LASALLE IS FOUND GUILTY

Second Trial of Man Who Shot Wife and Daughter Results in His Conviction of Assault With Intent to Do Great Bodily Harm Less Than Murder.

After deliberating for nearly four hours the jury in the case of the People of Michigan vs. Orson Lasalle came into circuit court about 3:45 o'clock this afternoon and returned a verdict finding Lasalle guilty of assault with intent to commit great bodily harm less than the crime of murder.

The crime of which Lasalle was convicted is a degree less serious than that with which he was charged and tried for, namely, assault with intent to commit the crime of murder.

As is generally known, the first trial of the case, which was held in circuit court last week, ended in a disagreement of the jury. The second trial was begun Monday afternoon and concluded shortly after noon today with Judge Flannigan's charge to the jury. Immediately following the charge court took a recess and the jurors went to

dinner, after which they began deliberation over what their verdict should be. They were out so long it was feared the case would end in another mistrial and there was great relief generally when it was announced that the jury had agreed upon a verdict.

Like the First Trial. The second trial of the case was practically similar to the first, the same witnesses being examined and the testimony being practically the same. Lasalle shot and wounded his wife and eldest daughter, Miss Albertine Lasalle, while in an alleged drunken fury at the family home in this city on August 11 last.

This afternoon trial of the case of the Bay de Noquette company vs. Joseph Jolly was begun before a jury and is still in progress at the conclusion of this report.

ALL SAINTS' AND ALL SOULS' DAYS

All Saints' day was designated by the early fathers of the church to do honor to the thousands of holy men and women whom the church has honored but who are too little known to have individual celebrations.

All Souls' day was established to bring the people together once a year, especially to pray for the repose of the souls of dead friends and relatives and also for all members of the church who have died.

NEW RULES VEXED BOTH THE TEAMS

The Menominee Herald-Leader gives the following account of the football game played in Menominee Sunday afternoon by the Escanaba and Menominee City teams:

"Weather conditions were ideal yesterday afternoon for the first semi-professional football game of the season to be played in this city. The local boys, in spite of the fact that they have had little practice during the past two weeks, showed themselves far superior to the visitors and won the game by two touchdowns, a goal and a safety, making a score for Menominee of 13, while keeping Escanaba from scoring.

The new rules proved to be more or less bothersome from the fact that some of the boys had not played a game before this season. Walter Callry made the first touchdown and Russell Lamb made the second and last touchdown in the game. Several of the boys who have not been practicing much were not hardened enough to play such a hard fought game and as a result they are very sore this morning."

ESCANABA CLUB TO BE INCORPORATED

Articles of Association of Men's Social Organization Are Filed With the County Clerk and Will Be Sent to Secretary of State—Signers of the Articles.

Articles of association of the Escanaba club were filed today with County Clerk Smer and will be sent to the office of the secretary of state at Lansing. The club is to be incorporated under the laws of the state without capital stock and its existence is to cover a period of 30 years.

The purpose of the club is to "promote social intercourse among its members and to provide for them the conveniences of club rooms of a club house."

The articles of association are signed by the following citizens: A. R. Moore, John C. Kirkpatrick, William R. Smith, John E. Burns, Matt N. Smith, William W. Oliver, Richard E. MacLean, Herbert W. Reade, Stanley M. Matthews, E. M. St. Jacques, Solomon Greenhoot, Miles Thomas and H. H. Allyn.

The first nine named constitute the first board of directors or trustees of the club, details of whose organization have heretofore been given in The Mirror.

FATHER NOSBISCH TO TAKE A REST

Escanaba friends of Rev. Father Nosbisch of Iron Mountain, who has frequently visited here, will be interested in the announcement that the reverend gentleman is about to sever his connection with his charge of St. Mary's church and parish at Iron Mountain. In fact, he is to leave Iron Mountain next Friday and will not return there. He will not, it is stated, accept charge of any other parish for the winter at least, but is to enjoy a merited rest. Announcement to this effect was made by Father Nosbisch himself to his congregation last Sunday. He has been in charge of the parish at Iron Mountain for six years and has been very successful in his work there.

WEEK OLD CHILD PASSES AWAY

James Alfred Hill, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. William D. Hill of Iron River, formerly of this city, died about five o'clock this morning at the home of Mrs. Eliza Ethier, mother of Mrs. Hill, 406 South Georgia street. The little one was but one week old. The funeral will be held from St. Anne's church, at two o'clock Wednesday afternoon, with interment in St. Anne's cemetery. Mr. Hill, father of the child, is expected to arrive in the city tonight to attend the funeral. Mrs. Hill was visiting her mother when the child died.

PREDICT DECREASE IN MARINE TRADE

Marine men are predicting quite a falling off in traffic for the balance of the season in comparison with last year. They account for this from the fact that a number of the ore carriers have already laid up and most of the others will be in winter quarters or about the middle of the month. Reports are to the effect, however, that the grain movement from the head of the lakes will be heavier than usual and there is also the coal traffic north, the greatest amount of which passes up in November.

PRIESTS TO NEW CHARGES

CHANGES ARE OF LOCAL INTEREST

BISHOP EIS OF THIS DIOCESE MAKES SEVERAL APPOINTMENTS OF POPULAR PARISH PRIESTS.

Father Fillion of Flat Rock is transferred to Spaulding to Succeed Father Corcoran, Who is Promoted to the Charge of St. Mary's Parish At Iron Mountain, Vice Father Nosbisch—Father Duford of Rapid River Goes to Flat Rock.

Through a number of appointments just made and announced by Rt. Rev. Bishop Eis of the Marquette diocese, two of the priests holding pastorates in Delta county will be transferred to other charges. These transfers are of local interest because they affect priests who are well known here.

