that Great Britain's debt payments to the United States will not constitute a drain on British economic resources.

SHELTON GANG GETS RETRIAL

Judge Declares Witness Was Purjerer; Three Released.

Springfield, Ill., May 4.—(P)—Declaring that "one of the material witnesses was an admitted perjurer and that this court feels that the defendants did not have a fair and impartial trial," Judge Louis L. Fitzberry, in the federal court here, tonight granted the three Shelton gangsters a new trial.

DAUGHTER OF GREEN ELOPES

Marries Senior at Michigan State College in Ohio.

Lansing, May 4.—(AP)—Helen Nancy Tyrell, only daughter of Gov. and Mrs. Fred W. Green, was expected to return to Lansing tonight from a whirlwind elopement. Tuesday afternoon she married Norval Tyrell, a senior at the Michigan State college in Bowling Green, Ohio. She and her husband fled across the state line to escape the Michigan law which requires a five-day wait between the time of applying for and receiving marriage license.

Governor Green was visibly affected by his daughter's sudden action. He stated, however, that "everything is all right." He had hoped, he said, to keep his daughter a few years more. Peggy, as she was familiarly known in Lansing and Michigan State college, where she enrolled recently after her father was elected governor and the family moved to Lansing from Ionia, was "a surprising girl and had surprised her dad," he said. She had known Tyrell since she became a student at the college. He was popular there, belonging to a leading fraternity and being active in student circles.

The pair left Lansing Tuesday in Miss Green's car. They were stopped twice by traffic officers because they were traveling at high speed. Each time they explained their mission and who they were and good-natured officers bid them God speed and allowed them to proceed. The governor and Mrs. Green were in Benton Harbor attending blossom week. They were advised of the marriage by a telegram. The governor immediately sent the following message to his daughter and her husband: "You surprised us a little. We're looking for the ceremony so soon. You both have our love and best wishes. Looking anxiously forward to your return home."

"Peggy always was a surprising girl and now she has surprised her dad," the governor said. "I know young Tyrell, and he is a fine boy. I knew Peggy thought much of him, but the wedding has come a little sooner than was expected. A man naturally likes to keep his baby with him as long as possible and I had hoped to keep mine a while yet. But it

Used Iron Bar.
The negro, John Carter, 22, surrounded by a mob numbering several thousand men, who felled him in a tree after an all day search, confessed that he had attacked Mrs. B. E. Stewart and her 17-year-old daughter, Glennie, with an iron bar as they rode along the road near the city in a wagon early today.

Miss Stewart, her head in bandages, was said to have identified the negro at the scene of the lynching.
The mob sent for Miss Stewart and waited for her to arrive. She was said to have identified him as the man who attacked her, after which Carter was led to a pole, a rope fastened about his neck.

Climbed on Car.
Told to climb on top of an automobile, the negro tried, but was too frightened or weak. He was then pushed atop the car and it was driven from under him. As the negro swung in the air, he was riddled with bullets from a volley.

Her head in bandages from the attack, Miss Stewart was said to have been within sight of the lynching.

SENATE VOTES U. OF M. FUNDS

Maintenance and Expansion Budget Amounts to Millions.

Lansing, May 4.—(AP)—The University of Michigan was voted \$2,700,000 for new buildings and purchase of lands, \$8,400,000 for maintenance and operation and a possible additional sum of \$2,350,000 by the senate today.

The revised university mill tax now reduced to five-tenths of a mill without restriction amounting to an annual return of approximately \$4,200,000 for maintenance and operation, was adopted under a suspension of the rules. The second bill appropriates \$2,700,000 to be used for purchase of lands for dormitories, and the Michigan Women's League building, to assist in the construction of the new dormitories and for construction of a model elementary school. This also carries with a tax clause an appropriation of \$2,350,000 for improvements, including the erection of a new wing to Angell Hall.

The committee on finance and appropriation also reported out the Warner-Upjohn bill appropriating \$500,000 for construction of a tuberculosis sanitarium at Ann Arbor. The latter bill has been held in the committee for weeks while two other bills appropriating money for maintenance and rehabilitation of the state sanitarium at Howell were passed and sent to Gov. Fred W. Green. The bill, apparently, will not meet opposition on the floor of the senate.

Business Leaders Paint Outlook in Brightest Colors

Washington, May 4.—(AP)—The business outlook for the United States was pictured in bright colors today by speakers who addressed the international meeting of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States but one shadow was cast by the agricultural situation in the middle west.
East, west, south and north central territory was described as facing no disturbing problems of major importance and notwithstanding the gloomy farm situation, Elias H. Strawn of Chicago, chairman of the board of directors of Montgomery Ward and Company, held out the prospect of satisfactory volume of business in the middle west in 1927 with normal weather conditions and crops.

