SUPERVISORS CLOSE SESSION

Much Important Business was Transacted by Board Which Adjourned Yesterday.

Members of the Delta county board of supervisors completed all of the business of the annual mid summer session of that body yesterday afternoon and adjourned.

Another meeting of the board will not be held until October when the regular annual session will be held.

Much business of importance to the county was accomplished at the session closed yesterday.

One of the most important acts of the session was the decision to lease or sell the Delta county hospital.

After attempting to make the institution a paying proposition for several years, with Escanaba being constantly made the dumping grounds for charges of other counties, it has been found by the board of supervisors impossible to make the annual income of the institution cover the annual expenditures. With the knowledge that exists generally throughout the upper peninsula that Delta has a county hospital, this county has been the haven for incurable charges of other districts since the opening of the institution.

While in every instance the hospital officials have been active in returning the charges to their proper county, in many instances losses have been sustained through the failure of the ability of this county to collect full charges from the officials of the home counties of the patients.

Humanitarian principles demand that when a patient without funds arrives in the city and is desperately in need of care, that he shall be cared for at the hospital until friends, relatives or home county officials can be communicated with. In the majority of such cases losses have been sustained and no method for checking the abuses that are heaped upon this county through its hospital can be found.

An attempt will now be made to either lease or sell the hospital and that matter has been placed in charge of a special committee consisting of Supervisors Sven Johnson of Gladstone, Richard Heyler of Escanaba and John Devet of Fayette.

Another important action of the board was the step that was taken to cause each city, village and township to care for its own patients suffering from contagious diseases. In order to bring about this reform, it will be necessary that a special act be passed by the state legislature.

A committee of the members of the board composed of Supervisors O. B. Fuller of Ford River, Phil Labro of Escanaba, was named by Chairman William Bonifa to draft a special bill and which will be presented to representatives of Delta county in the next state legislature.

SIXTH WARD HAS MOST CHILDREN

Southwest District of City Furnishes More Pupils Than Any Other District Within Limits.

The Sixth ward of the city of Escanaba can lay claim to the honor of a greater number of children of school age, than can be boasted by any other ward of the city, according to the annual school census that has been completed by A. H. Rolph.

The Sixth ward according to the census has a total of 990 children of school age exceeding the record of any other ward in the city by over 100.

The total number of children of school age in Escanaba this year it has been found, is 4087 or an increase of 285 over the school population in the city one year ago.

The total number of children of school age in the city one year ago was 3752.

The First ward of the city has a less number of school children than any other ward in the city while the honors between the Second and Seventh wards are nearly even.

The number of children of school age in the different wards is as follows:

First ward 236, Second ward 802, Third ward 589, Fourth ward 781, Fifth ward 852, Sixth ward 990 and Seventh ward 867.

REPRESENTATIVE WILL BE SENT

Supervisor J. W. Call of Gladstone Will Investigate Question of Constructing Peninsula Correction House.

Delta county will send a representative to Menominee county to attend the conference of upper peninsula supervisors interested in the movement to construct a peninsula house of correction.

Such was the recommendation made to the members of the Delta county board of supervisors by the special committee of the board yesterday afternoon after considering the request for that action issued by the Menominee county board.

Supervisor J. W. Call of Gladstone, will represent Delta county in the conference and while the need for such an institution is not pressing in Delta county a general outline of the ideas of the promoters will be obtained and a report submitted at the next meeting of the Delta county board.

LODGE MEMBERS ATTEND SERVICE

Members of the Escanaba lodge of Knights of Pythias will attend the annual memorial services, commemorating the organization of the first lodge of that order, at the First Methodist Episcopal church on Sunday evening.

The Rev. Frederick Spence, of that church will deliver an address of special interest to the members of the order and special musical numbers have been arranged for the service.

The member of the lodge will meet at their hall on North Charlotte street at 7 o'clock on Sunday evening and will march to the church in a body.

FERRIS MAY BE IN RACE

Detroit Mich., June 29.—Special.—Chairman John T. Winship, of the Democratic state central committee, is showing an optimistic front from his position in the political war-tower. Since the announcement by Prof. Ferris declining the nomination for governor the chairman has put himself in touch with prominent Democrats all over the state.

