Threats of Universal Negro Suffrage Fail to Silence Senators

Washington, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Notification given in the senate today by the two Virginia senators that the south intended to stick by its voting laws "despite threats of universal negro suffrage" stirred up a three-hour row which took in prohibition and presidential politics.

Senator Bruce, Democrat, Maryland, suggested in the course of a lengthy address by Senator Swanson, Democrat, Virginia, who was defending voting laws of southern states, that the south sanction "the same escape from the tyrannical oppression of the 18th amendment that it has from the 15th amendment."

LATEST FRENCH NOTE PUBLISHED

Secretary Kellogg Makes Known Contents of Message

Washington, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Secretary Kellogg made public today the latest French note in the exchange concerning a multi-lateral treaty for the outlawing of war, but refrained from making any comment. The communication declared France stood ready to negotiate a bi-lateral treaty but when confronted by the initiative of the United States in proposing a multi-partite covenant, it had to take into consideration the relations existing among the various powers which would be called upon to participate.

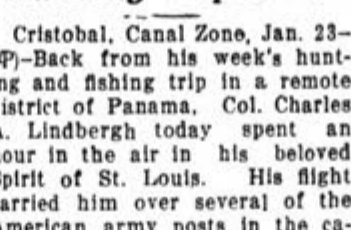

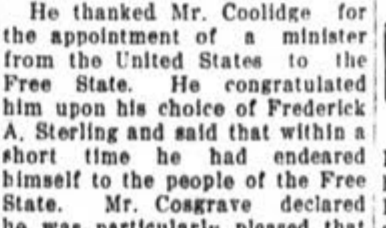

Sherman T. Handy Reviews Gas Plant Sale Proposal

When the proposal first was heard here that the Escanaba municipal gas plant be sold to a private concern which would furnish the community with coke and other by-products of coal gas, the city council took steps to get the option of Sherman T. Handy, former chairman of the Michigan state utilities commission, and now a consultant in utilities matters, with offices in Detroit.

Mr. Handy's survey of the situation here, received by the city recently, is as follows: To the Honorable, the Mayor and Council of the City of Escanaba, Gentlemen: In accordance with a conference in my office on December 15 between your city manager and myself, I am writing regarding the proposal to purchase the city gas plant in Escanaba.

My understanding of the proposition to purchase is as follows: A proposition has been made to the city by some parties who propose to build coke ovens in Escanaba and supply the people of Escanaba with gas, a by-product. This proposal is contingent upon the city selling its gas plant at a certain price and the giving to these parties a franchise to distribute and sell gas in the city of Escanaba for a period of thirty years at a price to be specified in said franchise.

I want to submit the proposition to the electors, then two very important questions are presented by this proposal, namely: 1. Is the price offered all the property is worth? 2. Are the proposed rates proper and reasonable, and should they remain the same during the thirty-year period?

It is my opinion that if the city wants to sell its gas plant it should at least get what it is fairly worth. In order to arrive at a fair value an inventory and appraisal should be made by some competent and reliable engineering concern familiar with placing values on gas plants.

My advice to you is to submit to the qualified electors of Escanaba this question: "Should the council of the city of Escanaba be authorized to sell the city gas plant for the best price obtainable, but for not less than \$_____?"

In the blank space I would put in the amount already offered. If this proposition is not voted upon favorably by the electors, then you can assume the people do not want to sell the gas plant. If it is approved, then you should have the property appraised to guide you in making the sale and satisfying yourselves that you are getting all the property is fairly and reasonably worth.

When you have reached an agreement to sell then it will be necessary, before the sale is completed, to submit to the electors, for approval, a franchise.

This brings us to the second proposition, namely: What rates, if any, should be specified in the franchise? It is my opinion that the question of rates should be left to the Michigan public utilities commission. It is the policy of state regulations to allow a utility to charge such rates as will produce sufficient revenue to meet all legitimate operating expenses, including taxes, to provide a fund to take care of depreciation and also pay to the owners a fair return, not exceeding eight per cent, upon the fair value of the used and useful property devoted to public use.

than this the public should not expect. The gas consumers of Escanaba should be willing to pay what the service reasonably costs but no more.

Regulation and Stability. To fix gas rates now, under prevailing conditions, for a period of thirty years, is a gamble with strong odds in favor of the utility. What are reasonable rates today may be unreasonable tomorrow. With the new inventions in mechanics and new discoveries in science how do we know that in less than five years gas may not be produced much more cheaply than it is today.

With the rate fixed for thirty years the utility would be the sole beneficiary in case the cost of producing gas is decreased. Under state regulation the people would be the sole beneficiaries because the utility is limited in its return to not exceed eight per cent.

