"SMOOTH GUY" BUYS HAM AND PAYS FOR IT WITH FORGED CHECK

HUBERT BUBSER, MEAT DEALER, CASHES CHECK FOR \$15 TEND-ERED HIM IN PAYMENT FOR HAM WORTH \$2.

Purchaser Leaves Order Not to De-Rver the Ham at His Supposed Home Until Evening-Found that Nobody Lives There and Check is Returned Mr. Bubser as a Forgery.

Escanaba police officers are looking, but probably in vain, for a young man who several days ago worked an old but slick forged check game upon an Escanaba business man and got safely away with about \$13 of the latter's money. The fact that the check was forged did not develop until yesterday, although it was cash ed by the local business man on Thursday of last week. Here is the story as related by the victim of the swindler in his report of the occurrence to the police:

Forger Buys a Ham. On Thursday of last week a man, who gave his name as "Charles Larson," went into Hubert Bubser's meat market at 1705 Ludington street and bought a ham, the price of which was in the neighborhood of \$2. He told Mr. Bubser he wanted the ham delivered at a certain house on South Fannie street, but not to deliver it until evening as there was no one at home during the day.

In payment for the ham "Larson" tendered Mr. Bubser a check for \$15 payable to "R. C. Cobb" of St. Paul or order. He had endorsed the check with the name of "Larson."

Bubser Cashes Check. The check appeared to be genuine and was accepted by Mr. Bubser, who subtracted the price of the ham and paid the remainder of what it called for to "Larson." The latter pocketed the money, about \$13, and went his

way and he has not been seen since. In due time an attempt was made to deliver the ham at the address given by "Larson," but it was found of wall paper jobbing houses of Clevethat no one lived there and the ham was brought back to the market,

Nobody Lived There. Mr. Bubser's suspicions as to the genuineness of the check were aroused by this circumstance, but he had already paid the check over to Swift & Co. in part payment of an order for meat, and did not know positively that the check was forged and that he had been victimized until yesterday, when cent stores throughout the county the check was returned to him by Swift & Co., with the information the jobbers. that it was bogus.

Reports Case to Police. Mr. Bubser then reported the incldent to the police and incidentally charged up about \$13 to his "profit and loss" account. The police are looking for Mr. "Larson," but he probably is far away from Escanaba by this

Girl of Fourteen Wants to Give Away \$30,000 a Year.

SHE INHERITED \$30,000,000.

Asks Court to Allow Her to Divide Her Annual Income of \$60,000 With Churches, Hospitals and Orphanages. Plan is Her Own.

Miss Catherine Barker of Michigan City, Ind., the fourteen-year-old heiress to the entire Barker estate of \$30,-000,000, has applied to the courts for permission to contribute annually a large part of her income to Catholic and Episcopal churches and hospitals and orphanages allied with them. Being a minor and under the guardian-ship of the First Trust and Savings bank of Chicago, Miss Barker must obtain the consent of her guardians and the court to distribute the money.

The income of the estate is more than \$1,000,000 a year. John H. Barker, ber father, set aside \$60,000 a year for the education and maintenance of his young daughter. The bulk of the big estate is in Chicago bank stocks, which were accumulated forty years ago by Miss Barker's grandfather.

Through her guardian, represented by President James B. Forgan of the First National bank, Miss Barker seeks to arrange for the division of her annuity by causing a petition to be filed in the Laporte circuit court asking leave to use part of her annual allowance in charitable work.

Restrictions In Will.

Miss Barker has been subjected to considerable annoyance by fortune seekers and charity solicitors. Recently she was the object of interest to an alleged prince of Sicily, who wrote her an endearing letter which was seized by one of her tutors.

She lives in a big country home in Michigan City in care of a governess and a corps of tutors.

The will of her father gives her guardians unlimited power over her future. She cannot marry until she passes twenty-one. Her future bushand must be approved by the guardians, a committee composed of President Forgan of the First National bank and several directors. Not a dollar of her great fortune can be conveyed to her husband, and she must not live perma nently abroad.

The guardians are empowered to control her income and allow only what in their judgment is necessary. This power is permanent, even after

NOISES AND THE AUTO WARNING SIGNAL.

