treasury of the city of Ecasnaba, not considering the overdraft against the municipal lighting plant, is \$38,659.91. The overdraft against the lighting plant on June 1 was \$10,777.87 thus

ing for Contagious Diseases. By the action of the members of the Escanaba city council last night, should the city again during the year suffer from an epidemic of smallpox or any contagious disease, a dispute as to the amount that will be received by the city health physician for caring for

By unanimous vote of the aldermen last night it was agreed to pay City Health Physician O. C. Breitenbach, \$200 in addition to his regular salary. for caring for all patients suffering from contagious diseases during the year and for performing all duties that may fall upon that official outside of

his regular work as health physician. When an epidemic of small pox threatened Escanaba last year there was much discussion in the council as to the amount of money that should be received by the health physician for caring for those patients and much illfeeling was aroused. By making a formal agreement at this time with the health physician for caring for contagious disease cases, much trouble may be obviated in the future.

DAYS PASSING

Half of Preducing Capacity of Lake Shippards for 1907 is Already Taken.

Half the producing caracity of the steel shipyards on the great lakes for the year 1907 is said to be al early en gaged, and a prominent official of the argest shipbuilding company on the lakes is quoted as saying that the era of big vesels promises to make the shipbuilding industry active for at least several years to come. This state of inland shipbuilding is remarkable, and the prospect for future activity outlined by the official is still more remarkable.

It was believed by many vewelmen on the great lakes several years ago that no additional tonnage would be needed for a long time to come, or very few boats at most, making liberal allowances for rapid growth of traffic. Gradually the big ore freighters had grown in size from about 250 feet in length, the standard at which LARGE CITY the steel boat industry fairly started on the lakes, until they had gained a longitudinal dimension of something over 400 feet. The boats were regarded as practically indestructible, good for ervice indefinitely, and already as large as the do:ks could economically secommodate. For the shipbuilder the business prospect was believed to be dismal indeed.

But the ore trade stowed unexpected development year by year and there were enough venturesome vesselmen to give the rost builders an abundance of commissions. The size of the ore car riers grew steadily and swiftly until the 600 foot boat became an istablished model, wider of beam than its predecessors and with a cargo of some 10,000 or 12,000 tons against 6,000 tons, the supposed limit of the 400 'co'ers in moderate depth of water. And now the talk is that the era of the big carriers has just fairly begun, a truly wonderful thing, with the immense steel tonnage that is now floating in every live harbor.

Presupposing this to be a good guess, it means the retirement of the 400 footer as an economical proposi tion. The ideal of inland water transportation in existence when the twentieth century was usbered in a bare handful of years ago, has been relegated to oblivion, with a marvelous swiftness of banishment. Nothing could better represent the immense transformation that is going on in the American manufacture as contrasted bere the new and expensive machinery freighters of the 1900 type of pattern for something more up to date, for these big freighters cost from \$250,000 to \$300,000 each. 

FERRIS TELLS OF HIS TRIP

Former Principal of Webster School Writes Interesting Letter From Shipboard.

The following letter bas been reeived by the Mining Journal from Harry N. Ferris, formerly principal of the Webster school of Es a aba and who is now employed by the United States government as a teacher in the

"There is a difference of eight hours n time between Marquette and the latitude which we are now entering in the Pa lific ocean, and every morning when I arise at 8 o'clock I have bat just balf an hour more sleep than I had the day before. since our days hours long

The Minnesota travels just fast

when this line is crossed in order to correct the time between east and west. the Minnesota is an immense ship.

She is seventy feet wide, has a displacement of 28,000 tons, and if set down in Washington street would reach from Front to Fourth. After leaving Scattle we steered a porthwest erly course toward the Aleskan coast, and when within about fifty miles of the Alcutian islands, the course was shifted to southwest and we are now ploughing toward Yokahoma, which will be our first stopping place

"A week ago we sighted the first ship at sea. It was the St. Paul, an American liner bound for Seattle from the Salmon fisheries of St. Michael. She left Seattle before the "San Francisco earthquake occurred and the first they knew of it was when our ship told the naws. We overhauled the St. Paul at 7 o'clock in the morning. and BEGIN WORK an boor later she was lost from sight We did not come close enough to the Aleutian islands to see them, although the mate informed me that they were less than fifty miles distant. We have a strange case on board in the ship bospital, that of a Chinaman who submitted to amputation of his left arm. The man was an oiler on the steamer Dakota, and while working his arm became caught in the machinery, with the result it was torn out at the elbow. In the hospital they keep a constant watch over him to prevent him from taking his life. The chief surgeon, Dr Keith, tells me that before the man is in Chica a month be will be a dead man, as be will either kill himself or bis friends will assassinate him. formed persons. They are either killed or commit suicide. The one thing that prevented this Chinaman from killing himself now was the fact that he would be buried at sea. also severely criticised the material used in the pavement, characterizing the work as a "botched job" and the street as practically impassable.