In his letter Mr. Winship declares that more interest is being displayed by the various county committees and that chances are far better for a strenuous fight for decent government and the elimination of graft than they have been in years. The letter continues:

"As far as the candidates to lead the fight is concerned, Michigan has an abundance of good material, which has already been suggested in the public press. Personal preferences should not enter into this determination. Every delegate should come to the August convention fully realizing the serious business in the duty he there seeks to discharge. No place on the ticket should be made strong from top to bottom."

Some see in Mr. Winship's letter a quiet suggestion that Prof. Ferris may yet experience a change of heart when he sees that interest throughout the state is much more widespread than he had any idea of. However, Democrats are leaving Prof. Ferris out of their reckonings, and Editor James Helms, of Adrian, is looming to the fore.

HOOLIGAN TO BE AT PETERSON'S

Manager Salinsky Makes Arrangements for Holding Most Pretentious Booking of the Season.

By special arrangements that were made by Manager Salinsky today, Hooligan's Troubles, scheduled to appear at Ben's theater, which was badly damaged by fire early yesterday morning, for two performances on Sunday, will be given at the Peterson opera house.

Wishing to hold the faith of his patrons despite the fire which made further performances at his own amusement place impossible, and in order to hold the booking for the most pretentious production yet arranged for by Manager Salinsky, he today made arrangements with Manager P. M. Peterson for giving the two coming performances at the Peterson opera house.

Hooligan's Troubles will appear in Escanaba for both matinee and evening performances on Sunday.

GAME WARDEN MAKES ARREST

William Angluim Former Escanaba Fisherman Arrested at Menominee and Returned to City.

Charged with leaving fish offal to decay on the beach William Angluim, a Menominee fisherman who until recently operated on Little Bay de Noc with headquarters near the old brick yard on the north shore, was arrested at Menominee by Deputy State Game Warden Edward C. Vogt and was brought to Escanaba.

When arraigned before Judge O. V. Linden he was fined \$10 and costs which amounted to \$27.80 and which amount was paid by the defendant.

In addition to paying the fine named by the courts Angluim was forced to bury the fish offal that had been left by him near the scene of his former headquarters.

The arrest of Angluim on the charge named should prove a warning to other fishermen in this district and unless the warning is accepted other arrests will be made by the game warden's department.

TO OPEN IN NEW LOCATION

Manager Salinsky to Give Regular Moving Picture and Illustrated Song Programs at Masonic Building.

Even a fire which destroyed the stage and all fixtures at Ben's theater, will not put Manager Salinsky out of business.

Announcement was made this afternoon that Mr. Salinsky has leased the store room, at 617 Ludington street, in the Masonic building, where at 8 o'clock tomorrow night he will open with a regular program of moving picture and illustrated song features.

Regular performances will be given both afternoon and evening at that place until repairs have been made at Mr. Salinsky's theater when the regular bills of vaudeville specialties will be resumed.

Three thousand feet of moving picture films will be provided for each week and with three new illustrated song slides for each day.

A special admission fee of five cents will be established by Mr. Salinsky for all performances given at the new location.

The success of the Merchants Protective Agency of Escanaba, now being organized by William T. Seeger, is assured.

Nearly every business firm on Ludington street has already become a subscriber to the agency and officials of firms not yet interviewed by Mr. Seeger will be seen within a few days.

The work of collecting accounts placed in the hands of the agency will probably be undertaken by Mr. Seeger early in next week when the first practical demonstration of the efficiency of the methods employed by him will be given.

It is announced by Mr. Seeger that accounts amounting to several thousand dollars have already been placed in his hands by firms who have subscribed as members of the agency and when the active work of collection is undertaken it is expected that the amount of accounts presented will be considerably increased.

YOUNG WOMAN PASSED AWAY

Miss Ella Snow Died This Morning at Home of Mother From Tuberculosis.

After gradually failing in health through a period of nearly an entire year Miss Ella Snow, 21 years of age, died this morning at the home of her mother, Mrs. Nellie Snow, from tuberculosis.

For the last six weeks the condition of Miss Snow had been serious and her death had been expected by the members of her family.

She was well known among the young people of Escanaba and while it was known to many that her condition was critical and that she could not recover, her death comes as a severe shock.