Mrs. Chaplin Will Give No Quarter in Fight for Divorce

Los Angeles, May 4.—(AP)—A move by attorneys for Charlie Chaplin to have stricken out of Lita Grey Chaplin's divorce complaint many of its most sensational charges tonight precipitated a bitter statement from Mrs. Chaplin's counsel in which they declared that any hope for an out-of-court settlement had been destroyed by the film comedian's action.

"A fair and reasonable basis of settlement always has been held out to Chaplin, but apparently he has no intention of paying or settling," said Mrs. Chaplin's attorney. "It is going to be a vicious fight and Chaplin can expect a return in kind."

A demurrer to the complaint filed by the actor's attorneys with the motion to strike today was interpreted by Mrs. Chaplin's counsel as a "thinly veiled personal attack on Mrs. Chaplin."
The motion to strike asks that reference to Mrs. Chaplin as "a virtuous and inexperienced girl" of 16 years at the time of the marriage go out of the complaint. It seeks the deletion of the charge by Mrs. Chaplin that the comedian sought to force her to undergo an illegal operation and the further charge that he married her without any intention of carrying out his marital obligations. Reference in the complaint to Chaplin's moral conduct also is attacked.

MEX OIL LAWS IN FULL EFFECT

Foreign Companies Can No Longer Restrain Officials.

Mexico City, May 4.—(AP)—The Mexican supreme court by unanimous decision revoked today the partial amparos or injunctions granted by lower courts to nine foreign oil companies restraining the federal authorities from enforcing the new oil regulations.

The supreme court ruled that the district court must grant or reject amparos in totality, not in part, as had been done by the Mexico City district courts in the case of the Amparos in question.

Litigation over the new Mexican oil regulations began as soon as the new law became effective, January 1, last.
Most of the amparos granted were of a provisional nature. These injunctions prevented all of the Mexican authorities, even President Calles himself, from enforcing the regulations which the foreign oil companies considered detrimental to their properties and rights. It was the contention of the petitioners that inasmuch as their rights to properties were acquired prior to the promulgation of the Mexican constitution of 1911 their properties were not liable under Article 27, which virtually declares all subterranean property to be property of the nation. The new oil law simply enforces Article 27.

Under the new oil law foreign-owned oil lands for which no concessions were asked before January 1, may be assigned to other claimants.

The Mexican government so far has abstained from rigid enforcement of the statute, probably to await action by the supreme court.

The American government has held the article of the constitution confiscatory.

Kills Himself to Avoid Arraignment on Fraud Charges

New York, May 4.—(AP)—A wealthy real estate operator who rose from the ranks, took his own life today, leaving his 23-year-old son alone to face charges brought by an old friend, of grand larceny and forgery in alleged fraudulent real estate deals involving from \$100,000 to \$500,000.

The father, Abraham Grosney, who started life in Grand street, on the lower east side, and the son, Paul, were arrested last night while they were entertaining at a party in their luxurious west end avenue home. They were taken directly to night court.

The son, released with his father in \$5,000 bail shortly after their arrest, appeared at Yorkville court this morning for arraignment and, after explaining about the tragedy in his home, obtained an adjournment until May 15.

Mrs. Esther Grosney, the widow, said today that worry and sleeplessness brought on by the sudden arrests last night caused her husband to take his life.
The complaint, which accuses the father and son of "acting in concert" was made by Pinous J. Barash, a dress manufacturer, who was a friend of the elder Grosney for many years. The Grosneys charged with appropriating for their private uses \$125,000 borrowed in the name of 575 Eighth Avenue Corporation, of which Barash was secretary and treasurer.

is the largest lake ever created by any flood since the levee system was installed. Aviators flying over the territory report a practically solid sheet of water in southeastern Arkansas, northeastern Louisiana and western Mississippi, measuring several hundred miles north and south and perhaps a hundred miles east and west.

At many places along the vast stretch the Mississippi river itself is only faintly outlined by the tops of the levees with water stretching away to the right and the left. The embankments are broken at nearly a dozen places and swift currents still are passing through even the oldest of the breaks.

Waters Rush Back.
The waters from the Mississippi delta can be observed rushing back into the parent stream through the Yazoo river north of Vicksburg and those from the Glasscock breaks are coursing down the Texas valley to seek a re-mingling with the

mother stream through the Old river.
This vast funnel of water bearing down on the Old river, the Red river and the Atchafalaya has created a new battle front for those fighting the floods, a front of water and mud along a winding course of eighty miles. On the outcome of this battle depends the safety of the rich sugar cane section in south central Louisiana.