There is little or no probability that the cost of producing gas will increase in the future, but there is every probability that the cost will be decreased. State regulation gives stability to the utility and protection to the public.

If, however, you desire to fix the rates in the franchise, in order that the people may not carry an unnecessary burden of high rates for the life of the franchise, you should provide for a modification of rates, at least every five years, by arbitration or otherwise.

I have examined your charter and I feel satisfied that my recommendations herein are not in any way in conflict with the charter.

Charter Called Unfair. The provision in the charter, which provides for a division of excess profits between the utility and the city, is extremely unfair to the gas users of Escanaba.

If such a provision were in force and excess profits were being made, then the gas users would be paying more than the service rendered them.

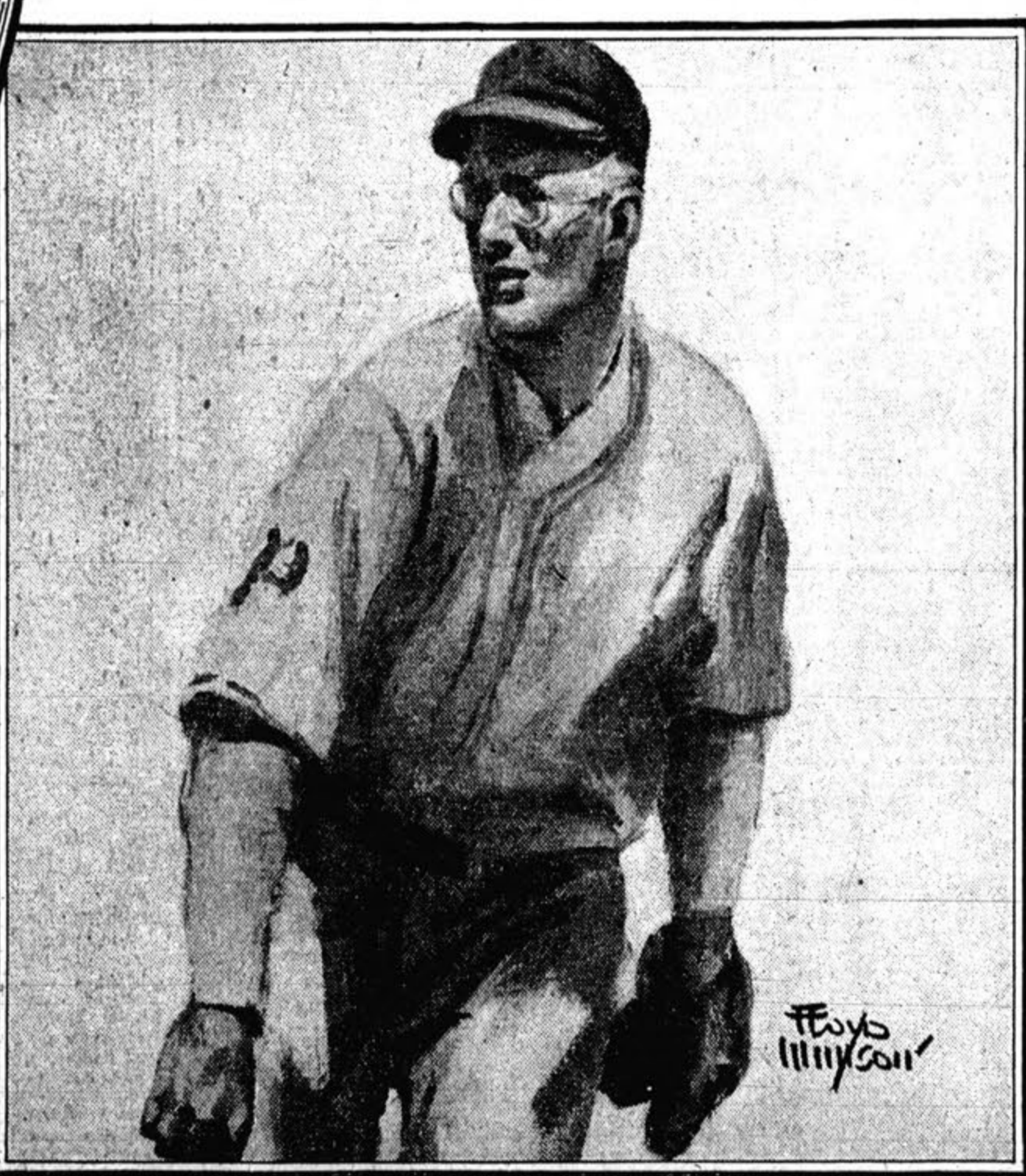

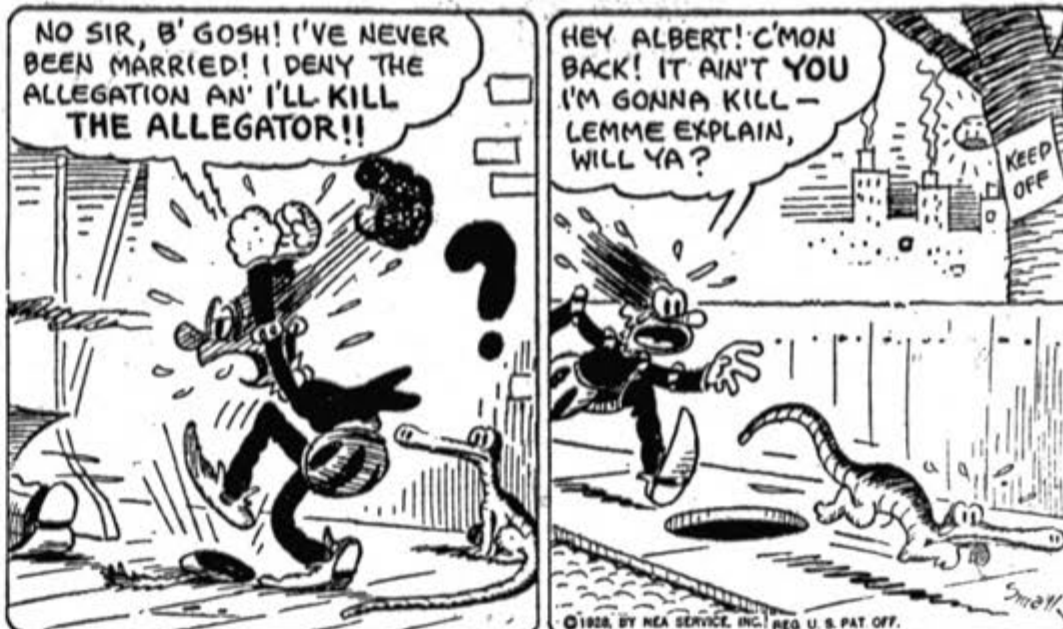

ESSAY CONTEST IS ANNOUNCED

Sportsmen's Association Gives Out Rules for Annual Event

"Adequate State Forests, Game Refuges and Public Shooting Grounds as the Solution of Michigan's Conservation Problem." will be the theme of essays submitted by high school students for prizes in the Northern Michigan Sportsmen's Association this year. Prizes totalling \$75 will be awarded for the eight essays which are considered best.

The rules of the contest are as follows:

1. Any boy or girl who is regularly enrolled as a student in the senior or junior high school grades of any public or parochial school in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan may enter.

2. Essays must not be more than 1500 words in length, exclusive of the bibliography or list of references used.