Rev. Father Paul Fillion of Holy Family church at Flat Rock is assigned to the charge at Spaulding and Rev. Father James Corcoran, who has been at Spaulding is promoted to the pastorate of St. Mary's church at Iron Mountain, from which Rev. Father Nosbisch has just resigned.

Father Duford to Flat Rock. Rev. Father Joseph Duford of Rapid River will succeed Rev. Father Fillion at Flat Rock and Rev. Father Kron, who has been acting as chaplain at St. Mary's hospital, Marquette, will succeed Father Duford to the pastorate at Rapid River.

The new appointments become effective this week.

Rev. Father Corcoran, who has been located at Spaulding and is now to have pastoral charge of St. Mary's church and parish at Iron Mountain, is very well known in Escanaba, where he spent his boyhood, and has many friends who will rejoice to know he has been given what will be considered a merited promotion and a much larger field of endeavor in which to work and develop his talents.

RECENT DOINGS OF THE COUNTY BOARD

PRIMARY SCHOOL MONEY \$7.40 EACH

Lansing, Mich., Nov. 1.—Auditor General O. B. Fuller announced today that the apportionment of primary school money on November 10 would be at the rate of 9) cents per capita, a total of \$680,246 for the 755,892 school children in the state. This will make the total apportionment of primary funds this year amount to \$7.40 per capita.

KOSITZKI PLEADS GUILTY TO CHARGE

Man Who a Year or so Ago Fired His Shotgun at Party of Three Escanaba Citizens Riding in an Auto Comes Into Circuit Court and Changes His Plea.

In circuit court this forenoon Adolph Kositzki, charged with assault with intent to commit great bodily harm less than the crime of murder, changed his former plea of not guilty to one of guilty. Further action in his case remains to be taken. It was on the criminal calendar and was among the cases that were passed when the calendar was called a week ago Monday.

The charge against Kositzki has been pending for about a year and grew out of his shooting at an automobile in which were seated Charles M. Thatcher, A. J. Young and John S. Lindsay. The shooting occurred while the automobile was speeding along the Ford River Switch road and the attack by Kositzki was claimed to have been entirely unprovoked and entirely incomprehensible, although it became known later that Kositzki was under the influence of liquor at the time. As the auto passed him in the road he discharged one of the barrels of his shotgun at the party, but none of the shot took effect, except one which punctured one of Mr. Young's ears. The maximum penalty for Kositzki's crime is ten years in state prison.

HALLOWE'EN FUN LARGELY HARMLESS

Escanaba boys and girls are entitled to commendation for the comparatively harmless manner in which they celebrated Halloween. They certainly cut up all sorts of dildos and perpetrated considerable mischief, but very little of their spookish work was of a harmful or destructive nature and the police were not obliged to make any arrests. Several boys caught in the act of overstepping the bounds were rounded up and taken to the police station, but they were released a short time later with a warning not to get "too strong" in their celebrating. Comparatively little soaping of windows was indulged in and that is another thing for which the boys and girls should be given credit. They had plenty of fun without doing reprehensible things and are doubtless just as well pleased with the results and themselves. All in all, this year's Halloween in Escanaba was the most generally and yet most decently celebrated of any in many years.

Lawrenceville, Ga., Nov. 1.—Joe Wallace, a prominent merchant of this place, shot and killed his wife and thirteen year old son, fatally wounded his sixteen year old boy, drove two daughters from the house and then killed himself last night. No cause is known for his terrible deeds.

MAIL SERVICE TO BE CHANGED

Beginning Next Thursday the Mail Car on Train Arriving from Chicago at 2:10 p. m. Will Go Through to Ishpeming Instead of Being Taken Off Here.

Beginning Thursday, November 3, there will go into effect a change in a part of the mail service on this line of the Chicago & Northwestern railway which will be of some interest to Escanaba people and those all along the line from here to Ishpeming.

The change, of which official notice has been given Postmaster H. W. Coburn and other postmasters whose offices are affected, provides that the mail car attached to the train from Chicago arriving here at 2:10 p. m. shall after the date noted run clear through to Ishpeming instead of being taken off here. The same car will then leave Ishpeming with the Chicago train that arrives here on its south-bound journey at 11 a. m. instead of being attached to the train here as is now the case.

Will Be An Accommodation. This change will do away with the

present railway pouch system between here and Ishpeming on those trains and be an accommodation to all the intermediate towns and also of some convenience to the people of Escanaba and Ishpeming.

It is not likely, however, that the change will be liked or appreciated by the railway mail clerks affected who at present complete their run from Chicago in Escanaba at 2:10 p. m. and start on the return run to Chicago next day at 11 a. m. They will now be obliged to remain with their car until it reaches Ishpeming, 65 miles further north, and remain over night in that city instead of Escanaba.

Notice of the prospective change noted has been issued by Chief Clerk Charles C. Flint of the Chicago division of the United States railway service and a copy of it has been received at the local postoffice.

HALLOWE'EN PARTY IS GREAT SUCCESS

Members of the Delta Dancing Club Cover Themselves With Glory at Their Party Monday Evening—Hall Uniquely Decorated—Everybody Enjoys Merry Time.

The members of the Delta Dancing club literally covered themselves with glory at their Halloween dancing party in Clark's hall Monday evening. They have given many successful and delightful parties, but it may be questioned if any was quite as successful and altogether charming as the last one.

In recognition of the character of the party the hall was uniquely and attractively decorated in genuine Halloween fashion. 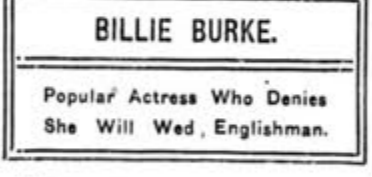