Miss Snow until one year ago was a student at the Marquette normal school where she had entered to fit herself as a teacher, when failing health forced her to give up her studies and return to her home here. She was an especially bright scholar and in addition was a talented musician.

Definite funeral arrangements had not been made today but it is probable that services will be held at St. Patrick's church tomorrow morning. The funeral may be deferred until on Monday however.

MAKING READY FOR CELEBRATION

Merchants and all Residents are Urged to Decorate Stores and Homes.

But four days remain before Escanaba will open one of the most elaborate demonstrations that have ever been attempted in this city. The work of the different committees in charge of the Fourth of July demonstration has practically been completed and but little remains to be done but to await the coming of the city's army of visitors.

Assurance has been received by the members of the general committee on arrangements from all surrounding points that large delegations are planning to spend the anniversary of the nation's birth in Escanaba and it is estimated that the people of Escanaba on next Wednesday will be hosts to an army of at least 5,000 visitors.

With special stages on all railroads running into the city and special excursions arranged on both the steamers Maywood and Lotus, exceptional advantages will be offered for people of all points in reaching the city for the demonstration and present indications are that the advantages will be accepted.

Escanaba's coming Fourth of July demonstration has been more widely advertised than any other event ever arranged here and it is believed that the wide publicity that has been given will show results in the crowds attracted on the day of the celebration.

Every merchant along Ludington street is urged by the members of the committee to decorate the exterior of his place of business for the demonstration. It is hoped by the committee to make each side of Ludington street from Smith court to Stephenson avenue a solid mass of patriotic colors.

Residents throughout every district are also requested to decorate the exterior of their homes with flags and bunting and give to the whole city a patriotic appearance that will attract the attention of visitors and form the basis for favorable comment.

The work of decorating the business places along Ludington street will be begun on Monday and from that time until Wednesday morning the patriotic display will be added to.

On Tuesday evening Ludington street will be flushed for its length and when the visitors arrive here early on Wednesday they will see Escanaba's prize pavement at its best.

DEATH LIST IS INCREASED

Five Members of Lynaugh Family Have Passed Away in few Months.

Two deaths instead of one, as was first reported, were yesterday added to the list of the members of the Lynaugh family who have passed away within a period of six months.

Timothy Lynaugh 76 years of age, died yesterday morning at the home of his son Patrick Lynaugh at Gladstone.

While the undertaker, C. W. Swanson, of Gladstone was at the home preparing the body of Mr. Lynaugh for burial, Frances Collins, the month old grandson of Mr. Lynaugh passed away in the same house where but a few hours before the spirit of the old gentleman had flown.

With the recording of two deaths in the Lynaugh family yesterday five members of that family have passed away in six months.

It is just six months ago today that William Lynaugh the first member of the family entered on the death list, passed away. The death of William Lynaugh was followed a few weeks later by that of a sister.

One month ago the third name was added to the list when Mrs. Sarah Collins, another sister passed away at Gould City and her body was brought to Escanaba for interment.

Timothy Lynaugh who died yesterday morning was the father of the two sisters and a brother, whose death had followed in quick succession, and the babe which followed its grandfather in death was the infant son of Mrs. Collins whose body was interred here one month ago.

Funeral services were held over the body of Mr. Lynaugh and the babe at St. Patrick's church at 9:30 o'clock this morning, and the bodies were interred in the same grave at St. Joseph's cemetery.

Those who acted as pallbearers at the double funeral of this morning were Edward McMann, William Hedge, William O'Donnell, John Murphy, Edward Young and Jacob Franzen.

STRONG TEAM IS IN PROSPECT

Opportunity is now Presented for Permanent Organization of fast Aggregation of Ball Tossers.

Members of the reorganized Escanaba baseball team, representing one of the strongest lineups arranged for a team in Escanaba since the days when Smith, McGinnis, Driscoll, Stack and others were in the game here will hold regular practices from this time to develop team work for the games that have been scheduled. With the possibility that the two Olmsteads may remain in Escanaba for the summer and with the city's regular corps of players, a team could be developed which it is believed could eclipse those of the days when Escanaba held a foremost place in baseball circles of the district.

With Olmsted and Nelden as the pitching staff of the team and Matt and Leell catered for the position behind the bag, Escanaba would have two of the strongest batteries boasted by an upper peninsula team.

