SUN'S CURING RAYS CAN BE HAD MOST OF YEAR

The fact is now well established that exposure of the growing child to ultra-violet rays is desirable for the prevention of that malformation of the bones known as rickets and of riving to the child other factors that develop upon the living human tissues.

Studies made in Chicago by the department of health showed that there are only two months in the year, and those at the height of the summer season, when sufficient ultra-violet rays come through to be of much value in preventing rickets. No doubt the observation made in Chicago will do for most of the large cities of the world.

Direct Sun Treatment

In places where the rays of the sun are not broken by a dense screen of smoke and smudge, such as hangs like a pall over most of our great centers, it is possible to give children sun treatment directly. Experiments show that the sun's rays need not come directly but may be had reflected from the sky.

Rats fed on rickets-producing diets were placed in the shade where they got no sun but only skylight. Others were placed in direct sunlight and still others put inside in rooms where they received only much subdued light. Finally a fourth control group were given a normal diet and exposed to sunlight.

The rats on a normal diet and receiving sunlight grew magnificently. Those on a rickets diet with sunlight did better than those with skylight, but the latter did far better than those without light.

It was determined quantitatively that skylight, which is light reflected from the sun, has an antirickets effect from one-half to two-thirds of that produced by the available sunlight. Thus infants may be placed out of doors and protected from the sun and still receive some anti-rickets effect from the reflected ultra-violet rays of the sky.

Careful measurements, made with instruments, of the ultra-violet rays coming from the sun and from the sky indicate that during the last week in April and the first week in May the ultra-violet content of skylight alone is about 60 per cent of the ultra-violet content of sunlight.

Powers for Harm

It is important to realize that direct sunlight is so strong that it may have powers for harm as well as for good. Sunstroke results from too much heat from the sun rays.

Burning of the skin may be severe in an infant. Usually the first dose of direct sunlight should be small, given for but a few minutes on a small part of the body. As resistance to the sun's rays develops the dose of sunlight may be increased.

In cold weather the child can be exposed to sunlight passing through some of the various glasses that will pass the ultra-violet rays. The child should not be submitted to exposure to cold and frost in order to give it the rays of the sun.

THEATER MAN CLUB SPEAKER

L. J. Jacobs Tells Kiwanis Some Phases of Movie Business

Few Americans realize how nearly the large motion picture producers of this country have approached a complete monopoly of the industry, and how dangerous such a monopoly would be, L. J. Jacobs, manager of the Delft theatre, told the Kiwanis club at its regular meeting yesterday.

"The motion picture is a tremendously powerful moulder of public opinion," Mr. Jacobs declared. "Controlled by a small clique of selfish men, it would be a weapon capable of doing almost incalculable injury," he said. "Its owners control affairs of government, elections, business—anything to which they decided to direct their energies."

"Few Americans realize how rapidly the industry was being manipulated toward such a condition. There are produced in America yearly about 700 pictures of feature-length each year. Eliminating certain classes of pictures, about 550 pictures are available to the average exhibitor. Of these, about 150 are produced by three leading concerns and at least that many more are made by concerns which employ methods which look forward to monopolization."

Competition Narrowed.

"Competition among producers and distributors has been eliminated to a great extent by limiting the market. The theatre owner is at the mercy of these men, whose business methods are unfair and in some cases ruinous."

"The federal trade commission already has attempted to halt some of these practices," Mr. Jacobs said, "but a long court battle is in prospect before a code of business practices is set up by the government."

One of the most dangerous and unfair practices in the industry is the "black booking" system, Mr. Jacobs said.

One of the big combines produced about 60 pictures last year. The theatre owner is required to buy all of them, whether he wants to show all of them or not. He is not permitted to select his own programs. Nor has he any chance of bargaining successfully. He has to "take them at the producers' price and imagine he likes it."

Use 400 Yearly.

Since Escanaba's theatres use approximately 400 pictures out of an available 550 each year, it may readily be seen that in order to keep his houses going, the small theatre owner is at the mercy of the Hollywood combine.

More dangerous, however, as a matter of public policy, is the practice of producers of acquiring control of theatres. Producers now own or control thousands of American movie houses and have, in some localities, succeeded in freeing out the last vestige of competition.

Mr. Jacobs gave the club members several instances in which intimidation and strong-arm tactics

had been employed in this region. "I have always regarded the theatre," he said, "as a public utility. The public should be interested. And when the public really wakes up to what has been going on, I believe that it will demand that the theatres be freed from many of the influences which now are dominant."

"The picture business is fundamentally right or it could not have risen to its present level of importance in the nation's entertainment program. It is too big to be dragged down into the clouded waters which some of its 'big men' evidently desire."
