Too Much Politics.

"It is constantly asserted by the unthinking that we have too much politics and too many politicians," said the speaker. "When we reflect that the word 'politics' in its higher and nobler sense, means the science of government, we must concede that the more politics we have, the better, for government, affects the happiness and prosperity of every residents between the two oceans, and, therefore, we should all strive to make our governments, national, state and municipal, as nearly perfect as any human institution can be"

Baking Helps

Learn to Regulate the Heat of Your Oven


By Mrs. Janet McKenzie Hill, Editor of the Boston Cooking School Magazine

There is just one way to make your cakes rise high and keep an even surface. Have your oven moderate at first, until the cake is fully rizen; then increase the heat, so as to brown it over quickly. Extreme heat stiffens the dough. If you stiffen the outside of the cake before the rising is complete. you stop the rising process. Then the leavening gas, forming inside, will bulge up the center, where the dough is still soft, and spoil the shape of the cake.

Norz-Biscuits or other pastries made from stiff dough, that are cut into shapes for the oven, bake in a hot oven. This is because the cut surfaces of the dough do not sear over, but rather leave the pores open, allowing the leavening gas to escape and the heat to penetrate readily. Small ovens cool quickly; therefore they should be made several degrees hotter than a larger oven, and the less the door is opened the better. Do not attempt to bake bread and pastry together. Bread re-quires prolonged, moderate baking-pastry the reverse.

Have a strong underheat for baking powder preparations; especially pastry.







That the teeth were those of an herbivorous animal seems evident from their evenness. They are too large to have belonged to the mammoth. This would seem to indicate that they belonged to the mastodon. which towered in size over the mammoth as that creature did over the

There Were Men Then Too: Close to the teeth was found an ancient stone hatchet which is believed to belong to a period coexistent with that in which the animal to which the teeth belonged is believed to have lived. Indians of the Klamath river tribes on being shown the hatchet declared that they had never seen or heard of anything resembling it, and the medicine men and chiefs stated that the traditions of their people contained no account to show that the hatchet had ever been made or used

In the same pocket where the teeth were found was. a horn seven and a half feet long, which crumbled in the hands of the shovelmen when they attempted to take it up. The born measured at the butt fourteen inches in diameter, but it bore no resemblance to the born of the prehistoric mammoth. The horn was of the same contour as that of ordinary cattle and contained a core and a thin shell similar to that of the ox.

These relics were found in a stratum of earth which bears evidence of being the ancient channel of the Klamath or some other river from which the Klamath was evolved. The spot is fully 200 feet from the present bed of the river, but runs about parallel to the present channel.

Laid There 10,000 Years. The general formation of the earth gives every indication of having been massed ages and ages ago, and from the trees and the partly petrified trunks of trees which were found at bedrock twelve feet under where the relics were unearthed there is every reason to believe that the teeth had lain imbedded where they were found upward of 10,000 years ago.

The enamel of the teeth is in a splendid state of preservation and is green in color. On the tip of several of the cuspids are cavites such as might be found in the teeth of an ordinary animal. Savants at the University of California are to be asked to try to fix the identity of the crea ture that possessed the teeth.