With regular practices arranged, it was shown in the game of last Friday with Crystal Falls that Escanaba has several strong players for the different positions who could be developed into a class by themselves.

But few of the fans of the city appear to realize the opportunities that are now presented for the permanent organization of a strong baseball team but with the steps that have already been taken it is believed that the fans will awake soon to the realization that Escanaba is again liable to cut some little figure in baseball circles of the peninsula.

Under proper management, and with proper support the foundation can be formed this season for a team which next year would be second to none in the district and with which Escanaba could exert a powerful influence next spring in the organization of the Menominee range league.

After meeting the Rapid River team at South Park on Sunday the Escanaba players will meet the Marinette team here on July 4.

SAY CHILDREN COURT DANGER

Automobile Owner Points out Dangerous Practice that is Becoming Common in Escanaba.

The following communication has been received from an automobile owner of the city:

"An unfair danger has arisen of late to automobile users caused by children who stand on the curb streets and wait until an automobile is nearly opposite them and then dart out into the street as though to cross in front of the machine and then turn quickly and rush back to the curb again. These maneuvers are speed by children on bicycles, who twig and turn in front of automobiles, and a driver does not know in which direction to turn. These children should be brought to task by their parents as many accidents are liable to happen as a result of this 'giddy' pleasure. Parents should caution their children against this questionable sport. The only thing that has already avoided many deplorable happenings is the skillful handling of the automobiles by their operators.

I bespeak fair play for automobile drivers, as accidents are not always caused by reckless operating, but by carelessness not far from criminal on the part of pedestrians. I have seen pedestrians in a spirit of bravado and also antagonism, force a driver of an automobile to a standstill perfectly unexpected. If it were not for the powerful brakes with which automobiles are supplied and which set marvelously well under unfair conditions the public would be continually shocked by accidents which are not accidents in the true meaning of the word.

I beg that mothers and fathers who may read this will not fail to caution their children on the danger that they may bring on themselves as well as on others by continuing this reckless pleasure. Pedestrians in the absorption of their own affairs too often cross the street with their eyes on the ground or head in the air and are "startled" to find an automobile at their heels. With the advent of motor cars the American public must adapt themselves to conditions that necessarily must arise.—An Auto Owner."

TROUT STREAM IS RENAMED

Dr. A. C. Lane, the state geologist, spent a day at Chatham, Alger county, recently for the purpose of conferring with Superintendent Leo M. Geislar, of the state farm, in regard to the northern and southern limits of the calciferous formation which extends nearly across the entire upper peninsula between the Potsdam sandstone and the Trenton limestone formations. While there, Dr. Lane made arrangements for giving the name "Calciferous" to the fine trout stream of this neighborhood, the creek being known as Slapnick, or Slapnick. It is to the interest of the peninsula, in the opinion of Dr. Lane, to perpetuate in some effective manner the name "Calciferous," which has been used by all geologists ever since Foster & Whitney reported upper peninsula geological conditions to congress in 1847. Wisconsin, and more recently Washington, authorities have been using instead the term sandy dolomite, and this conveys a wrong impression of the limestone soils of the calciferous formation. The term "sandy dolomite" improperly describes the richer soils of the upper peninsula for it conveys the meaning of a light sandy soil and may do for Wisconsin, where they have an ample supply of sand for domestic purposes and plenty to spare for export. Here, the rock of the calciferous formation, as analyzed by the late Dr. R. C. Kedzie, contains 32 per cent of lime. It weathers down into a rich loam which is nearly as productive as the fertile soils of the Trenton formation, which extends as a vast belt across the peninsula, from the eastern boundaries of Chippewa to the western line of Menominee county.

NAVY TO TRY OIL AS FUEL

Washington, D. C. June 29.—Special.—The United States steamship Wyoming will be fitted with burners for the purpose of experiments with oil as fuel. It is hoped a thorough test will be made which will settle the question as to the practicability of oil as a fuel for ships of the navy and the advisability of making changes in the ships now under construction. One of the principal things to be determined is the disposition of the weight to be saved by using oil, instead of coal.

FIND CHARGE IS UNFOUNDED
 State Tax Commission Investigates Complaints at Bessemer but Unable to Find Proof of Claims.