3. Not more than five essays from each school will be accepted, but total number of essays should be reported by the teacher who submits them.

Note. It is suggested that each school make a general assignment of this topic as a theme in connection with the work in English and that the five best essays from each school be submitted in this contest.

4. All essays submitted in this contest must reach Mr. M. G. DeGabriele, Secretary of the Northern Michigan Sportsmen's Association, Negaunee, Michigan, not later than March 15, 1928.

5. No contestant is to write his name or address on the essay itself, but should enclose with it a slip of paper bearing his name, age, grade and school.

6. If reference material is used in the preparation of this essay, a complete bibliography or list of references must be submitted with the essay.

NOTION TRADE IS CLIMBING

Millions Made in Gee-Gaw and Knick-Knack Business.

Washington (AP)—Uncle Sam's export trade in knick-knacks and gew-gaws reaches an astounding total yearly. Millions of dollars are tossed on the counter in exchange for a thousand and one odd, little known articles for which someone, somewhere and at some time has a need.

Now the average person never buys a sausage casing, as such, yet in the first nine months of last year the United States exported 23,172,418 pounds of them, receiving \$6,489,517. Bones, hoofs and horns probably seem quite as unwanted in the public mart, yet in nine months 1,293,650 pounds were exported at a total cost to somebody of \$53,121. Japan took most of them, the department of commerce intimates.

Then there's chewing gum. September export sales alone totalled 297,962 pounds, or \$107,718 worth. The orders ranged from \$3,423 pounds destined to satisfy the Italian palate down to three pounds for some lonesome jaw-exerciser in Japan. In nine months the world put \$1,250,807 into Uncle Sam's big gum-vending machine and walked away with 3,047,622 pounds.

