**AMONG THE POLITICIANS**

If the present plans of the regular Republicans eventuate, the general assembly of Delaware will be called into

extraordinary session shortly and Col. Henry A. Dupont will be elected United States senator to fill the existing vacancy.  
 The next legislature of West Virginia is to choose a successor to Senator Stephen B. Elkins, whose term expires next March. Indications are not lacking that Senator Elkins will have the fight of his life to defeat the movement to retire him from the arena of national politics.  
 Thomas B. Wanamaker, proprietor of the Philadelphia North American and the Philadelphia Record, is a candidate for the United States senate to succeed Boies Penrose.

The recent Republican primary in South Dakota resulted in a distinct victory for the faction led by Robert J. Gamble, who is a candidate for reelection to the United States senate.

The belief is fast gaining ground that Governor Warfield of Maryland is a candidate for the United States senate to succeed Senator German, and with that end in view, that he will be in the field for a renomination for the governorship.

The Republican state convention of Vermont will be held next month, and as matters now look Col. Fletcher H. Proctor, son of United States Senator Redfield Proctor, will be nominated for Governor.

The reubmission to the people of the question of prohibition is to be the issue of this year's campaign in Maine. The Republicans meet in state convention June 20, and the Democrats will

gather one week later. Governor Cobb will be renominated by the Republicans, and in all probability the Democratic standard bearer will be Cyrus W. Davis.

The Wisconsin Democratic state convention for the adoption of a platform of principles will be held in Milwaukee June 27 and 28.

**MANY LOSE INSURANCE**

Insertion of Earthquake Exception Clause in Policies Causes Loss to Frisco Property Owners.

It transpires that the so-called "earthquake clause" in insurance policies which has been the cause of so much unrest in San Francisco, is not a separate clause, but consists simply of the insertion of the word "earthquake" in the list of exemptions, the sentence in which the word appears. When the exemption is made, reads as follows: "This company shall not be liable for loss by fire resulting directly or indirectly from insurrection, riot, earthquake, etc."

This discovery is not significant, however, as the exemption is just as strong as it would have been if it were made in a separate clause. But the discovery that the exemptions are comparatively few in number means very much for San Francisco. It is reported that out of the one hundred and twelve companies involved in the double calamity, the policies of only fourteen contain the earthquake exemption. This fact insures better settlements than were believed to be possible under the circumstances. Moreover, a majority of the representatives of the interested British insurance companies, at a formal meeting, inclined to the view that all companies whose policies do not contain the earthquake exemption will have to pay the losses on buildings that were dynamited to stay the progress of the flames.

It would appear that the business men of San Francisco are not in bad straits, so far as "insurance money" is concerned, inasmuch as there has been no rush into bankruptcy by stricken companies. Their only fear as to the future is that incident to possible establishments of business at rival ports, pending the rehabilitation of the city. Oakland is appealing for enterprises that were set adrift by the disaster, and so are Portland, Tacoma, and Seattle. While these cities have not been lagged in the matter of relief, they all have an eye to "the main chance," and this is causing a deal of uneasiness among property owners in the ruined city.

**REV. ROONEY GIVES PROTEST.**

In Annual Memorial Sermon Pastor of First Baptist Church Strongly Condemned Desecration of Memorial day.

A stirring appeal against the desecration of Memorial day by the arrangement of unseemly pleasures and athletic sports, was that given by the Rev. J. C. Rooney, pastor of the First Baptist church, yesterday morning when he delivered the annual Memorial sermon before the members of the C. F. Smith post G. A. R., Spanish-American war veterans and members of the Woman's Relief corps.

"I protest in the name of the nation's great multitude of soldier dead against the desecration of the day consecrated to their memory by pleasure making and pleasure seeking," said the Rev. Rooney.

"Memorial day is one occasion of the year when all pleasures should be denied and all men of the nation join in paying reverence to the memory of the men who fought through the years of 61 to 65 in order that the nation might believe and in order a great period of prosperity might be enjoyed by their sons and daughters."