R. H. Shields, president of the state tax commission, has returned from Bessemer, where a session of the commission was held to investigate a complaint made by City Attorney Rice of Bessemer that mining property in that section had been greatly undervalued by the local assessors. Accompanying Mr. Shields to Houghton were Hon. Orin T. Bolt of Muskegon, secretary of the commission, and Glenn Williams, stenographer.

The commission failed to find any cause for the complaint in Bessemer, as evidenced by the following statement given out by Mr. Bolt, which covers the investigation in detail: "The complaint seemed so fair on the face of it," said Mr. Bolt, "that the tax commission ordered a hearing to be had at once. We fully expected when we left Lansing that we would have no trouble in finding several millions of property escaping taxation, especially since the city attorney said he had the proof."

When the review panel, Mr. Rice admitted that he had no definite information regarding the valuation of the mines, but said there was something wrong somewhere, and that it was up to the tax commission to find it. While he wired Governor Warner that the City mines were worth \$1,000,000, evidence was submitted, which he admitted to be true, that he voted, as a member of the board of review to assess the City at \$100,000. His principal complaint was that there was something wrong so far as the assessment roll of a single dollar and paid no tax at all, though the statute requires that the complaint be made by a taxpayer.

 Liverpool, June 29.—Special.—The giant Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Ireland got under way today on her maiden voyage to Quebec. The new steamer, which was recently completed at the Clyde, is a sister ship of the Empress of Britain and is identical with that vessel in size, equipment and other particulars. Many prominent Canadian and Anglo-Canadianians have booked passage on the initial voyage to the Dominion.

CUT VALUATION IN THE COUNTY
 Board of Equalization Signs Report with Understanding That Another is to be Made This Fall.

According to the report of the board of equalization, of the Delta county board of supervisors, adopted by the members of that body after a stormy session yesterday the total value of real and personal property in Delta county is \$132,272 less than one year ago.

The total valuation of all property in Delta county is placed in the report at \$9,394,519. Of that amount \$7,398,024 is in real estate and \$2,076,895 is in personal property. The total valuation of all property in Delta county, as fixed by the board of equalization one year ago was \$9,491,791. Of that amount \$7,415,862 was in real estate and \$2,080,929 was in personal property.

A comparison of the reports of the two years shows that the board of equalization by some method of reasoning found that personal property in the county had decreased within one year by approximately \$5,000, while the value of real estate in the county had decreased in that period by \$127,000. The total valuation of all property in the city of Escanaba as equalized by the board appointed for that purpose this year was placed at \$4,127,068 and of which amount \$3,290,906 is in real estate and \$836,072 is in personal property.

One year ago the total valuation of all property in the city of Escanaba was placed at \$4,138,599 and of which amount \$3,294,265 was in real estate and \$854,334 was in personal property. By a comparison of the valuations of the two years it is found that the board of equalization placed the value of real estate in the city of Escanaba \$6,731 higher than one year ago while on the other hand it was found that there was \$18,262 less in personal property than one year ago.

In the city of Gladstone the value of all property was placed by the board this year at \$775,890 and of that amount \$630,670 is in real estate and \$145,220 is in personal property. One year ago it was found by the board of equalization that the total value of all property in the city of Gladstone was \$771,499 and of which amount \$631,649 was in real estate and \$139,850 was in personal property. Thus the report of the board of equalization shows that while property in the city of Escanaba decreased in value within the last year, property at Gladstone increased in value.

After submitting a report, which it was admitted had been agreed to by all of the members of the board of equalization only on the understanding that a second report was to be framed this fall before the levy of taxes for the year had been made, four changes in the valuation of property in different parts of the county were made before it was finally accepted by the board.

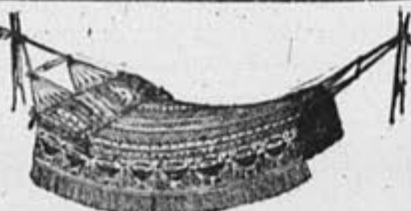

Both of the present officials whose terms expire at this time, have shown a marked interest in the improvement of the public school system in Escanaba and a testimonial of appreciation by the people of the city of the efforts of these officers in making better the conditions for educating the rising generation, can best be given through a unanimous reelection to the same offices.
