NEW BAY SHORE ROAD NOT INTACT

Water Portion of new Route to Gladstone is Found by Escanaba man who Traveled Over Course for Mirror to be Badly Damaged. One Strip of Nearly 500 Feet has Been Washed out Clean. Portions of bed are Undermined and Jagged Holes Indent the Edge at Many Points.

According to the report made by an Escanaba man who yesterday traveled over the entire course of the Bay Shore road, being constructed by the Delta county board of road commissioners to offer a shorter route between the cities of Escanaba and Gladstone, has been greatly damaged by the storms of the spring and is not in the excellent condition that has been claimed by the members of the board.

It is claimed that at one point, for a distance of over 500 feet all of the earth has been washed out of the road-bed and but a tangled heap of timbers, which was intended should hold the foundation, now marks the course.

At other points it is claimed that the water washing under the timber facing of the road, has undermined the bed and holes several feet in circumference have been formed on the surface.

It is claimed that in but few points is the roadbed intact as where the road is not undermined, the waves have washed up over the binding timbers, laid lengthwise, and have carried out sections of the sand and gravel leaving jagged holes along the edge of the route.

The crew of men employed by John Larson is now engaged in hauling bark, peeled from cedar poles, to the different spots along the route where that material is being dumped and to be used as a means of protecting the earth to be carried in later, from being washed out by the waves.

The water portion of the road at the south end is described as presenting a perfect picture of waste and destruction and it is claimed should give permanent proof that the road as planned by the road commissioners, can never be maintained.

The members of the board are also severely criticized by the Escanaba man who yesterday traveled over the route for macadamizing a portion of the new road where that work is the least necessary.

Between the Wells bridge and the Mashek Chemical and Iron company's plant, where the crushed stone will be

placed, the route traverses high ground for the most part. Beyond the chemical plant to the point where the road strikes the bay shore the route is laid over low land and where it is claimed teams will not be able to pass until some foundation has been prepared.

The claims that have been made by the board of road commissioners that the water portion of the bay shore road was not damaged to any great extent by the storms of last fall and this spring are not true," said the Escanaba man today. "The effects of the waves are seen at practically every point along that part of the road. In one place the road bed has been washed out clean for a distance of nearly 500 feet and at other points the road bed has been undermined and holes have formed in the surface in which a barrel could be dropped. Jagged holes were found at many points along the edge and at one place where a culvert was constructed, that entire work has been washed out and the pipes lie in the water in confusion.

The whole water portion of the road is anything but intact.

"I also traveled over the route from the bay shore to the chemical plant and I do not believe that any one will drive over that road this year. The road runs through a swamp for a considerable distance and until some sort of a foundation is arranged traffic through there can never be opened.

"If the road commissioners had spent the money which they will lay out in macadamizing the piece of road between the bridge and the chemical plant, in building a foundation for the swamp portion of the route teams could at least get to the bay shore."

Members of the board of road commissioners have claimed this spring that no damage to the new road was done by the storms and the contractor who resumed work on the road two weeks ago announced that traffic over the road could be opened by Sep. 1.

The announcement that was made today of actual conditions found along the route came as a decided surprise.

LAKE UNIONS TO SEPARATE

Firemen's Association is Disgusted with Treatment From Longshoremen.

So marked is the discontent existing in the Marlee Firemen, Oilers and Water Tenders' association against the Longshoremen's union because of the latter's refusal to join in a sympathy strike, that the indications point strongly to a severance of friendly relations between the two lake labor associations. When the longshoremen struck for redress of their grievances, the firemen's union promptly ordered its men out in sympathy, and it was therefore not natural to expect the same treatment from the longshoremen in behalf of their co-workers in their hour of trouble. However, the longshoremen declined positively and absolutely to strike should the firemen refuse to work until a new agreement had been signed. As a result the firemen are disgusted with the treatment they have received from the longshoremen. Several of the firemen who wore longshoremen buttons have discarded them.

