

TWO CAPTAINS ARE SUSPENDED

Investigation of the collision be tween the steel steamers Sylvania and Bessemer off Whitefish point, Lake Superior, June 13, 1905, by Local Inspectors York and Gooding, has resulted in the suspension of the master of each vessel, Captain J. W. Ehrbart, who commanded the Sylvania is suspended for sixty days, and Captain W. S. Hosg. of the Bessemer for fifteen

Action in the case of Captain Ebrbart is stated to be for non-compliance with Rules I and III, of the Pliot Rules, while Captain Hoag falled to observe the provisions of Rule XV.

Rule I relates to the passing of vessels "bead and bead," when it shall be the duty of each steamer to the pilot of either steamer being allowed to first signify his intention. Rule III states that if either pilot fails for any reason to understand the intention of the other vessel, he shall indicate bis failure to understand such intention by five short and rapid blasts of the whistle. If both boats are then within a balf mile of each other, both shall be slowed to a speed barely sufficient for steerageway, until proper signals are exchanged and understood. This rule also forbids "cross signals." Rule XV relates to the operation of boats in a fog or thick weather, and states that they shall move at moderate speed. The rule also says: "A steam vessel bearing the fog signal of another vessel, apparently not more than four points from right ahead, shall at once reduce her speed to hare steerageway and navigate with caution until the

vessels bave passed each other." The collision between the Sylvania and the Bessemer occurred in a thick fog, early in the morning. The Sylvania was on her way down with ore, and the Bessemer was going up light. Damage to the Sylvania was estimated 440 Acres In Maple Ridge Township, mixed at \$10,000, and to the B. ssemer at \$40,000. The Sylvania struck the Bessmer a glancing blow on the Besse mer's port side, ripping a wide hole through the plating for a distance of 175 feet about six feet above the water and was damaged about the bow
