Jack Doyle has arrived in Des Moines and will play first base as well as act as manager of the team.

 "Happy Jack" Chesbro of the New York Americans is certainly getting his so far this season.  
 The Boston Americans have added one more heavy hitting game to their credit. This time the Highlanders were the victims, the Pilgrims making 23 hits.  
 The Indianapolis and Minneapolis ball teams have been indicted by the grand jury for playing Sunday ball in the Hoosier capital.  
 It looks as though "organized ball" cuts very little figure with the Tri-State league. Apparently they don't care whether they "am" or "am not." The league is playing nice ball all around the circuit and everyone looks for a close race.  
 Little Rock got a bad start in the Southern league. The team lost eleven out of twelve games.  
 There will be racing at the Kenilworth track, Buffalo, from June 4 to July 7. Among the stakes announced are the Buffalo Derby, with a guaranteed value of \$3,500, and the Niagara Handicap, also \$3,500.

PEASANT GETS LARGE FORTUNE

Madrid, May 9.—Special.—Like a fairy tale is the story published in the Madrid press this week of the sudden wealth acquired by Andres Gonzalez, a peasant of Colmenar de Oreja. Struck by the peculiar appearance of a piece of stone sticking out of the ground near his house, he dug and brought to light an earthenware pot full of gold coin.  
 Andres took into his confidence his wife, brother, and sister-in-law, and it was decided that the matter must be kept quiet. A few days later the two men set out for this city and sold their treasure for some \$2,000.  
 In order to allay the suspicions of the neighbors, it was arranged that Andres should write his brother a letter saying that he had won the money in a lottery. But, unfortunately, the women concerned could not keep the story of their wonderful luck quiet, and as soon as the story leaked out Andres received a visit from a lawyer who claimed half the proceeds on behalf of the landlord, to which the latter is entitled by the law of Spain.  
 At first Andres denied all knowledge of the "find," but involving himself afterwards in contradictions, he had to make a clean breast of the affair and pay up.  
 But his troubles did not end here. He was summoned before a magis rate on a charge of concealing treasure trove. He was convicted and sent to jail for six months, while the others concerned got off with sentences of two months each for aiding and abetting the concealment of the treasure.

The characteristics which Secretary Shaw refers to as the "microbe of discontent" and the "virus of unrest" have played important parts in the political movements of past years and can not safely be left out of consideration. The reported retirement of Prof. Ferris as a possible Democrat nominee for governor will add to the strenuous task undertaken by the railroad opponents of Governor Warner. It will be recalled that while the question of railroad assessments were being discussed at Lansing in February last, one aggressive railroad attorney threatened the governor with defeat by fifty thousand majority because of his alleged interest and influence against railroad efforts. The contract involved in that threat is not becoming easier to fulfill.

Before making further preparations for repeating the campaign of two years ago, in accordance with their proclaimed intention, it might be well for the Democrats of Michigan to take another inventory of their campaign material on hand. All their specialties of the last campaign must be laid away. However, it will probably be just as easy to create new alarms and to uphold the banner of some new device to serve for the season as it was two years ago.

**CLEVELAND TO GIVE ADDRESS**

Philadelphia, Pa., May 9.—Special.—Several thousand delegates representing practically every state and territory of the Union are gathered in Philadelphia for the thirty-third annual session of the National Conference of Charities and Correction. The formal opening takes place in the academy of music tonight and the proceedings of the conference will continue through the greater part of next week. The deliberations will cover every known field of charitable endeavor. Addresses will be delivered by men in charge of corrections in every large city of the country. The speeches will bear largely on the administration of public charities, their financing, the proper training of charity workers and the education of the poor and the care of children.

Among the men of prominence who will take an active part in the conference are former President Grover Cleveland, Governor Stokes of New Jersey, Judge Julian Mack of Chicago Juvenile Court, William C. Ball of Terre Haute, Ind., Alexander Johnson of New York City, and Ernest P. Bicknell, general superintendent of the Chicago bureau of charities.  
 Minneapolis has sent a large delegation here with an invitation to hold the next conference in that city. It has the support of the entire Northwest and the invitation probably will be accepted.