HOLD SERVICES FOR CONFEDERATES

Washington, D. C. June 2.—Special.—Arrangements for the exercises incident to the decoration of the graves of the Confederate dead in Arlington cemetery tomorrow have been perfected. Former Secretary of the Navy Hilary A. Herbert of Alabama will deliver the oration, and Representative John Sharp Williams of Mississippi will speak on the subject of a suitable monument to be erected in the Confederate plot over the dead warriors.

WILL REVISIT THE FATHERLAND

New York, June 2.—Special.—The Anchor liner Caledonia which sailed today carries among her passengers scores of Scandinavian residents of the Northwestern states who plan to spend the summer in their old homes in Norway, Sweden and Denmark. Many will be present at the approaching coronation of King Haakon of Norway. Included among the tourists are many college professors, ministers and other professional men.

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IS CELEBRATION TO BE ARRANGED

Many Business men of City Favor Beginning of Movement at Once to Insure Success.

Is Escanaba to have a Fourth of July celebration? With the date for the celebration of the nation's birth but one month in the future many of the businessmen of the city favor the beginning of a movement at once to insure the arrangement of a rousing celebration.

It is pointed out that Escanaba has not yet celebrated the completion of the new asphalt pavement on Ludington street, which improvement was clamored for several years before action was finally taken, and a Fourth of July celebration this year could be made to serve a double purpose.

On other years no difficulty has been found in raising sufficient funds to insure the success of celebrations arranged in honor of the natal day of the union, and this year, with conditions far more propitious, it is believed that a satisfactory fund could be raised within a few days.

The beginning of a movement to arrange a Fourth of July celebration in Escanaba at once will act as a damper upon the smaller surrounding villages who in the absence of elaborate arrangements here will plan celebrations of their own.

If Escanaba is to have a celebration of any kind the movement should be started at once and it is probable that Mayor Perron will see fit to take the necessary steps to bring the movement to a head within a few days.

WANTS EARLY DATES NAMED

Copper Country Pythians ask That Upper Peninsula Meet be Held Early in August.

Much pressure is being brought to bear by the officials of the Knights of Pythias lodges of the Copper country cities to arrange for the holding of the annual upper peninsula reunion of that order at Gladstone early in the month of August.

It is claimed by the officers of those lodges that members of their degree teams have special work of importance near the close of each month and it is desired by them that the meet shall be held on dates early in the month.

From other quarters of the peninsula it is being urged that the meet shall be held late in August and unless the objections now entered by some of the lodges are withdrawn it will be necessary to arrange a compromise date.

Officers of the upper peninsula association will arrange several unique features for the meet and one of which will be to make the meet a regular encampment. If the proper arrangements can be made a large number of mill ary tents will be obtained and pitched on the grounds adjoining the Hawarden Inn to offer quarters for the visitors. Arrangements for meals for the delegates will be made at the Inn. It is expected that over 200 visitors will be in Gladstone on the two days of the reunion and the members of the Gladstone lodge will strain every effort to properly entertain them.

The Mirror was in error when it was recently stated that the Savit Marie lodge of Pythians holds the upper peninsula degree cup, as at the meet of last year the cup was won by the degree team of the Ipheming lodge and is now held by that city.

A GRAFTER WAS IN OWOSSO

Owosso, Mich. June 2.—Special.—A stranger by the name of Eugene Field, who claimed to be a nephew of Marshall Field did a \$5,000 business on paper in this city yesterday and the police are looking for him today.

He purchased some property and gave a check on the Henssler, Ind., bank for \$1,400 and a sight draft for \$2,000 on same bank. The officials of Ithaca say that the same man has just got out of jail in that city for a similar offense. It was also found out that Field had no money in any of the Henssler banks.

BURGLARS ARE CAPTURED

Battle Creek, Mich. June 2.—Special.—Two burglars were caught under the counters in Henson's grocery by the police this morning at the point of pistols. The men were armed with slug shots which they threw away and they have been identified as Claude Archer a local diamond thief and J. Warner. The police have also captured Lee Jordan who was wanted for attempting to kill Charles Caville, of the Black Diamond club. Jordan was disguised and had been hiding in the house of a friend.