That sufficient attention is not today given by the people of the country to the events of the civil war and not sufficient respect shown to the memory of the men who fought and died and to those who fought and survived, was another of the thoughts given by Mr. Rooney in the course of an address which singularly stirred his audience of veterans and members of their families.

At the conclusion of the memorial sermon by Mr. Rooney, George H. H. Estover, chief clerk of the railway mail service with headquarters in Escanaba, and for many years before coming to Escanaba a prominent figure in Illinois G. A. R. circles, responded in a short address commending the position that had been taken by Mr. Rooney against the desecration of Memorial day.

"In the name of the Grand Army of the Republic I as one of its members cannot at this time forebear to commend the sentiment that you have expressed here today against the desecration of a day so dear to the old soldiers of the country."

"The sentiment that you have expressed today has touched the heart of every veteran who served in the days of 1861 to 1865. Memorial day is to us a day to be held sacred and it is the thought that there are those, not of us, who will stand against its desecration that has strongly appealed to every veteran here today."

The Rev. Rooney in responding to the address of Mr. Estover was deeply touched and said that his personal feelings against modern day methods of observing Memorial day were so strong that it was not frequently that he allowed himself to voice his convictions.

The First Baptist church was crowded yesterday morning when the members of the C. F. Smith post of the G. A. R. together with all soldiers and marines of Escanaba, Spanish-American war veterans and members of the Woman's Relief corps were seated in that church together with the regular congregation and others who had been attracted by the special service.

The sermon of Mr. Rooney was in part a stirring recitation of some of the events of the civil war and the sentiment which should surround the Memorial day. It was an eloquent discourse against the present day practices of arranging horse races, ball games and other forms of pleasure on Memorial day. Many strong thoughts were presented and the response that was given by Mr. Estover in behalf of the G. A. R. showed well the manner in which the address had been received by the veterans.

The church was especially decorated for the occasion with flags, palms and ferns and presented a decidedly patriotic appearance.

Special musical numbers were given by the choir and at the close of the service all in the audience joined in singing America.

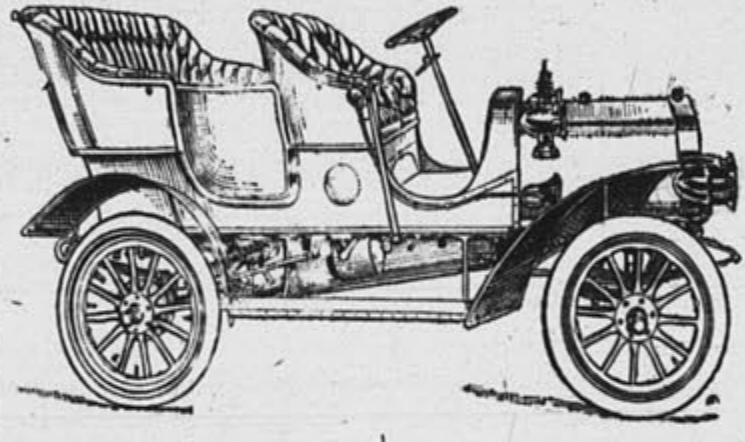

**AUTOMOBILES TO REPLACE FIRE HORSE**

Chicago Chief Believes Animals Must Pass--Sends His Own Charger to Sausage Factory and Gets an Auto.

(From the Indianapolis News.)  
 Chicago May 8.—Fire Marshal John Champion has sounded the passing of that romantic, dashing and heroic old animal—the horse.

The chief this week inaugurated a two cylinder, 22 horse power, 1906 model "F" Buick automobile, as the official head of the Chicago fire department, relegating his trusty old gallop to either the green pastures or the sausage factory, according to the fancy of fate.

With the appropriation voted him by the city council on the recommendation of the finance committee, the chief made his purchase, selecting a car especially equipped and fitted up for the business of a fireman.

The equipment consists of the following:  
 Electric lights from bull's eyes to tail lamp.  
 Electric danger gong instead of bulb horn.

