KOSITZKI PLEADS **GUILTY TO CHARGE**

Man Who a Year or so Ago Fired His Shotgun at Party of Three Escanaba Citizens Riding in an Auto Comes Into Circuit Court and Changes His

In circuit court this forenoon Adolph Kositzki, charged with asgault with intent to commit great bodily harm less than the crime of murder, changed his former plea of not guilty to one of guilty.. Further action in his case remains to be taken. It was on the criminal calendar and was among the cases that were passed when the calendar was called a week ago Mon-

The charge against Kositzki has been pending for about a year and grew out of his shooting at an automobile in which were seated Charles M. Thatcher, A. J. Young and John S. Lindsay. The shooting occured while the automobile was speeding along the Ford River Switch road and the attack by Kositzki was claimed to have been entirely unprovoked and entirely incomprehensible, although it became known later that Kositzki was under the influence of liquor at the time. As the auto passed him in the road he discharged one of the barrels of his shotgun at the party, but none of the shot took effect, except one which punctured one of Mr. Young's ears. The maximum penalty for Kositzki's crime is ten years in state



WHEN THE MOTOR JERKS

Real Cause of Trouble Can Be Traced to Commutator.

BRUSHES MAY BE WORN OUT.

Many Times It Will Be Found That Springs Which Cause Contact Between Brushes and Armature Are Not Long Enough.

When an engine fires in a jerky manner one of the possible causes of the trouble may be found in the commutator, where the springs behind the commutator brushes may be out of order. After the brushes have been worn down by long usage it will sometimes be found that the springs which are necessary to cause the contact between the brushes and the armature are not long enough to serve this purpose, with the result that a good contact is not made when the armature is revolving rapidly. The aggravating part of this sort of trouble is that it is very hard to locate, especially as everything works all right when the commutator is tested when the engine is not running. If there is trouble with the ignition and all of the other parts of the apparatus are found to be in good order it will be a good plan to lengthen the springs so that a firm contact can be secured.

Chamois as a Strainer.

It should be understood that no difficulty need be experienced in straining gasoline through a chamols skin. When the chamols skin in the funnel is dry pour water upon it and see if it will go through. Then while the leather still is wet with water try to pour gasoline through and to the surprise of many it will not go at all. The conclusion reached is that water will not pass through a porous substance saturated with gasoline and that the same is true as regards gasoline passing through when the substance is first saturated with water. It will be found that the separating value depends upon the fact that gasoline and water will not mix and that in order to pass through the chamois a liquid must mix with the liquid which fills the pores of the leather. If when the leather is dry a small portion is wet with water and then the rest with gasoline, both water and gasoline may be poured through the funnel, each choosing only that portion wet originally by the same liquid.

A Spare Fuel Tank.

Where gravity feed is used for the fuel supply to the carburetor the fuel tank is usually fitted as high as possible under the driver's seat, this giving just about sufficient head of fuel to allow of satisfactory working on ordinary give and take roads. However, when touring through billy districts it s found that at times there is difficulty in maintaining the proper fuel feed to the carburetor, so that just at the time when most fuel is needed less is obtained. To get over this difficulty a spare tank can be fitted at the forward end of the car and connected to the carburetor, so that the fact of having hill climbing to do would allow of really a higher head of fuel to be supplied to the carburetor, so that no difficulty in climbing the worst of hills can be caused by failure of the fuel supply.

Smoky Exhausts.

Too much fubrication is a most fertile cause of smoky exhausts. This is often due to too much oil being put in the crank case at one time. Less oil, but more often, is better. Cleaning out the cylinders with kerosene and allowing the mixed oil in the crank case to remain is another cause of smoky exhausts. Too rich a mixture will cause smoke, as will the use of inferior grades of lubricating oil. If the motor is equipped with a good oiling system and one that can be properly regulated, take a minute to adjust it. Leaky valves will cause a smoky exhause, but not to the extent of the

Country Running le Best. Tires will stand up longer with country running than if used in the city. The reason is due to the many turns and stops an auto makes, the skidding, the short turns, crossing car tracks and, above all else, the idiotic methods of street sprinkling in cities. Experienced drivers and tire men say that a hundred miles in the country, if run continuously, will not do half the damage to a tire, barring a puncture, as the same distance in the city in short fourneys.

Slowing Down and Picking Up. In slowing down for a crossing or to avoid another vehicle, the slowing down can be done by simply retarding the throttle lever, but in picking up again the spark lever should be first retarded, the throttle opened, then the spark lever slowly advanced as far as possible to produce the best operation of the motor.