In view of the country wide agita tion on the subject of unnecessary street noises, and the attempt that is being made to define just what these are, the necessity of properly classifying automobile warning signals is apparent. It is generally held that the best way to arrive at a satisfactory conclusion in this regard is to apply the same rule to the warning signal that is applied to the speed at which the automobile may be driventhat is regulation.

It is impossible to deal justly with this problem on the basis of theory. The fact that the purpose of an automobile warning signal is to prevent accident means, that consideration thereof must be of necessity the first step taken. In legislating, or discussing the warning signal question, therefore, it cannot be justly forgotten that this is a matter of principle, and not

The following signed statement in this regard by Hudson Maxim, who is recognized as an international authority in the matter of sound, is of especal interest:

"I am firmly convnced, from many years of practical experience in automobiling, that the automobile must be equipped with a distinctive signalling device, capable of giving an effective warning signal which must, of necessity, in order to be a warning signal, be a harsh and startling sound. Such a signalling device enables the chauffeur to avoid many serious accidents, which would inevitably result from the employment of a device emitting a pleasant or musical sound.

"Caution and skill on the part of the chauffeur in the choice of speed and in the use of his brakes are not alone sufficient to prevent collisions. He must be armed also with a strong effective warning signal.

"The abolition of such warning de vices on automobiles operated in crowded city streets would certainly result in injury to numerous persons and the loss of many lives, with consequent damage suits brought against drivers and owners of automobiles.

The election of Governor Hoke Smith s United States senator from Georgia sends back to Washington a man who was an interesting figure there sixteen years ago. He was then secretary of the interior in the cabinet of President Grover Cleveland. In the Georgia delegation they still recall those goed old days when Secretary Smith filled every place he had to fill with Georgians. They say that you couldn't throw a stick in the department without hitting a Georgia

ator Voorhees, who had been valuly trying to get a place for an Indiana man, came down the corridor as Secretary Smith came up. The senator was whistling "Marching Through Georgia" in a disconsolate way. That tune was not pleasing to Hoke Smith's sensitive Georgia ears, and he looked at Voor nees in a reproachful way.

"What are you whistling that for?" asked Hoke, and his tone was bur dened with reproach.

"I just can't help it." explained Senator Voorhees. "Whenever I come through your department I feel as if was marching through Georgia."

When Hoke Was Elected Governor. Five years ago Hoke Smith decided that he would run for governor as the anti-railroad candidate. He was nominated after one of the hottest fights in the state. Two years later his enemies stole a march on him and nominated Joe Brown over him by a nar row margin. Last year Smith again entered the primaries and beat Brown by a decisive vote.

Senator Elect Smith now says he will not resign the governorship until certain reforms in which he believes are enacted by the legislature.

NEED CEDAR FOR PENCILS

Barns and Fences Being Torn Down to Obtain It.

The bureau of forest service has dis covered from recent reports that there s a dearth of cedar for pencils for which there is no prospect of relief. There is in the ordinary lead pencil three-fourths of a cent's worth of ce dar, and there are made in the United States annually 320,000,000 pencils. This demands 110,000 tons of cedar, which costs about \$30 a ton.

The supply is gradually disappearing. and it is necessary every year to go farther and farther back into the virgin forests. Cedar cruisers know every region of the country where they can get any stock. Old cuttings have all been gone over repeatedly. Old stumps have been dug out. Even old log houses have been taken down. Large quantities of old cedar planks from barns are being bought, and fence rails are being picked over. The common practice is for the pencil manufacturers to put up a fine new woven wire fence for the farmer who has a fence with enough cedar rails in it to make it worth while, and the farmer who has a picket fence of cedar can get the best wire fence money can

Queer as it may seem, although hundreds of experiments have been made, no other wood has been found as good as cedar for the pencil.

HERE'S SUGGESTION TO THE SHRINERS

George S. Rodd Would Have Upper Peninsula Furnish a Site for Headquarters of Mystic Shriners and Make It Their Mecca-Matter Call. ed to Bureau's Attention.

George S. Rodd, the well known gen eral agent for the Northwestern Life Insurance company, suggests Houghton as the headquarters for the proposed permanent home for the Mystic Shriners.
