OLD PIONEER of manistique PASSES AWAY

Death claimed one of the ploneer settlers of Schoolcraft county on Friday, June 3, when Anders Peter Anderson passed away at his farm home near Gulliver. following an illness with Bright's disease.

Mr. Anderson was born June 8 1858, at Halstad, Sweden, and in 1882 came to the United States, locating first at Chicago, where he remained for a short time. He then came to the upper peninsula and settled at what is now called Thompson, in the Lockhart settlement, took up a homestead there and pioneered his way through for about 16 years. In order to set up housekeeping. he was forced to carry his first stove to the settlement on his back, because there was no wagon trail as yet.

Helped Build Soo Line. In 1887-88, he helped to build the Soo Line railroad, then coming into Manistique, and delivered 9,000 ties from his homestead. It was in March 1899 that Mr. Anderson moved with his family to Manistique, where he made his home up to about 12 years ago, moving then to a farm which he purchased near Gulliver -his residence up to the time of his death.

On October 11, 1879, he was married to Charlotte Hermon. To this union were born eight children, two of whom died in infancy, and a son at the age of 19 years. Mrs. Anderson passed away in 1909. The husband was married again on Sentember 19. 1911, to Anna Dixner, who died in January, 1923.
