

7.9 INCHES OF SNOW IN MONTH

Only 7.9 inches of snowfall were recorded during January at the U. S. weather bureau office here, according to the monthly meteorological summary. This does not take into account the two inches of snow which fell late Tuesday night since the monthly period closed at 7 p. m. on that date.

A 30-mile wind prevailed early yesterday morning, causing the drifting of the snow which fell for about five hours during the night. Some large drifts in the country roads were encountered by the county's plows which started out early yesterday morning and had the main trunk lines cleaned up by noon. All roads throughout the peninsula were reported open by the office of H. I. Davies, division highway engineer. No snow was forecast for today. Indications were that the temperature would remain unchanged.

On January 10, the highest temperature for the month was recorded at 45 degrees, while the minimum occurred on January 3 with 5 degrees below zero. The average daily excess for the month was 3.6 degrees, while the accumulated excess amounted to 112 degrees. The precipitation for the month measured in water stood at 1.09 inches, making a deficiency of .40 inch for the month.

Thirty-two miles per hour was the maximum velocity of the wind during the month, this being on January 14 when a north wind prevailed. There were 16 cloudy days, seven partly cloudy and eight clear during January.

IN NEW YORK

The story is told of how one day he rang for his secretary. By the time the young man had arrived, he found Morrow engrossed with some papers on his desk. The secretary stood for a moment and then asked Morrow what he wanted.

"What are you doing there?" Morrow asked.

"You rang for me, sir. I thought perhaps—"

"Now did I?" asked Morrow. "What do you suppose I wanted you for? Well, come back in ten minutes and remind me that I want you again, will you, please."

There is still another of how Morrow found himself on the way to Philadelphia one afternoon. Arriving there he couldn't remember what he came for. He got on the phone and called his wife in New York. She told him he was to make a speech at a big dinner that night, and then he recalled his engagement.

Pressure of too many things to do gets many of the New Yorkers that way. Concentration on big deals and big problems is another responsible factor. Men forget all but the immediate things before their minds. It is told of a certain important business man that his wife stepped into his office unexpectedly and waited a moment, rather than disturb him.

Hunting Season for Peninsula Ended Yesterday

Yesterday was the closing date for the hunting season in upper Michigan.

State game authorities point out no one is allowed after this date to carry firearms in game cover unless he possesses a special permit from the department of conservation. These permits, it is further emphasized, are not generally distributed and the regulation is strict.

The closing regulation continues until the opening of the wild fowl season, September 16.

The new Shtras law in Michigan makes the penalty for poachers particularly severe, and that regulation, it is pointed out, is contributing materially to a careful conservation of game, particularly in the upper peninsula.

It is especially valuable, authorities say, in the deer regions where the illegal killing of deer has been persistent in the past. Now the mere holding of a gun in a hunting area, is sufficient evidence for arrest and conviction.

Radio Noise Test Being Continued

Those interested in the locating of the source of the noises which have been interfering with radio reception of late, continued their investigation yesterday to the "three phase power" circuit.

Various parts of the power line were segregated one by one until it was finally determined that the cause of the trouble is located somewhere near the business district. A radio receiving set, equipped with a loop, aerial, was set up in various sections of the city in an effort to locate the source of the objectionable noise. The investigators' efforts were hindered, however, because of the fact that the buzzing sounds occurred only at intervals, not continuing long enough to allow satisfactory tests. The work will be continued today.

Most of the drawings resembled those of cubists, futurists and super-realist. Only such paintings were exhibited as had been done by patients who had not been artists previous to their admissions to the institutions for the insane.

Most of the contributors to the exhibit had had no notion of drawing previously, but when admitted to the institution began drawing or painting on the lids of boxes or any paper which happened to come into their possession. To some of them, the physicians had furnished crayons and colors.

New York, Feb. 1.—(P)—Erratic price movements reflecting the nervousness of professional traders, characterized today's stock market. Prices opened relatively steady, advanced during the forenoon, experienced a bad sinking spell in the early afternoon and then made irregular recovery. Trading showed a tendency to slacken on the rallies and quicken on the declines. The day's sales ran over 2,000,000 shares.

Fears of increase in the Boston and Philadelphia reserve banks discount rates, which proved to be unfounded, were believed to be an important factor in the day's selling. Publication of the quarterly report showing only \$1.08 of the \$1.75 common dividend earned, also had a depressing effect on speculative sentiment, although it was offset to some extent by the reported increase in the corporation's mill operations to around 89 per cent of capacity. U. S. Steel common closed 14 1/4 points net lower at 14 1/2, Colorado Fuel dropped 3 points and the other steels showed only fractional changes.

Studebaker and Overland motors were fairly active on the up-side, while General Motors, Hudson, Hupp and Chrysler lost ground. Unconfirmed reports that Henry Ford was having difficulty in getting into full production, owing to alleged inability to obtain accessories, were circulated as bullish propaganda on the motor group.

Oil was reactionary, reports of the smallest weekly production of crude since 1926 being offset by the publication of a poor Maryland report and the recent reduction in the Pure Oil dividend. Call money held steady at 4 1/2 per cent all day. Time money and commercial paper were firm. Foreign exchanges were irregular with a 15-point jump in Spanish pesetas to 17.10 cents as the only feature. Sterling cables ruled around \$4.87-16.

Will Investigate Selling Plans of Real Estate Men

Lansing, Feb. 1.—(P)—Representatives of several real estate concerns which have employed the practice of giving away or selling at reduced prices, equities or portions of lots to encourage subdivision development, were questioned by the state securities commission today. The Detroit Better Business Bureau was interested in the hearing. It was alleged that persons to whom lots or equities were given became parties to a "come-on" which eventually caused them to pay more than the property was worth.

Officers of the St. Joseph Development company operating in Jackson and Grand Rapids, said they selected a certain number of patrons to whom they sold half of a \$250 lot for \$39.50. They denied that the purchaser was requested to buy the other half.

A representative of the Continental Development company of Muskegon, asserted his concern planned to get about three times its original investment back, but stated that many other expenses enter in before subdivision is completed and sold.

Detroit companies were charged with employing house to house agents who were not properly licensed. Further hearings will be held Thursday.

Section of Bullet Scarred Wall Is Shown in Court

Ottawa, Ill., Feb. 1.—(P)—A dramatic account of an elderly woman, shot and dragged to a basement grave, might have been told by a bullet-scarred section of wall, had it possessed power to talk at the Harry Hill murder trial today.

Its face only, however, betrayed to the court room crowd the secrets it held, and left to imaginations the reconstruction of the scene the fatal night early last August. It was then, the state contends, that the twenty year old son killed his mother, wealthy divorced wife of Dr. H. C. Hill, oculist.

The piece of plaster and lathing was only one of many exhibits placed before the jurors. Blood stained, dingy boards taken from the basement stairway of the Hill home lay on a table and on the floor were pieces of brick, a worn section of linoleum, odd packages wrapped in newspapers and brown paper, suit cases full of articles of clothing and an old-fashioned oil lamp.

Charles Thiel, special investigator in the state's attorney's office, identified the articles as those taken from the home after Mrs. Eliza Hill's body had been found August 22.
