The destroyer, on patrol duty off Provincetown, was making for the harbor. Suddenly her lookout saw the S-4. There was no time to swerve from the course and the Islet Prince Set Out in vessels crashed. The destroyer made port with her lower hold flooded. The Paulding was struck amidships, but the point at which the submarine felt the force of the blow was not known.
