**THE GOVERNOR WAS SOAKED**

Michigan Central Charged one Dollar a Minute for a Box car Ride.

A striking commentary on railroad service in the upper peninsula, which has often been criticized on a count of the harm it does to Michigan business interests and certain evidence of the railroads' dislike of Governor Frid M. Warner was furnished in Mackinac City Thursday, says the Detroit Journal.

The governor, accompanied by Colonel Cox of the state military board, left Cheboygan in the morning for Mackinac City, whence they were to go to the upper peninsula to keep important engagements in Marquette and Houghton counties.

The Michigan Central train arrived in Mackinac City two hours late, so late that Governor Warner and Colonel Cox lost their Duluth, South Shore & Atlantic train. They went back to Cheboygan to finish up some business there. In the afternoon Colonel Ming drove them to the Michigan Central station in time to catch the 5 o'clock train back to Mackinac City. At the station they found that this train was three hours late, which would cause the governor to miss all of his important engagements in the north country. After figuring around a bit the station master suggested that Gov. Warner and a party of traveling men, who were as anxious as the chief executive to keep their appointments in the upper peninsula, might easily be taken over the short run to Mackinac City—only 16 miles—by a switch engine. This offer was accepted by the governor and the traveling men in good faith as evidencing the desire of the railroad to serve its patrons and make up for the tardiness of the trains.

The run was made in 20 minutes, the governor and the traveling men being carried in an old box freight car. At Mackinac City the governor was presented with a telegram from one of the Detroit officials of the Michigan Central and a bill for \$25-\$1.25 a minute and more than \$1.50 per mile for the run, which was made necessary by the poor train service of the corporation presenting the bill. Governor Warner, however, in spite of the protest of his friends that it was a rank holdup, paid the bill immediately and took his baggage from the Michigan Central train.

His friends insist that the presentation of the bill was just an evidence of a desire on the part of the Michigan Central to get even with him.

**WOULD CLEAR SOO RIVER**

Lake Carriers will Insist on Removal of all Power Companies From Property.

A campaign for the ousting of all power companies now located at Sault Ste. Marie, which obtain their water rights through government permission, is to be waged by the Lake Carriers' association.

President Livingstone of the Lake Carriers has returned from Washington, where a hearing was given by the secretary of war earlier in the week, at which Harvey D. Goulder and Chairman Burton, of the rivers and harbors committee, were present. Both President Livingstone and Mr. Goulder, the latter as attorney for the Lake Carriers' association, spoke before the secretary.

An impression has arisen that the Lake Carriers are directing their efforts solely to securing the removal of the Chandler-Dunbar company. This would be welcomed by the Lake Superior corporation, as it would then be left in undisputed possession of the field. This question was asked President Livingstone:

"Is it true that the Lake Carriers' association desires simply the removal of the Chandler-Dunbar company from the St. Mary's river?"

"Most emphatically, no," he replied. He continued: "My position representing the Lake Carriers' association is that all private interests whether known as the Chandler-Dunbar interest, the Lake Superior corporation through its subordinate companies, the Lake Superior Power company known as the Clergue interests, or any other interests of any kind, name or nature, should be entirely removed. In other words, that the governments should clear the rapids from all encroachment and private improvements of any kind, and if the parties operating these have vested rights, that the government acquire the same in a proper and just manner. And this is the position that we take before the war department, based on the firm conviction that the needs of the country demand that the whole space north of the present locks and government works, out to the international boundary line, is absolutely necessary for the rapidly growing wants of navigation, and that the public must have the right to all of the natural flow, and this is the position as far as within our power lies, we propose to insist on with the government."

**MAN'S FACE HAS CHANGED COLOR**

Doctors at Cornell Medical school are puzzled over the case of Warren B. Harris of Ithaca, N. Y., and pronounce him one of the most remarkable human freaks in the world today. Harris changes color whenever there are changes in atmospheric conditions, varying from a light chalk gray, through light blue and violet, into a deep purple. Harris is of white parentage, was born in Corry, Pa., and is 27 years old.

Cornell doctors say that Harris was what is known as a "blue baby." They seldom survive the first month after birth and Harris is the only one known to have lived three months.

The characteristic quality of Harris are due to a defect of the heart. This causes oxygen starvation and the effect is like that of a man choking black in the face or an invalid blue all over his body from pneumonia. Harris is small being slightly more than 5 feet and weighing about 50 pounds.

**BENTON HARBOR WILL BE SAVED**

London, June 13.—Special—Fearing the destruction of the whole earth, except Benton Harbor, Mich., a party of the "Sons of David" or "New Israelites" is on its way from London to that favored spot.

Benton Harbor being the headquarters of the sect, the "Sons of David" are hurrying thither to escape the catastrophe they believe will overtake the rest of the world, and which they say has already begun in Vesuvius and in San Francisco. Their seers have told them that England will be the next to suffer.

As for Benton Harbor, with its industrial colony of 300 "Sons of David," it is to become a new Eden, inhabited only by the sinless remnant of the earth's millions—the New Israelites.