A mountain of feathers, weighing 4,573,186 pounds, was sold for \$417,186. There was more solidarity to the nine months' sales of \$3,465 wheelbarrows, but they brought only \$341,011. On the other hand, 2,510,480 pounds of shoe polish sold for \$743,180, while 3,960,692 pounds of firecrackers brought \$744,382.

Other sales included 3,187,188 pounds of peanuts for \$248,442 and 440,888 dozen garters and armbands for \$672,648. More than 180,000 pounds of cigar bands were sold for \$204,844 and 515,471 toothbrushes for \$250,469. The sale of 146,951 dozen bathing caps brought \$311,479, or about five times as much as was received for 598,031 pounds of fish oil. Sales of cattle hair totalled \$804,025, worth \$579,229, or five times as much as sales of cut flowers.

The speaker brought out many interesting details of such a tour, such as escape the attention and interest of men and Mrs. Leighton's contribution to the club program proved instructive and highly enjoyable. The appreciation of the club members was reflected in the enthusiastic applause accorded the speaker when she had concluded.

In addition to shredding the whole fabric of sin, Sunday threw his picturesque support to the memory of George Washington and Warren G. Harding.

Sick of Muckraking.

"Oh," he shouted, "I'm sick of all this filthy muckraking."

"Rupert Hughes has discovered that Washington played cards a little and maybe said a few naughty words; might have had some brew in his cellar."

"But did he have anything to say about Washington taking command of the army under the Cambridge elm, or of the trials at Valley Forge where Washington prayed with his chin in the snow?"

"And this damnable rot about Harding?"

"Why did they wait until both Harding and his wife were dead before they uttered their gross slander?"

Repeats His Threat.

Discussing presidents brought reiteration of an old challenge.

"If the democrats nominate Al Smith or Jim Reed, and the republicans nominate a wet," he said, "I'll run for the presidency myself. And they'll know I'm in the race, too."

Sunday rapped companionate marriage as "bar-yard marriage"; defended prohibition as "God's greatest gift to America"; and deplored materialism as "our legacy from the war and the greatest thing the ministers have to combat."

Organists Must Pass Severe Test

Berlin (AP)—To qualify as organist in Prussia, the minister of public worship and instruction decreed, candidates will henceforth be examined by a mixed commission, comprising a professional musician selected by the government, a government official and a member of the local board of education.

Applications must be addressed to the competent authorities and the minister for public worship and instruction will then determine the time and place for the examination, in provinces in which there is a musical college or high school, the examination may be conducted at this institution by one of the teachers of the faculty chosen by the director and in the presence of the latter or his representative.

Liverpool (AP)—Prospective American tourists to Scotland at the next shooting season will be able to book their shooting accommodation at the same time they take their passage tickets.

To attract wealthy Americans to the Highlands, the Cunard Steamship company has hired several sporting estates throughout Scotland which they will let out at rates including charges for dogs, keepers and other necessities.

Two of the biggest "shoots" already leased for the season are the Duke of Athol's Perthshire shooting estate and Archarry, the property of the Cameron of Lochiel.

PUT BRAINS OF POUNDER IN PANTHEON

Moscow—The brain of Prof. Vladimir Bechtereff will be the fourth exhibit in the "brain pantheon" which he founded. Upon the death of the noted psychiatrist it was recalled that he had willed his own brain to take its place with those of other great notables secured by him for scientific study for the source of talent and genius.

The brains now in the collection include those of Anton Rubinstein, famous pianist and composer; Alexander Kohnl, writer, jurist and ranking member of the Academy of Science; and Demetri Mendeleff, naturalist and chemist.

Talks on Health

By Dr. Morris Fishbein

World Improves in Its Care for the Cripple.

The word "cripple" comes from an Anglo-Saxon word meaning to creep and from the word "dwarf."

From the earliest times, cripples were cruelly treated. It was customary for superstitious persons to attach to them an "evil spirit."

The tribes that traveled about found the cripple in the way and endeavored to lose him.

Only in modern times has humanitarianism changed the attitude of man toward the defective so that today efforts are made to rehabilitate the disabled and to make them capable of becoming self-supporting individuals.

A small hospital for the crippled was opened in Boston in 1839, and a hospital for the rup-

tures and crippled in New York City was established in 1863. Since that time, American surgeons have given special study to these problems. A school for the education and industrial training of crippled children was opened in Boston in 1893. Today there are hundreds of competent surgeons in the United States who devote all of their time to the care of the crippled.

Dr. Robert B. Osgood has recently surveyed the legal situation of the crippled child. In 1897 the state of Minnesota passed the first legislation representing acceptance by the state of its responsibility for the treatment and care and education of the crippled. New York followed in 1900 and Massachusetts in 1905.