Turning the Corners. In turning corners the car's natural nclination is to go in a straight line. Every driver knows this and knows also that a sharp turn must be taken slowly. To attempt to go around at speed is, therefore, a confession of ignorance or of recklessness.

When to Eat Fruit.

To obtain the most benefit from the succulent fruits they should be eaten at the end of the chief meal. Bananas are an exception and may be eaten with any meal. They are very acceptable cut in thin slices and eaten with bread and butter. Stewed fruits often have their virtues wasted through being eaten at the wrong time. Six or eight stewed prunes half an hour before breakfast are beneficial; so are stewed figs or stewed apples eaten before breakfast. Peeled oranges cut into thin slices so that the juice is set free, with sugar strewn over the slices, are not unlike pineapple and form a highly efficacious aid to digestion. Grapes should never be eaten except after the chief meal of the day. Taken when the stomach is comparatively empty, they are a specially harmful fruit.-Family Doctor.

ROOSEVELT

The Ex-President Calls Republican Candidate a Singularly Able and Honest Man.

WISHES TOWNSEND SUCCESS

Roosevelt Deeply Regrets That He Cannot Come to Michigan to Take Part In Campaign For Entire Republican Ticket-Calls Republican Candidate For Governor Progressive.

Theodore Roosevelt gives his un qualified endorsement of the candidacy of Chase S. Osborn, Republican candidate for governor, and Charles E. Townsend, Republican candidate for United States senator.

The endorsement is in the form of a letter to Curtis Guild, Jr., who spoke here Saturday night for Mr. Osborn and the state ticket.

State Chairman Knox informed the Detroit Journal that he has been in communication with Mr. Roosevelt endeavoring to secure him for one speech in Michigan. The colonel declared this to be impossible, because his time was completely filled.

Governor Guild was informed of the situation while here and he immediately wired Colonel Roosevelt, urging him to accede to the request of Mr.

The following letter, which was received by Mr. Knox from Governor Guild, was the result. To Curtis Guild, Jr.:

I thank you for the telegram. I agree with every word you say in describing the situation in Michigan, and I deeply regret that it is a physical impossibility for me to accept the invitation to go to Michigan to take part in the campaign for the entire Republican ticket as I would gladly do.

I thoroughly understand, as you say, that in Michigan the progressives won a clear-cut victory; that their platform takes a proper stand in favor of a tariff commission and conservation of natural resources. My friend Chase S. Osborn, the candidate for governor, is a progressive and singularly able and honest man.

Moreover, I also agree with you as to the great desirability of electing Mr. Townsend as senator. Mr. Townsend as joint author with Mr. Esch of the first railroad rate bill, and while I was in the White House, did excellent work for ratiroad rate legislation, and I heartily wish him success as sen ator. It is a cause of genuine regret to me that I am not able to go and do all I can for the entire ticket in Michigan.

Mr. Osborn is a man like Stimson of New York, who will clean bouse from cellar to garret, driving every wrong-doer from office. It has not occurred to him to call attention to the fact that he also accepted an appointment from Governor Warner. 

Board of Supervisors:

Gentlemen: The Delta County Agricultural Society, by its President and Secretary, respectfully apply to your Board and request that in compliance with the action taken by the Board at its annual session in October. 1909, and further in compliance with the provisions of the Compiled Laws of this State, Section 5947-5950, your hororable Board levy a tax of onetenth of a mill on the dollar, and place said tax on the assessment roll of Delta County for 1910, the sums to be so raised to be appropriated to the Delta County Agricultural Society for its proper uses and purposes. The Agricultural Society has raised from membership fees during the past year more than the sum of \$100.00, as required by law, and will annually raise from its membership fees at least the sum of \$100.00 as required by law During the past year the society has secured a site for its permanent fair grounds and has expended in the neighborhood of \$450.00 to clear the site from all stumps and trees; and has expended several hundred dollars for labor in erection of a fence around the grounds, and expects to continue the work throughout the winter and spring in order to have the grounds in as complete condition as possible for the holding of a fair in 1911. It is absolutely necessary for the work of the society to progress along the lines planned, to have all the assistance which can possibly be secured from every source. We are glad to say that the manufacturing concerns of the county are contributing liberally of materials for construction work so far, thereby relieving the soclety and the people of the county generally from much expense that would otherwise be so met with.