BIDS ON NEW WARSHIP DEFERRED

Washington, D. C. June 2.—Special.—Bids for the construction of the battleships South Carolina and Michigan were not opened at the Navy Department today as was originally intended. The opening of the bids has been deferred for three weeks as a matter of courtesy to the Union Iron Works of San Francisco. Owing to the confusion of the mails following the recent earthquake the San Francisco concern failed to receive the plans and specifications in time to forward their bids.

NEW ORDINANCE BEING URGED

Retail Merchants of City Want Protection Against Representatives of Outside Companies.

A special ordinance will probably be presented to the members of the Escanaba city council at an early meeting to provide for the licensing of all traveling representatives of all outside retail business firms.

The movement is being pushed forward by the leading dry goods, clothing and shoe merchants of the city who claim that their business is being seriously impaired by the flooding of the city at frequent intervals with traveling agents of Milwaukee, Chicago, Minneapolis and Detroit retail houses.

It is claimed that the practice, which has been growing for the last year to an alarming degree, has made it impossible for the merchants of Escanaba to carry the letter line of goods displayed by the traveling salesmen as many people of the city are falling readily into the habit of purchasing from outside firms even though the prices paid are above those named by the dealers in the same class of goods in Escanaba.

An injustice is being worked upon the businessmen of Escanaba by allowing retail firms who have no interests here to compete with the men who have established their business places here and contribute their share to the city's support.

In many of the cities of the peninsula, where outside retail firms have threatened the business interests of the home merchants, an ordinance has been passed making it a misdemeanor for the representative of any outside retail company to solicit orders for goods without first obtaining a license issued by the city.

Such a course should be followed in Escanaba as the local merchants deserve protection.

FAST DRIVERS ARE ARRESTED

Two More Gladstone men Fall Victims to Fast Driving Craze When They Reached City.

According to the Escanaba police court record people of Gladstone find it extremely difficult to become used to the asphalt pavement on Ludington street.

Within the last two weeks three Gladstone men have been arrested in Escanaba for fast driving.

Two of that number contributed to the support of the municipal government to the amount of \$10 and one of the defendants is now serving a sentence of eight days in the county jail.

It is believed that the fines paid by two Gladstone men will at least defray the cost of supporting the one prisoner at the county jail.

The latest Gladstone men to fall victims to the fast driving craze when they arrived in Escanaba are John Nolan and Arthur Fay.

Those two defendants were arrested on Thursday night by Officers McCauley and Gaborie and when arraigned before Judge O. V. Linden yesterday Nolan paid his fine of \$5 but Fay was without funds and accepted a sentence of eight days in jail.

MUCH INTEREST IN THE TOUR

Much interest is centered in the "Tour Around The World" to be given by the Mission circle of the First Presbyterian church on Friday evening of next week.

All of the six different stations, which will represent the foreign countries visited by the tourists, have been arranged for and full transportation facilities are assured.

"Trains" will leave the central station at 817 Ludington street, every 20 minutes and the tourists will be allowed to remain in each "country" for 20 minutes.

At each station arrangements have been made to serve refreshments peculiar to the country represented and souvenirs of each country will be sold at the stations.

Following the arrival of the tourists at "Washington" they will be taken to the First Presbyterian church where a reception will be held and late in the evening a musical and literary program will be given.

EX. ALD. SMITH HELD FOR TRIAL

Attorney for Former City Official Says Client Wants Decision in the Circuit Court.

Ald. Edward Smith, formerly representative of the Sixth ward in the Escanaba city council and charged with malfeasance in office by Ald. John J. Tolson, was held for trial at the July term of circuit court by Judge O. V. Linden at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

The bail bond was allowed to remain at \$500, which amount was fixed by Judge Linden at the time of the arrest of Ex-Ald. Smith and both Ald. Jacob Kratz and Ald. Charles G. Beck, sureties for Mr. Smith, appeared in court and signified their willingness to continue on the bond.

The proceedings before Judge Linden this afternoon occupied but a few minutes and consisted only in the reading of the testimony given for the prosecution at the first day of the hearing and the signing of the testimony by each of the witnesses.