In 1925 the state of New York passed a law which requires that all children who are physically handicapped must be reported in the annual school census each year. Ohio, Pennsylvania, North Dakota, Michigan, Kansas and West Virginia now have enlightened legislation for the control of this problem.

Many of the great philanthropic foundations give special attention to the crippled. Masonic groups, Elks, Rotary clubs and Kiwanis clubs are also especially interested in the care of the crippled children.

Medical research has begun its attack on the problem with the newer investigations on the development of the bones, whereby rickets is largely overcome. Tuberculosis is being prevented on a larger and larger scale. Infections of the bones and joints are being attacked with all of the armamentarium of modern science.

The big problem of the future is the control of one of the most dangerous of all crippling diseases, infantile paralysis. Specialists have become aware of the dangers of unrestricted manipulation during the state of acute inflammation.

With proper handling, the amount of crippling in this disease may be greatly diminished.

WILL COMPLETE ENTIRE PRISON

New Jackson Pen Will Normally Accommodate 4,400 Inmates

Lansing, Jan. 23.—(AP)—The new prison at Jackson is to be expanded to double the capacity contemplated by the 1927 legislature to meet the steadily increasing criminal population.

The state administrative board today authorized John W. Miner, member of the prison commission, and Building Superintendent Fraser to proceed with the construction of cell block units six and seven. Additional units will be added rapidly. Five blocks are now completed, or in course of construction. The decision to finish ten blocks restores the new institution to virtually its original plan.

Former Gov. Alex J. Groesbeck planned for 13 cell blocks. Later, it was decided 10 would be sufficient. When Gov. Fred W. Green assumed office, he stated in a message to the legislature that because of treasury deficits and extravagances in the construction thus far, he advocated the completion of only five cell blocks. The legislature therefore appropriated funds for only that many units.

To Accommodate 4,400.

It was decided by the board today to enlarge the program when Miner declared the appropriation for five cell blocks can be spread sufficiently to finance the completion of ten units, plus the factory administration, dining room, kitchen, hall masters control and wall. He asserted Fraser has made startling economies in construction. The cost per cell has been cut from \$1,200 to around \$500, he asserted.

Miner stated the total appropriation for the new prison was \$3,682,164, including that for the fiscal year 1925-29. Of this there is a balance of \$2,238,541. He estimated ten cell blocks and the other buildings can be finished for \$1,724,000.

The new cell blocks will accommodate normally about 2,218 inmates, in the five completed, or about 4,400 when 10 are finished. Many of the cells, however, will accommodate three prisoners, if desired. Thus the completed new structure would provide for 6,000 or more, if necessary.

This would take care of the present population and provide ample room for the normal increase, Governor Green believes.

To Abandon Old Prison.

It is planned to place three prisoners in some of the completed new cells at once, so that the old annex and barracks may be abandoned.

In a recent report, Arthur D. Wood, commissioner of pardons and paroles showed that the state has the largest number of prisoners in its history. The increase in population last year was 1201 or 18 per cent, jumping from 4462 in 1926 to 5663. Of these, 3306 were in Jackson. Marquette is the most seriously congested penal institution, accommodating 50% more prisoners than its cell capacity. Transfers may be affected to relieve the situation, as the new blocks are finished. Wood urged that more space be provided by building additional prisons rather than by releasing inmates.

It is expected eventually the old Jackson prison, located in the city will be abandoned.

Bus Riders Given Electrical Shocks

London—Is a motor bus a shocking machine? Patrons of the buses answer, "Yes."

They say that just as they put their hands to touch the boarding rail of the bus they receive a slight shock, and some bus riders have actually seen a spark leap from the handrail to their fingers.

A bus engineer has just explained. He says that friction between brake shoes and brake drums generates electricity sufficient to charge the whole bus. The handrail, of course, conducts the electricity to the passenger's hand.

Originally, uhlans were the only cavalry body equipped with this weapon, which, however, in 1839 was introduced in all German cavalry regiments, which frequently led to the erroneous appellation of "uhlans" for German cavalry of any description. The present edict was inspired by the wish to alleviate the most versatile drilling of cavalry and, by the exclusion of the cumbersome lance, to increase that body's firing efficiency in battle.

Prussic Acid Brings Death to Brass Bugs

Berlin (AP)—Prussic acid has proved an effective exterminator of the brass bug, an exceptionally destructive beetle, which is able to bore through metal. The appearance of the insect in Heidelberg caused alarm as previous attempts to exterminate it had failed. The houses invaded by the pest were gassed for two weeks, and at the end of that time thousands of the beetles were found dead.
