Jones Splashes Around in Ninth Under Pelting Downpour.

Oakmont. Pa., June 14-(AP)-While the rain-swept bunkers and bogs of Oakmont today took a heavy toll in little hopes, two unsung and unheralded contenders splashed to the front of an inter- N nationally notable field in the first 18-hole round of the American open golf championship.

Harrison R. (Jimmy) Johnston of Maneapolis, former Western amateur champion, and Harry Hampton. Memphis professional, attracted little attention as they went off and less trouble as they carried on, with the result that each finished in a fine 73. But for an unruly putt that hit the back of the cup on the last green and bounced off Johnston would have bagged a par 72 and occupied the lead alone.

Closely pressing the two leaders, a struce behind at 74, came two more ramous aspirants, Gene Sarazen and "Light Horse" Harry Cooper, professional stars from oppo-site sides of the continent, while the defending champion and favorite, Bobby Jones, in spite of a troublesome round, was within striking distance with a 76

Jones in Ninth.

With the day's score sheet complete, Jones stood in ninth position, tled with the veteran Briton, Ted Ray, who won the American open crown in 1920 when Bobby, at the age of 18, was making his first appearance in the tournament.

Others standing between Jones and the leaders were Dave Robertson, Dearborn, Mich., professional, and another "dark horse," who fin-ished with a fine 74 late in the day today to the Sarazen and Cooper for second place, and three more professionals bracketed at 75, Larry Nabholtz of Sharon. Pa., Emmett French of Southern Pines, N. C., and "Wild Bill" Mehlhorn of New York.

Walter Hagen, salvaging a bad spart with a flourishing finish, landed a stroke behind Jones and Ray with a 77. the same figure that "Wee Bobby" Cruickshank, picked as one of the foremost contenders. also shared with P. O. Hart of Marietta. Ohio, and Bob McDonald of Chicago.