At the conclusion of the reading of the testimony Atty. John Cumiskey who is conducting the case for Mr. Smith, announced that no testimony would be introduced for the defense as it was thought best by himself and his client that a final decision should be rendered in the case in the circuit court.

Mr. Smith was in court with his attorney during the reading of the testimony and held several conferences with Mr. Cumiskey, evidently concerning some portions of the testimony, but no objections were entered.

Pros. Atty. Judd Yelland represented the prosecution at the final chapter of the hearing.

It is considered probable that Mr. Smith will demand an early trial and owing to the importance of the case it is thought likely that a jury will be ordered called by Judge Stone for the July term of court.

NO WORD IS YET RECEIVED

William Harper, brother-in-law to J. L. Foster who was asphyxiated in a Chicago hotel on Wednesday night and who died in that city late yesterday afternoon, left for Chicago last night to take charge of the body.

Up to late this afternoon no word had been received from Mr. Harper and when the body will be brought to Escanaba is not yet known.

If it was found possible, it was intended by Mr. Harper to leave Chicago with the body tonight and under that arrangement the funeral party would arrive in Escanaba tomorrow morning.

No funeral arrangements were made today in the absence of word from Mr. Harper but it is probable that if the body of Mr. Foster is received in the city tomorrow morning that services will be held at the home at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

The Masonic lodge of Escanaba, of which Mr. Foster was a member will have charge of the funeral services but definite arrangements for the attendance of that body have not yet been made.

Mr. Harper, who is a brother of Mrs. Foster arrived in Escanaba yesterday morning from his homestead near Williams, Minnesota, but a few hours before announcement was received here of the death of Mr. Foster. He made arrangements at once to leave for Chicago and word from him is being anxiously awaited by members of the family and friends of Mr. Foster throughout the city.

FUND RAISERS ARE ENCOURAGED

Believed That Amount Necessary to Begin Construction of new Methodist Church will be Obtained in two Weeks.

The work of raising the necessary fund for the construction of a new Methodist Episcopal church in Escanaba is being pushed as fast as possible by the Rev. Frederick Spence and already he is receiving much encouragement.

A systematic plan of action for raising the new building fund is now being perfected by Mr. Spence and while he will undertake the greater portion of the preliminary work, he will be assisted by an active committee of members of the congregation.

Slightly less than one half of the necessary \$7000 has already been assured and every effort will be strained to reach the figure that has been set as the minimum amount under which a contract shall be awarded, within the next two weeks.

While no definite details for the construction of the new building will be decided upon until the building fund has assumed satisfactory proportions, plans are being discussed by the building committee and the pastor of the church.

It is intended that the new church building will be constructed of brick and when completed will cost approximately \$15,000.

While no definite decision on the point has been reached it is probable that the new building will be constructed on the present church site which is considered to be an admirable location.

The opposition that was first shown to the church building movement by some in the Methodist Episcopal congregation, has now been changed to enthusiasm and from this time if continuous effort will count, the building fund will grow until the necessary amount is reached.

REPUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION.

A convention of the Republican delegates of Delta county, to be elected in the several wards and townships of the county at primary election to be held on the twelfth day of June 1906, is hereby called to meet at the court house in the city of Escanaba in said county, on Monday the eighteenth day of June 1906 at 11 o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of electing ten delegates to attend the state convention, hereafter to be called, for the nomination of state officers.

Congressman Towne's reasons why the republican party should be driven from power, as outlined in his campaign speech in the house of representatives last week, were not at all convincing or satisfactory. Indeed, his reasons were not nearly so eloquently expressed as in his Michigan speeches in 1896, when the opposition of the republican party to free silver constituted the offense for which Mr. Towne thought it should be banished. In 1896 Mr. Towne insisted that he was aggressively in favor of a protective tariff. Today he is representing a New York Tammany district and the importing interests related to Wall Street and he is again urging that the republican party should be banished from power. He explains that Heaven's favor to this country helped the republican party in 1896 and through the years directly following. In some other years to come he can explain again that Heaven's favor for the United States and its people had not yet departed in 1906.

