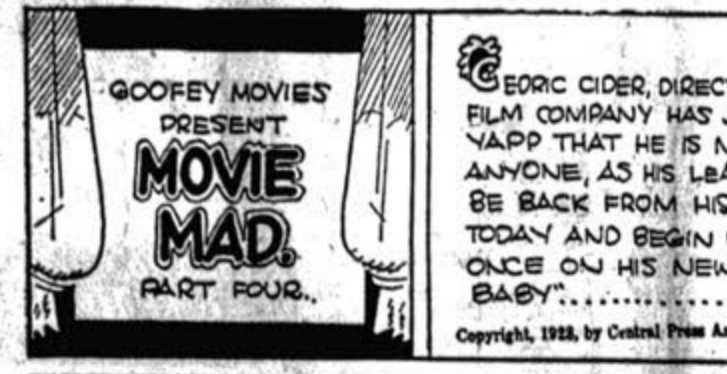

TO ENLARGE FAIR STORE

\$18,000 to Be Spent in Improvements Before Holidays

As soon as Anderson & Bonefeld's furniture store is moved to its new home in the Semer building, the Fair Store will start an extensive program of improvements to the interior of the building and enlargement of the departments, costing more than \$18,000. The work will be rushed along in an effort to have all in readiness for the Christmas holiday shopping season.

The Grand Rapids Store Equipment corporation has had its experts survey the local department store, and has drafted an elaborate plan embodying the modern features of the large metropolitan stores. Although the immediate project calls for an expenditure of about \$18,000, more than \$40,000 will be spent eventually in the carrying out of the general improvement plan.

The exterior of the store has been redecorated in front and the installation of a large Neon sign adds to its attractiveness. The famous Fair Store clock has been removed, but a new electric timepiece will be erected in the front in the near future.

With the taking over of the quarters occupied by Anderson & Bonefeld, the Fair Store will have 7,000 square feet additional selling space on the third floor and 2,000 feet for storage on the fourth floor.

Included in the major improvements will be the abandonment of the outside basement entrance, which will be replaced by an interior entrance. The east side entrance to the main floor of the building will be moved to permit more window display space, and elaborate changes will be made to the front entrance, including an attractive terrace floor and modern fixtures.

To save steps for customers wishing to go to and from the departments on the main floor, an additional east-west lane will be provided in the center. The cloak and receiving rooms will be removed to other floors to allow more selling space on the main floor. Other improvements to be made on this floor are the installation of a new lighting system, abolition of the basket system of delivery, re-

moval of the offices to the third floor, transfer of the shoe department from second floor and installation of new show counters and other fixtures. A complete juvenile wear department will be given a prominent position on the rear of the second floor. The yard goods, drapery and bedding department will be moved to the third floor, which because of the presence of natural light, more satisfactory matching of fabrics can be made by customers than on the first floor, where artificial light must of necessity be used. This department will be enlarged about three times its present size.

