

GAYNOR MAY CHEAT DEATH

Although Not Out of Danger, There is Good Chance for His Recovery--Holding His Own Today--Sensational Story Being Investigated.

(By Associated Press.) New York, Aug. 10.--Mayor William J. Gaynor, who was shot and seriously wounded yesterday as he stood on the promenade deck of the steamer Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse by James J. Gallagher, a discharged and disgruntled city employe, continued to hold his own this afternoon.

Reports are Reassuring. Dr. John J. Wagner, who visited the hospital at an early hour this morning, said he had learned Gaynor's temperature during the night was 103 and had since risen to 100.

There were no alarming bulletins from Mayor Gaynor's bedside during the early morning hours today. Reports from the hospital were reassuring. Mr. Gaynor passed a good night. He awoke feeling as well as could be expected and relished greatly a limited quantity of chicken broth.

Sensational Story. Detectives from the Central office are investigating the story of a man named Perlman, who claims to have in his possession the affidavits of two girls, one his sister, who declare they overheard an intoxicated policeman say Monday night that "Gaynor would be killed either Tuesday as he departed for Europe or on his return."

Menominee Paper Gives Comprehensive Report of Hearing on the Injunction Proceedings Against Escanaba School Board--The Arguments.

CIRCUS DOES GOOD BUSINESS IN CITY

Because of the intense local interest taken in the legal proceedings growing out of the action of the board of education in the matter of the superintendency of the Escanaba public schools, The Mirror today reproduces in full The Menominee Herald-Leader's report of the hearing on the injunction case held before Judge R. C. Flannigan in the circuit court at Menominee on Monday afternoon and evening. This report is as follows:

After several hours had been taken up by the attorneys in the injunction proceedings against the Escanaba board of education, the case was finally turned over to the hands of the court about 9:30 o'clock last night. Judge Flannigan, who presided, took the case under advisement until a couple of days after this term of court, and stated that he would probably be able to render a decision the last of this week.

Board Can Go Ahead. In the meantime, he stated, the board of education of Escanaba could go ahead and act in the employment of teachers, and if they felt sufficiently safe on their side of the question, could call Professor King in consultation. Professor King is the new man employed as superintendent of the Escanaba schools by the new board, after they had discharged Professor Davis.

Attorney N. C. Spencer opened the case for the defendant and spoke continuously for almost two hours before an adjournment was taken for supper, and after supper his argument lasted almost another two hours. The whole case, from the time the superintendent was employed by the board until the present time, was gone over by Attorney Spencer. In his allegations he claimed that Professor Davis was reemployed by the old school board for a term of three years, thinking that by taking this action they could stop this from being an issue in the election. He claimed that the employment of Professor Davis was the issue of the election of the school board, and stated that in order to kill the issue, the old school board took this action.

Time Was Unreasonable. One of the principal grounds for defense made by the attorneys of the school board was that Professor Davis was employed for an unreasonable length of time when they signed up a contract with him for three years. He further alleged that at the time of the signing of the contract the board already had a contract with him for another year, and the only reason they lengthened the contract was to kill the issue in the election of the school board and to stick the superintendent on to the people of the city for another three years, when the popular wish of the people was to discharge him and get another superintendent.

"We challenge the injunction on two grounds," said Attorney Spencer. "First, that a private person cannot sue proceedings, and, second, no..."