The need of the democratic party of Michigan is for a fighting organization in behalf of principles of its own. This opinion of William P. Nesbit, one of the old guard of Michigan democrats, well suggests the results of that party's descent in this state through recent years to the status of a public scold. Its pretended important issues of one year are deserted in the next. There is no improvement or advancement in state affairs or any line of desirable state legislation which the democratic party of Michigan can lay the slightest claim to represent. In view of this condition it is not strange that Mr. Nesbit should urge a turning about on the part of his fellow partisans and the development of a vigorous effort in behalf of a good state platform.

Ninety-five per cent of the number of votes cast for the republican candidate for governor two years ago are represented on the republican enrollment lists now filed with the secretary of state. This showing is a complete answer to all charges of insincerity on the part of republicans in the matter of adoption and use of the new nominating system. Whatever changes the new law may need will be thoroughly made known through the very general use that is to be made of it by the republicans of Michigan.

WON'T ACCEPT**

Friend of Big Rapids School Master
Says Letter is Coming Which
will be Sizable.

Grand Rapids, Mich., June 2.—
Special.—W. N. Ferris will not accept
the Democratic nomination for governor
is the statement of a prominent western
Michigan Democratic politician and
close personal friend of the Big Rapids
schoolmaster, who has just had a con-
ference with the latter and claims to
speak authoritatively.

"Mr. Ferris will announce his de-
clination in a letter to State Chairman

ergetic campaign. But look where he

"Another reason for Ferris's decision

tween him and Winship. The Saginaw
man is credited with no enthusiasm for
Ferris. Winship is an admirer of
Wellington R. Burt, who in his speech
at the Clare banquet expressed views
not in accordance with those advocated
by Ferris.

"The Democratic county organiza-

Ferris has neither the money nor the

organizations. He will set forth his
position in more detail in his letter,

made public before next Sunday."

**ROAD CONTRACT
WAS AWARDED**

John McLaughlin & Company Pre-
sent Lowest Proposals for Con-
structing two Miles of Mac-
adam Road.

John McLaughlin & Company was
awarded the contract for constructing
two miles of macadam road in Delta
county by the Delta county board of
road commissioners late yesterday
afternoon for the total sum of \$7,006.
60.

According to the action of the mem-
bers of the board yesterday McLaugh-
lin & Company will receive \$2000 for
constructing one half mile of macadam
road on the new Bay Shore route be-
ginning at the county bridge north of
Wells and proceeding northeast to a
point a short distance beyond the
Mashek Chemical and Iron company's
plant.

For the construction of one and one-
half miles of macadam road on the
Bark River road beginning at a point
one mile east of Narenta and proceed-
ing to a point one-half mile west of
that station by the terms of the con-
tract McLaughlin & Company will re-
ceive \$5,021.60.

But two bids for the construction of
the two sections of macadam road were
presented to the board of road commis-
sioners yesterday.

One bid was presented by John Mc-
Laughlin & Company in which it was
agreed to complete the entire work for
\$7056.60 and the remaining set of pro-
posals was submitted by the Northern
Engineering and Construction com-
pany, John G. Zane general manager,
in which it was agreed to build the
two sections of road according to the
plans and specifications for the total
sum of \$8849.20. By a comparison of
the two bids it was shown that the pro-
posal submitted by John McLaughlin
& Company was the lowest by \$1892.60.

The formal contract for completing
the work was drawn by Pros. Atty.
Judd Yelland today and will be signed
by the contractor at once in order that
actual construction work can be started
early in this month.

Following are the details of the two
bids presented to the board: John
McLaughlin & Company, Bay Shore
road, grading 25 cents per yard, crushed
stone \$1.75 per yard total \$2035.
Bark River road grading 32 cents
per yard crushed stone \$1.89 per yard,
total \$5021.60. Northern Engineering
and Construction company, Bay Shore
road, grading 25 cents per yard,
crushed stone \$1.82 per yard Bark
River road, grading 35 cents per yard,
crushed stone \$1.97 per yard.

**ROAD MOVES
MUCH ORE**

Duluth Mesabe & Northern is
Reckoned as Greatest Ore Haul-
ing System in the World.