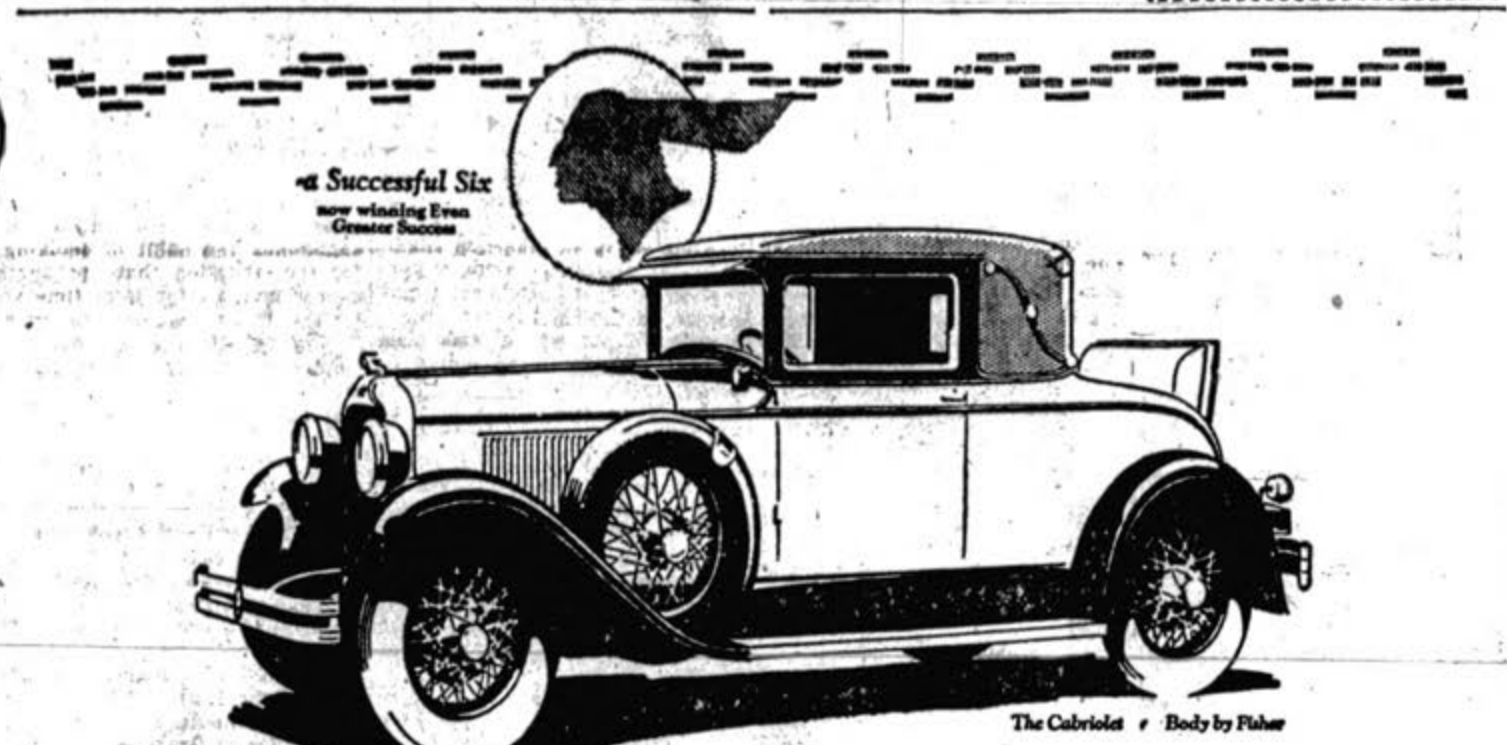

"Artistic Temperament" Has No Part in Sousa's Habits or Organization

Lieutenant Commander John Philip Sousa, the eminent composer and conductor of Sousa's Band, who comes to Escanaba Thursday, has little liking for, or sympathy with, the long-haired eccentrics, who seem to think the chief evidence of musicianship is an abnormality of conduct. Mr. Sousa is left distinctly cold by displays of "the artistic temperament" (which is so often merely an eight syllabled way of pronouncing "temper").

Mr. Sousa learned his first lesson in despising temperament gone mad, early in his childhood. He was a "kid" in knee pants—not that the trousers (as they frequently do) played any part in making the lad remember a cruel taskmaster. "Johnny" Sousa wanted to learn music—ever since he proudly watched his father play the slide trombone in a martial band that marched down Pennsylvania Avenue, way back in 1855, when the weary battalions were about to be mustered out, after four long years of service afield. Accordingly, the boy began the study of violin under an irritable instructor. The "professor" chided him for drawing too short a bow ("drawing the long bow" never being a Sousa trait, you see) and the youth spoke up, in defense, saying he was too close to the wall. "Johnny" clubbed his own violin, and defied the man to "lay a finger on me," but the boy ultimately fled, when the instructor made a final "temperamental" dash for him. The

young Sousa went safely home, and ever after on the boy's mental retina was imprinted a vision of the silliness and unworthiness of "temperament" when a synonym of abnormality. 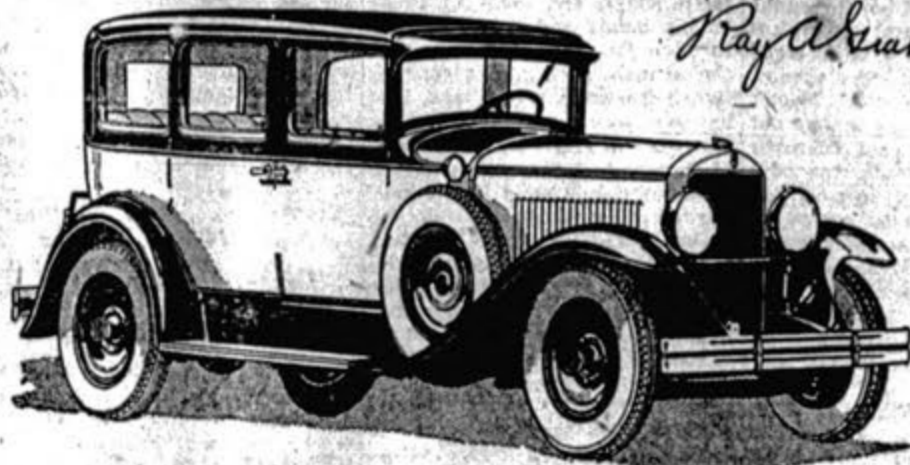

