**PITTSBURG'S
NEW REGIME.**

Business Men Now In Charge of City.

FORMER COUNCIL IN JAIL.

Party and Ward Politics Largely Abolished—The Smoky City is Going Through a Transformation Now Seen in Many American Cities.

Since the overturning that landed so many Pittsburg officials behind the bars the city is now under a council of nine. The new government has

been installed only a little more than one month, but already the effects of its policies are felt. Here is a characteristic scene under the new regime:

Around a long directors' table on nine deep seated office chairs are nine of the city's leading citizens. At one end of the table is the city's mayor, and at the other end are officers of the city's commercial and civic bodies. Forming a background and filling the large, high ceilinged room are substantial citizens and taxpayers of the municipality. Near the mayor stands one of the city's officers whose duty it is to collect certain of the public funds. The question is directed to him by one of the nine at the table:

"Bad Business."
"You collect millions of the city's moneys annually. What interest on daily balances do you get for the city?"
"None," murmured the officer in an undertone.

"What? None?" snapped 165 men at the table. "I don't call that good business. It's bad business."
It was bad business, and it had been for thirty years or more. But the end is in sight. Pittsburg is about to put a stop to this and many other unbusinesslike practices. The nine men at the table are Pittsburg's new councilmen, selected to inaugurate a new system of government in the city.
This city, the hardest hit by the last business depression and for thirty years one of the worst governed in America, has taken on new life. The millions to be spent in public work under progressive business direction will attract other millions to private enterprises. With a new spirit in public administration there is to be a renewed business movement. Not in many years have conditions in Pittsburg been more hopeful. All is the result of a few little amendments to the city's charter by the last state legislature.

Ward Lines Abolished.
The vital features of Pittsburg's charter revision were the abolition of two large councilmanic bodies elected by small ward divisions and the substitution of one small legislative body to be elected by the city at large. Today in place of sixty-seven little men at one time 155—there are nine big men. Instead of twenty-seven minor subdivisions with their petty interests there is one big city.

While the Pittsburg plan aims to give the people representative government, it is by no means a commission form. Those back of the charter movement insist on this distinction, believing that government by commission would not be successful in a city as large as Pittsburg. The plan leaves the mayor, who is elected by the people, practically undisturbed in his executive powers, which are large. In only two places does the authority of the council and the mayor overlap. The mayor has the power of veto, and the council has supervision over the mayor's appointments of department heads. In other words, before any appointment to one of the four executive departments can be made by the mayor it must be confirmed by a majority of the council. This body, too, can remove the head of any department for cause and also has under the law jurisdiction in an impeachment trial of the mayor. Apart from these limitations, however, as executive officer of the city the mayor is supreme.

**CHARITIES OF
YOUNG HEIRESS**

Girl of Fourteen Wants to Give Away \$30,000 a Year.

SHE INHERITED \$30,000,000.

Asks Court to Allow Her to Divide Her Annual Income of \$60,000 With Churches, Hospitals and Orphanages. Plan is Her Own.

Miss Catherine Barker of Michigan City, Ind., the fourteen-year-old heiress to the entire Barker estate of \$30,000,000, has applied to the courts for permission to contribute annually a large part of her income to Catholic and Episcopal churches and hospitals and orphanages allied with them. Being a minor and under the guardianship of the First Trust and Savings bank of Chicago, Miss Barker must obtain the consent of her guardians and the court to distribute the money. The income of the estate is more than \$1,000,000 a year. John H. Barker, her father, set aside \$60,000 a year for the education and maintenance of his young daughter. The bulk of the big estate is in Chicago bank stocks, which were accumulated forty years ago by Miss Barker's grandfather.

Through her guardian, represented by President James B. Forgan of the First National bank, Miss Barker seeks to arrange for the division of her annuity by causing a petition to be filed in the Laporte circuit court asking leave to use part of her annual allowance in charitable work.

Restrictions in Will.
Miss Barker has been subjected to considerable annoyance by fortune seekers and charity solicitors. Recently she was the object of interest to an alleged prince of Sicily, who wrote her an endearing letter which was seized by one of her tutors.

She lives in a big country home in Michigan City in care of a governess and a corps of tutors.

The will of her father gives her guardians unlimited power over her future. She cannot marry until she passes twenty-one. Her future husband must be approved by the guardians, a committee composed of President Forgan of the First National bank and several directors. Not a dollar of her great fortune can be conveyed to her husband, and she must not live permanently abroad.

The guardians are empowered to control her income and allow only what in their judgment is necessary. This power is permanent, even after marriage.

WILL HAVE A FINE EXHIBIT IN CHICAGO

Upper Peninsula Will Be Well Represented at the Great Land Show Next Fall—Manager Quinby of the Upper Peninsula Development Bureau is Making Arrangements.

For the first time in history, the upper peninsula will be represented with an exhibit at the Chicago land show this fall. The E. Quinby, manager of the Upper Peninsula Development bureau, who was in the Marquette Wednesday, stated to the Mining Journal, that he is now giving a great deal of time to the preparation of this exhibit, which will be representative of all parts of the upper peninsula, and at the same time something that will attract the attention of visitors to the land show.

A desirable space with 41 feet frontage has been allotted to the upper peninsula by the land show management, and Mr. Quinby has arranged with an expert in that line to draw up an artistic plan for the exhibit. As the crop showing in the upper peninsula is particularly good this year, the prospects are that a truly remarkable exhibit of upper peninsula fruits, grains and vegetables will be gathered together for display at the Chicago show. As a special drawing card, Mr. Quinby expects to give away an upper peninsula 40-acre farm during the show.

Mr. Quinby states that interest and enthusiasm for the development movement is rapidly increasing in all parts of the peninsula and that its plans and ambitions are on everyone's tongue. The directors have decided that it will be impossible to have an exhibit at the Grand Rapids apple show this summer, but will devote all their energies toward preparing a bumper exhibit at the Chicago land show.

In all probability the prize winning exhibits made at the Northern Michigan fair to be held in Delta county will form a part of the upper peninsula exhibit at the land show.

CASES DISPOSED OF IN CIRCUIT COURT

Plaintiffs in a Timber Trespass Case Submit to Non-Suit—Jewelry Company Given Judgment by Agreement—Two More Cases Continued—Term May End Saturday.