The Duluth, Mesabe & Northern is
the greatest iron ore road in the world,
from the standpoint of tonnage at least,
and in addition to that, it is of great
importance in the matter of general
traffic. The road last season delivered
8,877,559 gross tons of iron ore to its
dock system in Duluth, as compared
with 4,649,611 tons in 1904, and it is
expected that the line will haul about
10,000,000 tons of ore in Duluth this
season. The Mesabe is completing a
fifty mile extension from Alborn on
the main line to Bovey on the western
Mesaba and a new and great ore dis-
trict will be made tributary to Duluth
this summer. The road has this year
purchased 1,000 new steel ore cars,
making 2,705, altogether, and it also
has 2,300 of the old wooden type of ore
cars. It has just purchased 200 80,000
pounds capacity flat cars, twenty-five
refrigerator cars, eight locomotives
and the new passenger equipment. The
road is being double tracked and the
work is now largely completed; it is
building a fourth ore dock in Duluth
at a cost of about \$1,000,000, includ-
ing the approaches. These briefly
stated facts throw some light on the
development of this great ore and gen-
eral traffic system which is a property
of the United States Steel corporation.

It is provided that for each mile of
macadam road constructed according to
plans and specifications approved of by
the state highway department that
\$1,000 will be paid by the state as a
premium.

With the total cost of constructing
the two sections of road now to be
built in Delta county placed at ap-
proximately \$7,000, the state will bear
\$3,000 of that amount and \$5,000 will
be paid out of the county road fund.

The actual cost to the tax payers of
Delta county or each mile of macadam



TWO FIRMS HELD PERMITS

Rival Firms of Fishermen in Court Because of Misunderstanding With Officials of I. Stephenson Company.

Because two different firms of fishermen had obtained permission from two different officials of the I. Stephenson company to conduct operations from the same point of land owned by the company, John Taushak of the firm of Clucken & Taushak, was arraigned before Judge O. V. Linden yesterday afternoon charged with trespass by John L. Johnson of the firm of Johnson & Olson.

Johnson & Olson claimed that they had obtained a lease on certain pieces of property owned by the I. Stephenson company, on the east side of Little Bay de Noc from T. B. Wadsworth assistant land commissioner for the company.

John Taushak of the rival firm of fishermen, claimed that they had been granted permission to conduct their operations from the same point by R. E. MacLean, and exhibited in court a permit signed by Mr. MacLean.

Johnson had claimed that Taushak had set his nets in the water surrounding the disputed point without authority but when the evidence was submitted in court and the special permit held by Taushak, was exhibited the case was dismissed by the court.

SAY REPORTS EXAGGERATED

Number Of Americans Killed in Mexican Revolt not so Great as First Claimed.

Naco, Arizona, June 2.—Special.—It is now believed that the morning reports of the race riots at Cananea, Mexico have been greatly exaggerated.

E. E. Edgerton, principal of the American school at Cananea has just arrived from there and says that George Metcalf, who was at the head of the Development Department, was the only American killed so far as is known. He was shot down while guarding the property of the company.

Between 25 and 50 Mexicans were killed. Edgerton left Cananea for fear that his home would be dynamited by the infuriated Mexicans.

Five thousand of these people are on a strike and marching through the streets awaiting the appearance of the anarchist flag to attack every American and Mexican who will not join them. They attacked the mounted police yesterday.

FISHERMAN WAS FINED

Charged with having in his possession whitefish below the legal size Michael Jackey a Gladstone fisherman, was arraigned before Judge O. V. Linden yesterday and was fined \$25 and costs. The arrest was made on complaint of Deputy Game Warden John Jackson, who since the opening fishing season has been keeping a close watch on all of the fishermen of the county.

Jackey was allowed to return to Gladstone yesterday after promising to deliver the amount of the fine to the court today.

HELD FUNERAL THIS AFTERNOON

Funeral services over the body of Thomas W. Haney, who died on Thursday at the Delta county hospital after a long illness were held at the undertaking rooms of D. A. Oliver at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The Rev. Oscar Sandahl of the Swedish Lutheran church, conducted the service. Interment was at Lakewood cemetery.