Leather faced tires with steel pebbled tread.  
 Heavily enforced canopy top to withstand falling debris.

The chief believes the automobile is the best possible means of locomotion to a fireman. He points to the equipment of the fire patrol with electric

trucks and says that the passing of a few years will leave the department equipped with automobile fire apparatus from hose and ladder trucks to engine.

Chief Champion is now able to visit any of the outer or suburban districts of Chicago with his own vehicle. Heretofore he has been forced to trust to tardy trains and slow going street cars. (From the Newark, N. J. News, May 5, 1906.)

Only a few weeks before the bill climbing contests in the second week of May, Indianapolis autoists are taking advantage of the good roads and fair weather. Michigan hill is now used every day for trial runs. Many cars have made preliminary runs, in good time. Sidney Elston drove up the bill in a Franklin in fifty-four seconds.

Probably the best time on the bill was made yesterday by a twenty-two horse power Buick touring car, sold by the Federal Motor Car Company of this city. The time for the complete climb from the bottom to the road at the top was thirty-four seconds which is considered remarkable.

**MADE STANDING START.**  
 No flying start was made by the car, but a run of about fifty yards was sufficient for a little car to begin the ascent, and when once started it made the climb as if no bill were in the way. In addition to weighing 1,700 and 1,800 pounds the car carried two passengers, Gordon Varney of the Varney Electric Company and a friend making the first trip and Len Carr and another passenger making the second trip in the record time.

The trial was considered an excellent test and the Buick probably will be a strong contender for first place honors in the contests next month.

### LAWYER FIGHTS WANTS DAMAGES

Municipal Lawyer Brings Suit Against Saloonkeeper who Sold Him Liquor While Intoxicated.

Cornelius F. Donahoe, of Municipal circuit court commissioner and former city attorney of that city, wants Hans Hanson, a saloonkeeper to pay him \$8,500 damages. Attorney Donahoe, has, therefore commenced suit by declaration in the circuit court, making Mr. Hanson and his two bondsmen defendants. At present Mr. Donahoe is acting as his own attorney. "In his declaration plaintiff sets up that at eleven o'clock on Saturday night February 3, 1906 he himself and a man named Steep were in Hanson's saloon and that both were intoxicated. Furthermore, that although they were intoxicated Hanson continued to sell them beer and other intoxicants until the hour of five o'clock Sunday morning, February 4.

Plaintiff further alleges that by reason of their intoxication he and Steep got into an altercation and that the latter struck him a violent blow in the face, breaking his eye glasses and forcing pieces of the lens into his right eye. By reason of this blow plaintiff avers his eye was severely injured and the sight permanently impaired. Furthermore, that because of this injury he was obliged to spend many weeks in a Marquette hospital and that he has suffered great pain, loss of business and has been to many hundreds of dollars expense for nursing and medical attendance.

Mr. Donahoe says it is his intention, if possible, to have the case tried on its merits at the June term of the circuit court."

### ANTI-NUPTIAL FETES ARE ON

Many Events are Arranged in Honor of Coming Marriage of King Alfonso.

Madrid, May 28.—Special.—The fetes preceding the wedding of King Alfonso and Princess Ena whirl along with bewildering impetuosity. They have converted Madrid into a city difflused with rainbows.

Pictures of the young monarch and his future consort gleam from almost every wall and window. The king's patriotic subjects are making bedlam of the streets, and visitors agree that never before have they seen such extraordinary wealth and brilliancy of decorations.

Great silken flags, with red and yellow streamers, pennants of silver and gold and festoons of sweets melting flowers, choke the air, resolving the sunshine into partial night. If the king escapes these tokens of popular feeling it can be only by leaving Madrid, for they hang thick in every thoroughfare and drape every public square.

Under the flags and banners merry-makers hold a noisy holiday. Groups of sweet voiced youngsters stray hither and thither, singing popular songs. Mandolin and guitar players are met frequently at the cross streets and in the public squares, with crowds around them. Brass bands scream the national anthem, stirring the hot blood of the Spaniards until they throw their voices into the music and make the city tremble with its volume.

