NEWS FROM MANY POINTS

A Bunch of Interesting Things that are Taking Place Over the World.

Havana—Land in Cuba is rapidly passing into the hands of Americans. In the province of Santiago Americans have bought 1,000,000 acres, and in Camaguey they own a larger proportionate amount. Senor Zayas urged the adoption of a bill providing that foreigners in whose native countries the law forbids foreigners to hold land, be prohibited from owning land in Cuba.

Berlin—Members of the German Reichstag are to be paid hereafter at the rate of \$50 a year, and \$7.50 will be deducted for each day's absence.

Atlanta—A committee has been appointed to investigate the advisability of municipal ownership of the street railway which is to be built in Albany, Ga. The city now owns all its public utilities.

Washington—The movement to unite all patriotic societies throughout the United States is making rapid progress. At a preliminary meeting held in this city, Joseph M. Thompson, the official telegrapher of the House of Representatives, was chosen president of the federation.

Berlin—An important discovery of iron ore deposits has been made near Aillerebach, in Saxony, in fact, it is the most important discovery of iron ore that has been made in Germany. The deposits are nearly two miles in length 167 feet in width and 67 feet in thickness and it is calculated that they contain sufficient ore to keep the blast furnaces of a company founded at Rosenberg at work for 250 years.

ORE RECORD WAS BROKEN

Lake Superior sets new Mark for Ore Shipping.

The figures on the April ore movement from the head of Lake Superior show that all records for the opening month of navigation in this traffic were broken. The start has been favorable to a realization of the prediction that more than 25,000,000 tons of ore will be moved during the season of 1906 but vesselmen will be badly handicapped if the present lake strike—and resulting tie-up continues for even a few days longer.

The complete figures show that 984,351 gross tons were moved in April as compared with 875,195 tons for April a year ago. The Duluth & Iron Range shipped 390,708 tons, as compared with 321,333 tons a year ago. The Missabe road shipped 383,643 tons, as compared with 263,812 tons and the Great Northern 210,000, as compared with 290,000 tons in the same month a year ago. The Great Northern did not ship as much as in April a year ago, but the total for the head of the lake docks—Two Harbors, Duluth and Superior—shows a large increase over a year ago. The lake marine strike, will, of course, hurt the ore movement for May. The Duluth, Missabe Northern road delivered 955,000 tons of ore to its docks on April 30, which is a record movement for any one road for any day in April.

TROWEL WAS IN DETROIT

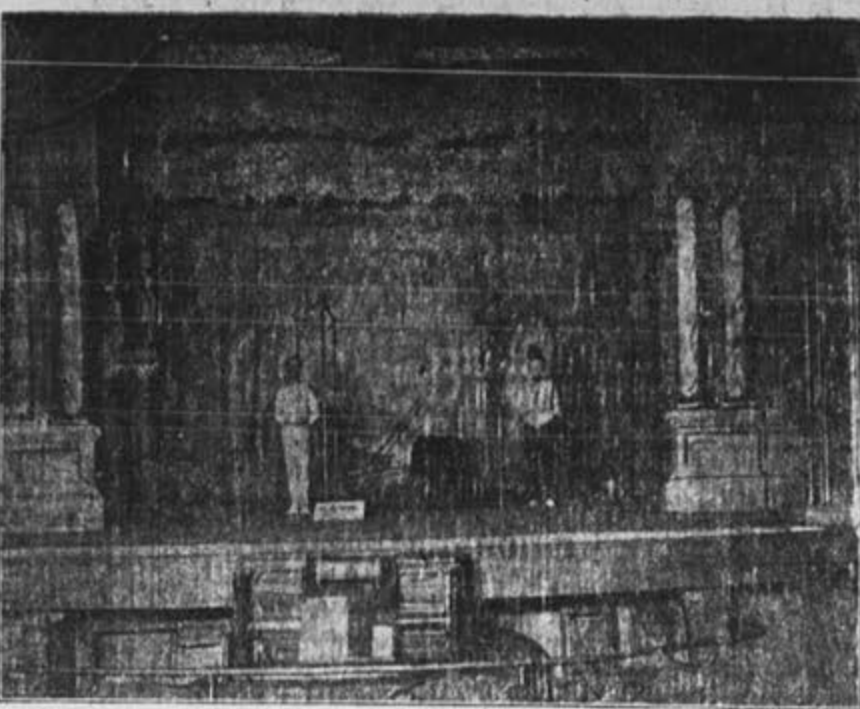
Masonic Emblem From New York was In No. 2 Lodge Detroit.

WANTED TO COMMIT HUBBY

Irate Menominee County Woman Said Husband was Insane.

Menominee county officers ran into a rather interesting case in the county this week, when a woman giving her name as Mrs. Arnold and who resided at the backyards a few miles up the bay shore, came to Probate Judge Styles and asked him to go up to her home and have her husband examined and sent to the asylum as insane.

She told a long story concerning her husband's alleged insanity, and the officials made the trip up to the home. The officials say that the home was one of the most splendid, untidy places that they had ever seen. The inside of the house looked as if it had very little if any care at all. In decided contrast to this was the yard and out buildings. The gardens were neatly planted and staked out the chicken yards and coops were in excellent shape, as were also the barns. The woodshed was filled with neatly cut wood, and, in fact, the whole of the exterior would denote an unusual degree of industry.

The man himself appeared to be a hard working fellow—with some degree of intelligence, and the story told by him explained fully the woman's actions and showed that she desired to have her husband placed in an asylum simply through spite.

It seems that the little son had found a piece of fisherman's twine which the father used for repairing some tools. The boy refused to give it to him and the mother sided with the boy. A quarrel was the result and the woman left the house and came down with the request that her husband be shut up as an insane man.

Just who was at fault in regard to the matter is hard to tell, but from the appearance of the inside of the home where the woman was supposed to have been doing the housework and the garden and outbuildings where the husband's work was visible, the officers concluded that the husband was in the right and entitled to a certain degree of sympathy rather than reproach.

WILL NEVER RUN AGAIN

Former Iron Works of Marinette Sunk a lot of Money.

The plant of the Marinette Iron Works Manufacturing company, manufacturers of gas engines, which was moved from Marinette to Chicago Heights Ill., is still in the receiver's hands.

Thirty attorneys, representing many creditors are engaged in a legal battle for what they can get out of the assets. The creditors will probably fare very poorly.

The company borrowed money and issued bonds to the Curn Exchange bank, Chicago. The bank will get first whack at the assets and the remainder will go to the creditors. The latter will not have much left. Marinette and Menominee capitalists lose over \$150,000 by the failure of the concern and in all about \$400,000 has been sunk in efforts to make the gas engine a success.

T. C. Miller, the general manager of the company has gone back into the railroad business it is said. The factory is still intact at Chicago Heights waiting until the creditors' fight is over before it is either sold or dismantled. At one time the concern employed about 500 hands in Marinette.

COUNCIL SHOULD TAKE ACTION

Measure to Prohibit the Use of Giant Crackers and Explosive Cases Should be Taken.

As the time draws near for the celebration of the Fourth of July, the mayor and council should take action in regard to the sale and use of giant fire crackers and explosive cases.

Plenty of noise can be made without these dangerous pieces of celebration material and the time to act is just about the next meeting of the council. Taking steps far enough in advance will give the merchants a chance to cancel any orders that they may have in for those goods and will prevent others from ordering their supply.
