NOVACK TELLS ABOUT COMETS

Four of the "Astral Speedsters" Visible at Local Observatory.

John Novack, of the Novack Astronomical Observatory, Escanaba, in a letter to The Press, describes the comets which are attracting the attention of astronomers throughout the world.

"During the month of June four comets have been observed at this observatory," says Mr. Novack. "Three of these comets are visible in the evening sky, but only with optical power.

"Comet C (Pons Winnecke) is below the eighth magnitude. This is the comet expected to be visible in the unaided eye June 25-26. This comet will approach within three and one-half million miles of the earth, or about 15 times the distance of the moon! On June 25-26, inclusive, this comet should be visible to the unaided eye. Its motion is very great from night to night. On the night of June 24 this comet will pass between the two lower stars of the Northern Cross, Constellation Cygnus. June 26 it will be in Delphi, known as 'Job's Coffin.' At this place it should be seen by most anyone. The comet will pass very near the two stars at the southern part of the diamond shape of the constellation.

"Comet D (Stearns) is not far from the bright star, Arcturus, the bright star overhead at this time of the year. This comet moves very slowly, the orbit seems to be a parabola. The return period is about two or three centuries, the exact time not being quite certain.

"Comet I is very faint, about 13 1/2 magnitude, being only for first-class telescopes and professionals will be the only ones to see it.

"The writer had a very pleasant visit with Professor Fox at the Northwestern university observatory the first days in June."
