**WILL TRAVEL 4,000 MILES ON HORSEBACK**

Spokane, Wash., April 14.—Bruce Steinmetz, who claims records for two rides from St. Louis to Chicago and return, and L. E. Blakesly, who is credited with a ride from Oklahoma City, Okla., to Mexico City, Mex., have completed plans for a trip from Spokane to New York on horseback. They will leave here at 12 o'clock noon on May 15, the journey covering 4,000 miles.

The men are undertaking the ride for the pleasure of being in the open. They will carry greetings from Gov. Marion E. Hay of Washington and Mayor Nelson S. Pratt to the executive officials of New York. They expect to reach the office of The New York World not later than August 15 with the mounts they will take out of Spokane.

Steinmetz has had long experience as a horseman in Oklahoma, Texas and throughout the Southwest, also on the ranges in Montana and the Dakotas, while Blakesly served as a lieutenant of volunteers during the Spanish-American war, seeing much service in the saddle in the Philippines. No attempts will be made to break records or win wagers.

**IMMIGRANTS SWARM BACK TO AMERICA**

New York, April 14.—Thousands of immigrants who went to Europe during the financial depression have begun to return in great numbers and with them, swamping the Ellis Island officials, are thousands more, many of whom have been driven to seek homes here because of the increasing burden of taxation in Europe.

The record of March just made public by the commissioner of immigration beats that of any other March. The total number of voyagers was 132,397, of whom nearly 110,000 were classed as immigrants.

New York state received the largest proportion of the March arrivals. 32,300; Pennsylvania absorbed 20,500; Illinois took 13,000; Ohio, 6,500; Wisconsin, 2,200.

The commissioner, figuring that the invasion will continue, has asked Washington for a large increase in his staff to handle the incomers.

**MICHIGAN ROADS TO BAN DRINKING CUPS**

Some time ago Dr. F. W. Shumway, of the state board of health, issued a number of circular letters which were sent to the various heads of the railroads in the state, asking them to assemble at his office April 9, for a general conference relative to bettering the sanitary condition of railway cars and other equipment used by the roads of doing away with the public drinking cup on trains, which is considered a menace to public health.

Saturday over thirty officials of the various roads of the state were in attendance at the meeting and much interest was taken in the plans that are being formulated by the state board of health.

**OFFERS LAND FOR A GAME PRESERVE.**

Detroit, Mich., April 14.—James D. Hawks, vice president and general manager of the Detroit and Mackinac railway, has offered the National Association of Audubon societies the use of 1,000 acres on the Massachusetts coast, near Gloucester, as a game preserve. Mr. Hawks said that he had made the offer to help along the work of preserving wild life, in which he is interested, because he has been unsuccessful himself in preventing shooting on the property.

**RUTH WHITE PASSES AWAY IN NEW YORK**

Ruth White, the actress, who played the part of Nellie Astorblit in “The Burgomaster,” died Monday in New York. Miss White was the wife of William P. Cullen, manager of “The Burgomaster” and one of two other well known musical comic attractions.

For some years Miss White had been starring in “The Burgomaster” and she made her greatest success in the part of Nellie Astorblit. She is well remembered by theatre goers of this region, as she appeared here several times, having been featured in “The Burgomaster.” She was thirty-five years of age.

**LOSE HOME SECOND TIME THROUGH FIRE.**

For the second time within two years the home of Frank Shamp of Ingalls has been destroyed by fire. The home was destroyed two years ago and Tuesday the home newly constructed together with the barn was swept away.

After the first home was burned, the entire family went to Grand Rapids and worked at the water power plant. They managed to save enough money with hard work to construct a new home. The fire not only burned the home and barn but all of the clothes and belongings of the family. Without a cent in the world or a home to shelter them, the family is in dire distress.

**SWITCHMEN'S STRIKE IS FINALLY ENDED**

St. Paul, Minn., April 14.—The strike of northwestern railroad switchmen which has been on for four months and twelve days terminated at an early hour Wednesday morning.

“The men will go back unconditionally,” said President Frank T. Hawley after the count of votes had been made.

The final count stopped with 1,653 votes in favor of discontinuing the strike and 390 in favor of it. There were 2,043 votes cast of the 2,973 men who went out Nov. 30, 1909.