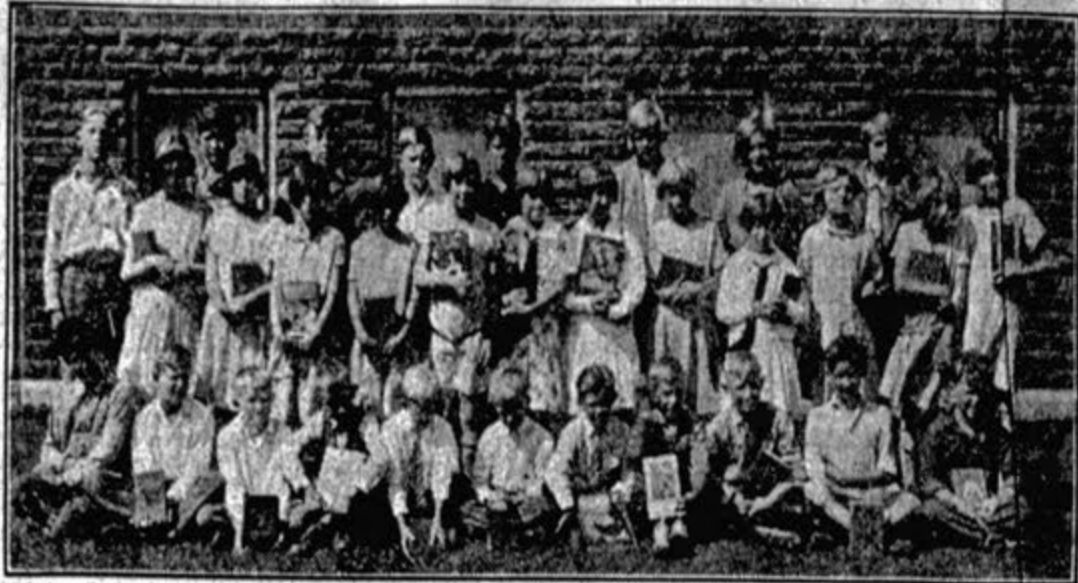

Home Tested Recipes

A number of requests are received at The Press office each season for canning and pickling recipes. These have been printed in previous years. The pickling and canning season is now in progress and some of the recipes which have been tried may prove interesting.

A few recipes will be printed each day. They will be given in the order in which they are received by housewives requesting them. Send your requests early while the season is on.

Green Tomato Pickles.
1-1/2 bushel green tomatoes.
6 large onions.

6 large green peppers.
1-1/4 pound white mustard seed.
2 tablespoons celery salt.
Chop all together rather fine; place in layers, one of tomatoes, one of onions, one of salt, using in all one-cup of salt. Let this stand over night, or if you do this in the day time, let stand about nine hours. Squeeze dry and put in kettle to boil with two quarts of cider vinegar. Cook until tender. When nearly done add one pound granulated sugar and put in fruit jars and seal tight.

Chill Sauce.
Scald and peel 18 large ripe tomatoes; chop six large onions and three green peppers. Cook all until tender (about twenty minutes to one-half hour), then add one cup granulated sugar and 2-1/4 cups vinegar. Add one teaspoon each

cinnamon, allspice, nutmeg, two teaspoons salt, 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves. Cook ten minutes, after adding spices, and seal while hot.

Hot Relish.
1 peck green tomatoes,
3 red peppers,
3 green peppers,
2 cups chopped onions.

Put all through food grinder; sprinkle with salt, and let stand over night. In the morning strain well and add six cups of cider vinegar, two cups granulated sugar, one-half cup mustard seed. Do not cook. Place in a stone crock and cover with a cloth and a plate. This will keep all winter. This may also be put in fruit jars if desired.

FRIENDS VISIT WITH AL SMITH

Political Leaders Spending Week-end at Capital

By Paul F. Haubert
Associated Press Staff Writer
Albany, N. Y., Sept. 8—(P)—Three of Governor Smith's close friends, on whom he depends for political counsel, are at the executive mansion for the week-end, and another was expected tonight to aid in mapping out campaign strategy prior to the departure of the Democratic presidential nominee a week hence on his first real stumping tour.

The group is made of Joseph M. Proskauer, former Justice of the New York state supreme court; Mrs. Belle Moskowitz, in charge of Democratic campaign publicity, her husband, Dr. Henry Moskowitz, a biographer of the governor, and Herbert H. Lehman, the Democratic campaign director of finance. Lehman sent word today that he would be in Albany tonight. The others had preceded him here.

Seeks Recreation.
Decisions of importance are expected to be reached at the series of informal conferences which are to get under way in earnest with Lehman's arrival. He managed one of the presidential nominee's gubernatorial campaigns.

Although he planned to devote considerable time over the week-end to the shaping up of his fight for the presidency, Governor Al Smith was in the mood also for some rest and relaxation. When he met newspapermen at the executive mansion at noon today for his daily press conference he was in golf togs, prepared to get out

in the sunshine during the afternoon for a round or two of exercise.

At the outset of the press interview the governor made public an exchange of letters between Clarence A. Barnes, Republican candidate for attorney general of Massachusetts and himself over the "Albany baseball pool," which the federal authorities are attempting to break up. Barnes has charged that the pool was taking over a million dollars from railroad and industrial workers of Massachusetts every year.

Denies Walker's Move.
During the press conference, the nominee declined to comment on the statement of Herbert Hoover that the signing, during the Harding and Coolidge administrations of the Washington Arms treaties, the Dawes reparation plan and the Kellogg renunciation of war pacts constituted the greatest contribution toward world peace of any nation since the signing of the Versailles treaty.

An inquiry, prompted by a press dispatch that Mayor Walker of New York was seeking to arrange a meeting between the governor and Senator Norris of Nebraska, the Republican Independent who has not declared himself as between Hoover and Smith, brought from the Democratic standard bearer the statement that he knew of no such move.