Occasionally King Alfonso, accompanied by the queen mother or by one or another of the royal guests, drives past in an open carriage, their approach heralded by mounted officers. Then follows a scene of head-ringing tumult, men, women and children rushing pell-mell for the line of march. Their clothing gets torn, their hats are lost and human hair waves chaotically in the breeze. The king, amid a mighty shouting, sweeps by, bowing and laughing.

Today's link in the chain of regal festivities embraced the formal reception of a number of deputations, ambassadors and other representatives from foreign powers, who presented to the king letters of congratulation from their sovereigns or governments. Among those received were the Prince and Princess of Wales, Grand Duke Vladimir of Russia, the Duke and Duchess of Sparta, Archduke Ferdinand of Austria, Prince Albrecht of Prussia, Frederick W. Whitebridge, the American representative, and the envoys of Norway, China, Denmark, Italy, France and other countries. Tomorrow the foreign envoys will be formally introduced to Princess Ena at the Pardo palace.

### NEW COURSE IS PROVIDED FOR

Library Science will be new Branch of Study Taught at Northern Normal School.

It is the intention of the state board of library commissioners to place a short course of library science in the summer school to be held at Marquette this year, and also at the other state normal schools at Mt. Pleasant, Ypsilanti and Kalamazoo. The object of the plan is to place before the teachers of rural schools and in small towns and villages, who are generally the custodians of the school libraries, the elementary training which will enable them to use and help the pupils to use books in an intelligent manner.

Practical instruction will be given on the following subjects: General care and management of a small library, selection of books, practical use of school libraries, accessioning, classification, cataloging, reference work and school work.

Special lectures will be given on topics of value to the librarians of small libraries, but the work will be largely practical and individual. The students will be divided into small groups, and one hour a day will be given to each group. The general instruction will be given at an hour when the entire class can be present.

Each student will have practice work in the various branches of library science and an opportunity to examine the modern appliances connected with scientific library work. Model libraries will also be arranged for the use of the students. The knowledge acquired will be as valuable in a library of 100 volumes as in 1,000.

As the number of students in these classes must necessarily be limited, it is desirable the teachers who expect to attend the summer institutes will give the matter immediate consideration, and if they decide to take the library course, will send their names either to the county commissioners of schools or to the secretary of the state board of library commissioners at Lansing.

Chicago, Ill., May 28.—Special.—Bids are opened here today for the contract for furnishing the machinery for the Garden City Irrigation project, in western Kansas. This irrigation project is attracting considerable attention on account of novel features involved in its construction. The water must be recovered from the underflow waters of the Arkansas valley, which lie in gravel deposits existing below the bed of the river. It is therefore necessary to sink several hundred wells from which the water will be pumped and discharged into a collecting conduit.

### GIRL'S SHOT PROVED FATAL

Edward Gruber, Prominent Merchant of Newberry Dies as Result of Wound Inflicted by Fiancée.

Edward Gruber, of Newberry, victim of a shooting accident at Dollarville, May 18, died suddenly Saturday afternoon. Until an hour before death ensued, the patient appeared to be on the road to recovery, but heart complications set in and within a short time thereafter, he expired. Gruber was a prominent merchant at Newberry, having been engaged in the jewelry business in the town for several years. May 13 in company with two young women, one of whom was his fiancée, Miss Anna Hall, he undertook to instruct them in the art of using a rifle. The party repaired to the woods in the vicinity of Dollarville where Gruber placed a mark on a tree several paces distant from the young women and calmly throwing up both hands exclaimed, "Now, I am ready to die." The weapon which was in Miss Hall's hands at the time, was discharged, the bullet entering his left breast in the region of the heart. The shooting was the result of an accident, as the young woman did not know the rifle was loaded. Gruber's body will be taken to Shepard, Mich., his former home, for interment.
